Boxing Day Match Report After enjoying the festivities of Christmas Day, the married and single

After enjoying the festivities of Christmas Day, the married and single men of Cassington turned their attention to one thing; the highly anticipated boxing day match, which this year didn't fail to provide the drama. The two teams were fresh and rearing to go, with some new faces on both teams in an attempt to snatch the bragging rights for another year.

The game started off slow with both teams cautious, yet a few rash tackles soon put the game into full throttle, with players showing their full potential and just how reckless their tackles can be! A free kick from an impossible distance sparked the first goal, as the singles struck first blood through centre back and number 7, Shay, who struck a Ronal-do-like free kick which stunned everyone on and off the pitch and gave the goalkeeper no chance. With this advantage, the single men produced a second goal through Luke, who managed to wriggled his way through the married defence effortlessly and provided a deft chip over Rob in the married goal, which was a delightful sight for all watching, and it meant the singles had an insurance goal just 25 minutes into the game.

However, the married men weren't going to be pushed around by the singles and struck a goal of their own 5 minutes later when the ball fell to John on the edge of the area, who managed to neatly slot it in the bottom corner showing his experience and expertise in that field. The ball was collected from the net and the married men were spurred on by the goal which could lead to a resounding comeback. However, the singles still had a one goal lead by halftime as both sets of players came off the field looking as if they had played 90 minutes instead of 45 minutes. Needless to say, some players didn't look like they could make it through 45 minutes of play, yet all players returned onto the pitch seemingly revived and ready for what the second half had in store.

We picked up were we left off in the second half with tackles flying in

and both teams going close on many occasions, yet a confusion between goalkeeper and centre back left the married men and John with the ball just a few yards out, and he made no mistake in punishing the singles and drawing level on 60 minutes. This was well and truly game on. Then, just two minutes later, a panicked singles

back line saw the ball being crossed in from Lionel, yet they failed to deal with it and although it took a few deflections, the ball hit the back of the net and there was no doubt that it was Lionel's goal and ultimately, a goal that meant the married men had completed their comeback and they now took the lead as the scores were 3-2.

Despite calls of "park the bus" all around from the married men, they went in search for more, leaving the back 4 lacking men in support of them and when the ball came in from Luke on the left side of the pitch, they struggled to deal with it and it ended up in the back of the net for the single men, and despite the lack of a known goal scorer, the goal was still celebrated across the pitch. And as the game was coming to a close and the players were looking as fragile as ever, the players seemed glad that the honours were shared and nobody was seriously injured (or so it was thought...)

Overall it was a very successful day for both teams as the game was tied at 3-3, and we saw one of the best goals ever scored on boxing day from man of the match Shay, who had a flying performance as the sweeper for the singles and he showed his potential from set pieces as well. Overall it was a thrilling spectacle, and despite the cold, we had a brilliant turnout of spectators who had come to support a team or just to marvel at the brilliant football on show. Both teams will be back at it again next boxing day, and we'll have to wait and see which team will be victorious after a year of sharing the bragging rights!

PAY LESS - RECYCLE MORE

To DIY or not to DIY that is the question.

I was brought up with the mindset of understanding how things work and fixing them when they go wrong, or doing jobs myself when they need doing. From televisions to toasters, decorating to demolitions, windows to washing machines I've done them all - but I am not a DIY addict and only do jobs that need doing.

I have just replaced the bearings on our washing machine which is not a job for the faint-hearted but, having done this job successfully twice before (on previous washing machines) I went ahead.

First you strip the washing machine right down, disconnecting most of the wiring and internal pipes and seals and remove the whole drum (inner and outer). You then split the outer drum and drive the inner drum, with it's "spider" & drive shaft, out of the bearings. Inevitably, the shaft will be seized in the bearings, and the bearings seized in the outer drum. This is where the hammer, WD40 and various cold chisels come into play and eventually (many cups of tea later) the components give-in to persistent aggression and determination.

When all was reassembled from our machine (and having no parts "left over") I gained the great satisfaction of the machine running smoothly again.

With this job and other DIY repairs there is one key element. This is, a clear diagnosis of the fault and a realistic assessment of your ability to be able to do the job. If the

diagnosis is extreme and your ability unlikely to be sufficient then it's time for calling in a professional or replacing the item.

The same is true of DIY religion. In the Christian understanding our diagnosis of the problem is that we are all "faulty" and tending to sin (however good we might be). Many people, even many who might consider themselves "Christian", make the mistake of thinking that they can be restored with God by themselves — a sort of DIY religious fix by being "good". However, the true diagnosis is too serious and our ability to fix it on our own is insufficient. Understanding that this is one problem that each of us cannot fix on our own (even if we were the most "saintly") is the key decision point of the Christian faith.

Instead of trusting in religious DIY the bible and Christian faith tell us to trust in the one who, through his sacrifice, was and is able to "make the fix" for us when it was beyond our ability.

Even replacing washing machines bearings is possible on our own, but fixing our relationship with God needs a Saviour - even Jesus Christ our Lord.

If you have time read Romans Chapter 5 verses 6-8 page 170 in your Jubilee New Testament (given to each household in the village at the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.)







In Apple Tree Class (the Nursery and Reception children) they have a book called 'Rain' by Sam Usher. The children have been creating their own rainy day books, finding out about capacity, exploring floating and sinking and generally learning about the weather!

Some of the Reception have been inspired to write a sentence.

In Oak Class, Year 1 and 2, their book is called 'A Place to Call Home' by Alexis Deacon. They are investigating outer space at the moment in a topic called 'Zoom to the Moon'. They are all very excited to find out about the

planets, black holes and other intriguing outer space phenomena. We are sure that the writing they do at the end of the topic will be great. If you are wondering about the link it is to do with holes!






Maple Class, Year 3 and 4, have a more sophisticated book 'Town is by the Sea' by Joanne Schwarts, a book about a mining community in the north. They had a 'Wow' activity in which the classteacher replicated some of what it felt to be down a coal mine by letting the children

crawl through a darkened tunnel which was scattered with coal.

The end product for this class will be descriptive writing. Willow Class, Year 5 and 6, are studying 'Rose Blanche' by Ian McEwan. Set in the second world war the book focuses on conflict, looking at a situation from both sides. This class will build their learning towards writing a narrative piece based on the

We were also reminded of our local Group meeting on 1st March at Exeter Hall when Lesley Smith will be entertaining us about "Sex and the Tudors"!

Our speaker for this evening was Chris Caddy whose talk called 'Tunnel Vision' was all about the history of the London Underground system.

The first operating tube was in 1863. The line was built and financed by a private company, the Metropolitan Railway. Other companies also invested in different tube lines until, by 1884 there were over 800 trains running around all or part of the Inner Circle every day. In 1890, a line using electric trains was opened. It was much deeper below ground than the other lines.

Now it is part of the Northern Line. More lines like this were opened. People liked them, so in 1905 the lines that used steam engines were changed to use electric trains.

An American, Charles Yerkes bought most of the companies and formed a company named Underground Electric Railways of London Company Ltd.

During the Second World War some Underground stations were used as shelters against bombs and one a factory.

After the war more passengers used the underground. Victoria Line was opened in the 1960s, and the Piccadilly Line was extended to Heathrow Airport in 1977. The Jubilee Line was opened in 1979. London's current Crossrail is the most expensive.

We were told many more fascinating facts .About the various station designs to the famous underground map designed by the electrician Harry Beck in 1932. The idea now copied all over the world

Fix My Street

The Oxfordshire County Council also works all year round doing some small-scale but very important work under its new minor works programme.

These relatively small and varied jobs make a big difference in towns and villages and are undertaken by four small teams who travel round the county and have so far, since July 2017, completed more than 160 jobs, with more being done all the time.

Around £480,000 has been allocated so that the teams who

are each equipped with a truck and tools, with specialist gear such as mini diggers being called in when needed.

The works are not considered to be safety defects or urgent, but have been identified by county council staff for action following requests from town and parish councils and reports made on Fix My Street.



VILLAGE WALKS PART ONE

I too would "be pleased" to hear of unknown trails. The vexed question of closed/forbidden paths will be contentious. Possibilities of interesting walks have drastically been reduced since I moved here in 1976.

Assuming you don't include any along paved roads, there are exceeding few.

TO THE NORTH there is only the path to Purwell Farm and beyond to the Evenlode, which becomes very muddy beyond the first quarter mile. In total perhaps two and half miles.

TO THE SOUTH one can reach the Thames but only by Durham Lane (marked PRIVATE ROAD) which peters out after quarter to half a mile -OR-

By climbing over the barrier on the opposite side of the A40 to Horsemear Lane. Perhaps half a mile, liable to flood.

TO THE WEST there is no path but one can walk to Eynsham past the Mercedes-Benz garage, the so-called Cassington Road which is paved and reaches B4449 after one and quarter miles from the A40. Off this road there is a footpath to the left which takes you to another part of Eynsham – very susceptible for those with a dog-allergy, since it is the haunt of dogs and their walkers.

TO THE EAST, there are two paths that pass Tuckwells Pond over the Slade Brook to Worton, say half mile for those who can cope with the three stiles. (Beyond Worton one can reach Yarnton by the often very muddy "path" under the rail and across a cultivated field (two and a quarter miles in all)). —OR-

One can go along Lynton Lane over 2 styles to cross a frequently flooded meadow to the Slade Brook from where the footpath is very badly maintained and, in the growing season, infested with nettles. Beyond it leads to Yarnton Mead and the Thames but very liable to flooding or at best boggy, ill-defined paths – it is marked towards Wolvercote (two and a half miles) but that would be an adventure!

(After retirement in 2000 I used to lead walks for the Pensioners, ex University employees until 2016 and for 5 years ran a coffee morning and walk for all the West Oxfordshire members. I gave a Village Hall a commercial booking and was proud to take the people on the then available paths. Worton Farms and ARC/Hanson have a lot to answer for.... for each of those 5 walks took a different path....).

Turning dog poo into power

A street lamp powered by dog poo is helping to guide walkers on the Malvern Hills and is believed to be the first of its kind in the UK.

Environmentalists have built a device that allows pet owners to deposit a compostable bag of waste, which a specially made anaerobic digester coverts into gas which then powers the light.

Brian Harper has been testing the "canine lantern" for more than two years with waste from overflowing bins around Malvern.

Dog walkers are now being offered free paper bags on the way up a popular route and urged to deposit them in the digester on the way down.

The methane produced is stored and allows the light to burn for two hours every evening, guiding walkers.

"We have a problem particularly of plastic bags [containing dog waste] being left all over the place. They end up in trees, undergrowth."
