### Council, Bartholomew School and Residents join forces to resolve school transport issue in Long Hanborough

Residents, parents and Bartholomew School in West Oxfordshire have worked with Oxfordshire County Council to improve school transport arrangements between Long Hanborough and Bartholomew School.

Since September a shuttle service had been provided but this had not been working as all parties would have wished.

Officers from the County Council, the local County Councillor Liam Walker, Stagecoach, the Parent Group from Hanborough, Bartholomew School, representatives of Hanborough Parish Council and officers from the council have each been discussing how best to make improvements in recent weeks.

In the end it was agreed that the option of a coach service to replace the current shuttle service was the best option.

Oxfordshire County Council has now agreed a way forward that will see a 75-seater bus run by Walters Coaches that undertaking a single journey to and from school. **The current Cassington bus will be increased to a 76-seater bus.** 

Over coming weeks county council officers will formalise these arrangements contractually and assign the children to one of the three buses that will now be running through the village. They will then be able to communicate the arrangements and produce bus passes for the children. **The new arrangement will come in to place on January 4.** 

Councillor Yvonne Constance, the Council's Cabinet Member for Environment and Economy, said: "This is a common sense solution that has been reached collaboratively by the county council and local residents. I'd like to join the local county councillor Liam Walker in thanking the Parent Group in Hanborough for their input along with Hanborough Parish Council. Bartholomew School and Stagecoach have also been very helpful."

### The snow code

#### **Be Careful!**

Don't be afraid to clear paths in fear someone will get injured. People walking on snow and ice have the responsibility to be careful. Don't make the pathways more dangerous by causing them to refreeze.

# Gritting and clearing pavements and residential areas: What can I use?

- · Grit and sharp sand
- Dishwasher salt
- Table salt
- Soda crystals

### **Suitable tools**

- Plastic lightweight shovel or Regular shovel (however the snow will stick and be less efficient)
- Domestic grass seed spreader, Scoop or trowel
- Wheelbarrow to move tools or snow

#### How much salt?

Less than you think! A small handful should clear and protect 1m (3ft) of surface. Therefore to treat 400m (1320ft) of pavement, a 20kg bag of salt will be sufficient.

### Will I get sued?

NO! There is no law to prevent the clearing of snow outside your house or on the pavement. Occupiers of properties have a legal responsibility to ensure their paths are safe to prevent visitor injuries.

Communities and property owners can help themselves and improve the safety of their area by undertaking simple snow clearance activities as soon as snow falls.

### **Snow clearing**

### How to grit your path

Clearing snow enables the sun to aid the melting and evaporation process throughout the day. Salt helps prevent the re-freezing of water that can create black ice. Clear a path using a shovel and remove the snow. Place salt on a small trowel and shake some off as you walk along, alternatively, use a seed spreader for quicker, more efficient spreading.

## Remember: salt DOES NOT remove snow or compacted ice.

Using lots of salt is unnecessary, wasteful, and harmful to the environment.

### **Tackling compacted snow**

Provide traction for people walking over compacted snow by spreading sand that will become embedded and provide grip. Use a coarse cheap sand, such as builder's sand, cat litter, or cinders. Remember to sweep

sand, cat litter, or cinders. Remember to swee the pavement after the thaw has occurred.

### Look after yourself

Clearing snow is hard work, so ensure you take plenty of breaks and know when to stop. Wear suitable clothing, including boots and warm waterproof clothing.

### Proposed Locals Walks Feature

Some residents have asked people to email in any walks/ trails they know from the village, perhaps including rough distance, terrain and time. There must be so many routes that we just don't know of.

## A new start

We have just had Christmas day and after Christmas day celebrated New Year's day. But in what year does New Year's day come before Christmas day? (Answer below.)

As a young child I can remember thinking that a year "BC" meant "Before Christ" and "AD" meant "After Death" (of Christ). I learned later that "AD" actually stands for Anno Domini which is the Medieval Latin for "The year of the (or our) Lord". So our new year of AD 2018 is 2018 years after Jesus Christ's birth not 2018 years after His death. (However, there have been a couple of blips down the years which may mean that Jesus was born a few years BC!)

Also, the actual date of Christ's Birth is unlikely to be 25th Dec if, as the bible says, there were shepherds in the fields at night. The date for the celebration of Christmas was not set until the 4th century and then not set on the basis of evidence or previous tradition. However, it is a good date, just before new year, because the birth of Christ heralds a new start, a new

era, a new way of relating to God, a new covenant, a new testament. Nothing less than a new turning point in history and, so much so, that our history has been divided into BC and AD.

The birth of Christ heralded a new beginning for humankind. A new start.

On 6th Jan we celebrate Epiphany (the visit of the wise men to the young child Jesus). These wise men, or Magi, knew that this was a new start for all – even them. They may not have been actual kings, and they certainly were not Jewish, but they came to find the one who would be the King of kings and Lord of lords. The one who would give an opportunity for a new start with God to anyone and everyone who would trust and follow him. You can read about the wise men's visit in Matthew's Gospel chapter 2 verse 1-12 (page 2 in your Jubilee New Testament)

### December 2017

You may have realised that our page in the last CAWN was a duplicate of the previous month. We are sorry but this was an editorial error. December is a very busy month in school and the list of events is endless. Here are a few of the highlights.

#### Christmas Tree

The school would like to say a big thank you to Cassington Nursery for the beautiful real Christmas Tree they donated to us. It looks magica with the lights and the decorations made by the children.

### Big Christmas Sing

Over the years are choir has grown and we now have a quarter of the school involved, with as many boys as girls, and children ranging from 6 years to 11 years. Christmas is a busy time for the choir and at the



very end of November we started our Christmas singing by joining with other primary schools in Oxfordshire at the Big Christmas Sing. The event is organised by the Oxfordshire Music Service with Christian Aid and spans four days. On each day up to eight primary schools take part in a concert to sing Christmas songs together and perform a solo item. The atmosphere at Oxford Town Hall was exciting and the choir performed their solo item professionally - I was immensly proud of them as standing up in front of a large audience to sing is a real achievement.

The choir then sang at Cassington Café, at the school Christmas Fayre, at the Advent Service at St

Peter's Church and finally at Churchfields.

#### The Christmas Fayre

We have an active St Peter's School Association (SPSA) who work together to organise events to raise money for the benefit of the school. This year's Christmas Fayre was well attended and there were plenty of activities and stalls to enjoy and to spend money at. Father Christmas put in an appearance, much to the delight of the younger members of our community, and the various stalls proved a draw for the older people on the look out for Christmas presents and decorations. One room was set up especially for the children to buy and wrap a special present for their parents and another to make Christmas decoration. To help the evening along there were mince pies, mulled wine and pizza! The huge raffle was drawn at the end of the evening with the Christmas Hamper being won by the governor who had organised it - definitely no cheating in the ticket draw!

### Wizard William

One of the events that the SPSA pay for is our Pantomime. This year we decided to have an in house production 'Wizard Wiiliam' by a travelling theatre group. The production had it's own scenary, lights and costumes and was well received by the children. There were plenty of laughs and some slap-stick.



### Snow!!

When it snowed heavily on the Sunday, and after visiting the school, it was a clear decision to close. The Health and Safety of pupils and staff is a priority and the school site on the Monday was not safe. We also could not get enough staff in to ensure ratios were correct with no First Aiders. On the Tuesday I was helped by parents to clear pathways and we decided to open even though it was very icey. I was very touched by the

dedication of the staff as they came in from as far away as Banbury. Unfortunately although we nearly had a full compliment of staff we did not have a full complement of children. Wednesday saw us back to normal - the crisis over- for now.

### Nativity Play

One causalty of the snow was our nativity play. Instead of the three planned performances we could only put on one. Oak Class (Year 1 and 2) staged our nativity this year with a more traditional take on the Christmas Story. The children had great fun singing the songs and learning their lines. The Classteacher and Teaching Assistant worked hard to prepare the children including making costumes and directing the action. The play finished with the children performance 'twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star using Makaton signing.

Our very little children in Apple Tree Class (3, 4 and 5 year olds) also put on a performance singing Christmas songs to the other children and their parents.

### Big Red Bike



We were absolutely delighted when one of our children won the West Oxfordshire District Council Road Safety poster competition. Thomas Wilby (7 years) won a wonderful red bike with crash helmet and accessories. The prize, presented at our Celebration Assembly by the Chair of WODC, was a total surprise to Thomas and his parents, who were in on the surprise, were there to see him receive it. The bike was donated by Witney Rotary Club.

As I write this we have only one and a halfdays left at school. On Monday we have our Christingle Service at St Peter's Church followed by our school Christmas dinner. On Tuesday we have our party and we break up at 1.15pm.

### **Eynsham Cubs become Dementia Friends**



# 1st Eynsham Eagle pack Cub Scouts took part in a Dementia Friends session.

The session on Thursday 30 November 2017 was part of the Scouts and Alzheimer's Society's Million Hands partnership.

The group of Cub Scouts, who are 8-10 years old, joined the growing number of young people helping to create a dementia friendly generation by taking part in the session at Evnsham Scout HQ.

A Dementia Friend is someone who has gained a basic understanding about what it is like to have dementia and the small ways they can support someone living with the condition.

With over two million people expected to develop dementia in the next 10 years, it is likely the majority of today's under-18-year-olds will be affected by the condition in their lifetime.

Vanessa Gregory, from 1st Eynsham Cub Scouts, said: "The session really helped the cubs understand what life is like for a person with dementia and how we can help. We are also hoping to organise a community dementia-friendly activity in the village."

Alzheimer's Society Dementia Friends Champion, Alex Williams, who delivered the Dementia Friends session said:

"Young people hold the key to what our society will look like in the future and we want it to be a dementia friendly one. The young people who learn more about dementia today are our future customer service managers, bus drivers, police officers, MPs and HR Directors, all important roles, who will have more patience with someone living with dementia or can influence policies to better support people with dementia and carers.

"That's why Alzheimer's Society is urging all young people to follow Clifford Beavers example and become Dementia Friends to help beat the stigma that exists in our society today."



# Campaigners dismiss Eynsham garden village review as council backs plans for new homes

CAMPAIGNERS fighting plans to build thousands of new homes near Eynsham have criticised a council review of the development.

As part of the examination of its local plan, West Oxfordshire District Council was asked by a Government planning inspector to demonstrate why land off the A40 to the north of the village was chosen as the site for a proposed 2,200 home 'garden village'.

Two sites north and south of the A40 at Barnard Gate were considered as alternatives but the council concluded that the land north of Eynsham was still the best option because it is closer to Oxford and planned transport improvements.

Villagers said the exercise was an attempt to justify a decision that had already been made, rather than a proper consideration of alternative plans, and warned so many new homes will place a huge strain on roads and services.

District councillor Peter Emery, who lives in Eynsham and represents the area, said the report was 'so full of holes it was like lace.'

He said: "It conveniently finds reasons to justify building at Eynsham rather than taking a proper look at the alternatives.

"There's a feeling that because we have committed to it, it must be done at any cost.

"But a bad plan is no better than no plan at all and I fear we are going blindly towards a bad plan."

In January the Government announced it was backing the garden village project.

The developments are intended to be settlements in their own right, with schools, community resources

and employment opportunities, and are encouraged to develop their own identity.

But Mr Emery said that the new homes would still be reliant on many existing Eynsham services, at least initially, and he had not seen any plans for new shops.

He said: "This is already going to be a village the size of Eynsham with plans to expand further.

"It is hard to understand how the creaky village infrastructure will cope.

"Best of luck to anyone trying to get in the Co-op with all those new people.

"It is not going to work, it is a mess."

Gordon Beach, the chair of Eynsham Parish Council, urged the council to sort out existing issues on the A40 before more homes are considered.

He said: "The road is already at a standstill most days and we don't feel there has been any concessions to residents' concerns."

District councillor Jeff Haine, the cabinet member for planning, defended the plans and said the Government backing would allow the council to access funds to improve transport links, including the A40, as well as provide 'much-needed- new homes.'

He added: "The science business park proposed with the garden village will give local people an alternative to driving to work in Oxford.

"In addition, the nearby Hanborough railway station together with the planned Park and Ride facility to the north of Eynsham also gives people an alternative to using their cars."

A public consultation on the plans is expected to begin imminently, and planning applications could follow.


