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Our Member of Parliament feedback

In my recent meeting with Parish Councillors and local volunteers from Cassington and Worton, we discussed the high volume of speeding through the two villages, as well as the recent increase in burglaries in the local area. I have been in contact with Thames Valley Police (TVP) about these matters, asking them to investigate these reports and provide the support we need to stop these activities. I was pleased to hear about the great work that the local Neighbourhood Watch Team has done to prevent and report these activities; I would strongly encourage you to join this group and support their work.

We also discussed concerns regarding the proposed Garden

Village and the effect this will have on local transport infrastructure, particularly congestion on the A40. I am working with authorities at both Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) and West Oxfordshire District Council (WODC) to finally fix this problem that affects so many of us. Indeed, I recently spoke on this specific matter in a debate in Parliament on 'Housing, Planning and the Green Belt'; in my speech, I made these very points and highlighted the strength of feeling around this issue. At this point, my colleagues know that if I am to speak in a debate, I will almost certainly mention the A40!

Also, do you remember that advertisement for a "pick-me-up" called "Phyllosan" which supposedly "fortified the over forties".

Apologies to younger readers for whom the above may seem like nostalgic ramblings (no offence intended towards my good friend Roy Partridge).

To the point – it's the season of Lent where traditionally Christians remember Jesus fasting in the wilderness for forty days and nights being tempted by the devil. So, the season of Lent is celebrated for 40 days prior to Easter (not counting Sundays). Christians may fast or take on other spiritual disciplines or do charitable works during Lent.

The number "40" has a special significance. When Moses liberated the Israelites from Egypt they wandered in

the wilderness for 40 years before entering the "promised land" and beginning a new era.

Jesus, having just been baptised in the river Jordan by John the Baptist, but before he embarked on his ministry, went into the wilderness for forty days.

VILLAGE WALKS – PART THREE

In response to both David Chamberlain and Bill Ferreday's comments on village walks in last month's issue, I agree that there are few local walks of interest or indeed that provide much pleasure. However, if you are willing to use a car or a bike there are several walks in the locality that I have discovered in the last few years that are not widely known. These include Devil's Quoits – the stone circle at Stanton Harcourt which can be combined with a walk round Linch Hill fishing lake; Kirtlington Quarry nature reserve where there is a labyrinth made of locally collected stones; Thrupp has a new walking trail which can be combined with a walk to Weavely Furze community wood; Tar Lakes; and one I haven't explored recently Standlake mosaic trail. If you are willing to go further afield there is a walk at Heythrop where you can see camels, zebras, a giraffe and on occasions hear wolves or even lions! And closer to Cassington lots of walkers are now walking around one or both of the Farmor reservoirs – ideal if you want a brisk walk with no mud.

We were delighted to welcome over 400 adults to our weekly courses and Saturday workshops in the Autumn of 2017. Whilst lots of our students return each term, a third enrolled with us for the first time. So what can you expect from Community Education if you haven't been before? Firstly, you'll probably meet someone you already know, since the majority of our students come from the local area. But don't worry if you don't: the words people use most often about our courses are 'friendly', 'relaxed' and 'fun'. So if you'd like to stay active or try a new challenge in a supportive environment, have a look at what we offer. **Weekly**

courses start again after Easter, and we have Saturday workshops on 10 March and

19 May. Classes coming up include: archery, curtain and blind making, drawing, drumming, help for iPad/iPhone users, painting using special effects, summer and Italian cookery, and Zumba Gold, plus more on our website.

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February 2018

School Concert

As a school we are always looking for ways to broaden our children's experiences and give them learning opportunities in exciting and innovative ways.



At the end of January we decided to take our older two classes, Maple and Willow, to listen to the Oxfordshire County Youth Orchestra at the Sheldonian Theatre. The concert gave the children access to a building which many of them had never been inside and provided a wonderful chorus of 'wows' and 'oohs' as they soaked up the atmosphere and grandeur of their surroundings.

Getting to the Sheldonian had proved problematical as a sink hole had appeared in Broad Street the day before. This meant that we, and ten other schools, had to walk the children from St Giles to the

theatre including a child with a broken foot!

Once safely inside we settled down in anticipation to await the arrival of the the Oxfordshire County Youth Orchestra. The children were enthralled as the orchestra entered in their formal black carrying their instruments. The instrumentalists of the orchestra all attend Oxfordshire Secondary Schools, ranging in age from 13 to 17 years. The organisers of the concert, Oxfordshire County Music Service, had thoughtfully supplied a high quality programme which included pictures of the various instruments of the orchestra so the children could match them.

We clapped as first the leader of the orchestra come into the auditorium and then the conductor, Dr John Traill. The concert was just as much a chance for the orchestra to perform as it was a concert for the schools so every protocol was followed.

The orchestra began by playing Shostakovich's Festive Overture with great gusto and precision. They then split the tune Frere Jacques into phrases so that each set of instruments could play and their sound could be identified. There



followed pieces describing events - Copland's Hoe Down from Rodeo and Delius' Winter Night; pieces describing people - Elgar's Enigma variations (Theme, 11 and 7) and Beauty and the Beast; and pieces describing activities - Tchaikovsky's Russian Dance from the Nutcracker and Respighi's Pines of Rome.

During Beauty and the Beast the children were treated to a dance between two members of the orchestra dressed as the main characters. The standard of musicianship was high and the sound the youth orchestra made could easily rival many adult orchestras. They were excellent. The children applauded loudly and clapped along when asked to.

The feedback from children and staff alike was overwhelmingly positive – they had a great time and came back to school enriched by the experience.

On February 15th Cassington WI held their monthly meeting in the Village Hall.

We greeted two visitors and noted our numbers were down as several members were away on holiday or poorly.

The business section followed the usual pattern with various meetings and outings announced.

Arrangements were finalized for our March meeting which is the annual meeting followed by filled jacket potatoes and apple pie supper.

Our president, Glenda Appleton then read a rather lengthy letter from the WI National Chair in response to much adverse criticism made recently in the press. We were assured that our subscriptions are certainly not wasted, that Denman College will remain and that the HQ in London was a good investment.

The business was followed by our speaker, Alastair Lack who had worked for the BBC World Service for 26 years finally ending up as Head of Production.

He explained how the world service began in 1932 as the BBC Empire Service, broadcasting on shortwave and aimed principally at English speakers across the British Empire. Programmes in German started on 29 March 1938, and by the end of 1942 broadcasts were being made in all major European languages. It was based at Bush house in the Strand and, apart

from a few temporary moves, finally moved to Oxford Circus.

We were told of his many experiences meeting some very famous people and also how the service was such an aid and comfort to many, including people such as Ghandi, Terry Waite, John McCarthy and Nelson Mandela. A very important link with the outside world.

Our speaker had been to the Falklands to cover the recovery after the war ceased and then to the Argentine to interview! He had followed the Presidential election of Ronald Raegan in 1981 .what an experience that was! He had covered the Middle East especially in Jerusalem; Africa during the Referendum in 1994, He had been up the Khyber Pass , and Berlin before and after the Wall came down. There were many other news situations and he had met so many fascinating people.

It was an enthralling talk that we won't forget for a long time. Linda Kimber gave the vote of thanks; the raffle was drawn and won by Sheila Nelson and refreshments served by Linda and Maggie.

Next month, 15th March in the Village Hall at 7.45 the Annual meeting followed by supper.

Sports & Social Club update

We are pleased to update you that we have received funding to install an outdoor gym at the playing fields as part of the playing fields improvement project. Huge thanks to Sport England for providing the grant to make this possible. The gym has now been installed and is available for all to use. Four pieces of gym equipment have been provided and are located behind the MUGA pitch. They include a stepper, a cross trainer, a high pulley a and chip up & dip bar. the current green gym location.


The fundraising target for the whole project is an ambitious £53,800 of which we have raised £28,025 but have a long way to go. We have fundraising events planned and grant applications in progress. More on this over the coming months.

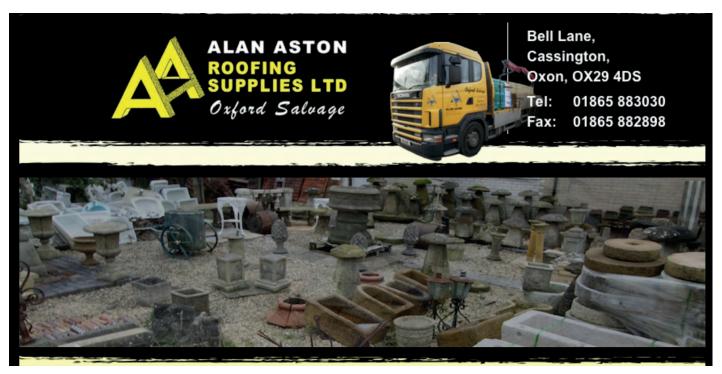


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Observation by Stephen Wright

Living in a house with one guy and three girls has been a real eye opener to just what girls are like. Whilst they may seem glamorous on the outside, they are also capable of blocking the toilet with a massive poo.

Some of the stereotypes are definitely true. Case in point: the length of time it takes for them to get ready for a night out. Whilst I – your basic meat and potatoes Fray Bentos kind of guy – can literally be ready in 20 minutes (have shower, insert contact lens, style hair, put on un-ironed shirt), the girls truly do take decades. I've also found myself in the situation of being Head of Media for Poole Town Ladies, so now I'm learning more about grown women as well as young adults. Oxfordshire County Council agreed its budget today (13 February)

following a five hour meeting of all 63 county councillors.

Key points include:

- * Finances are sound compared to other councils, with difficult decisions taken previously
- * Council tax rise will deliver extra money for adults and children's social care
- * Proposal to extend £500,000 contribution for homelessness for an extra year in 2019/20, subject to consultation
- * 10-year programme to improve transport network and release more money for road maintenance
- * £15,000 for each of the 63 county councillors to spend on local priorities in their area

Councillor Ian Hudspeth, Leader of Oxfordshire County Council, said in part:

<u>Investment in affordable homes and tackling homelessness</u>

In addition to the £155 million for planning and delivering improved infrastructure, we have been given £60 million to deliver more affordable homes across Oxfordshire.

The affordable homes won't come overnight, but homelessness is becoming a national problem, and Oxfordshire has its share of the problem.

I propose that we continue to fund homelessness support for an additional year in 2019/20 by £500,000. This will be subject to the current consultation on supported housing, and discussions with our City and District colleagues.

Community say in local spending

In this budget, I want to make sure that communities have a say in how money is spent.

To achieve this, I am proposing a Councillor Priority fund. This will be £15,000 a year for each councillor this year and next.

If successful, I would like to see the fund grow to give greater decision making to local members as they understand their divisions the best.

I would encourage members to work with others in their locality. Perhaps they could find match funding to gain greater spending power.

I know that residents are concerned about highways so that may be where most of the funds will be spent.

But the money could also be used for day centres, community bus projects, children's centres, village hall or homelessness projects.

It will be the members who make the decisions, in consultation with their communities.

I also propose to commit £25,000 on improving partnership working with parishes and town councils, which already do so much in their communities. Together, we can do more.

Finally, there will be £30,000 set aside for World War One commemorations to mark the centenary of the Armistice in 1918. I welcome views on how that money can be most appropriately spent.

THE LAST DOMAIN

Encounters with two recent visitors to Cassington led me to mention the excavations to the east of our village. They were astonished to learn about the settlements from the Neolithic period, almost 6,000 years ago.

Those of us who were living hereabouts in 2005 had the opportunity to attend the Open Day and to see first-hand some of the results of the excavations. This followed the publication, in 2004, by Oxford Archaeology of the three 'monographs' which may have been overlooked by villagers. This monograph related to the medieval and Saxon settlements in the landscape between Yarnton and Cassington. Thus, the first to be published relates to the nearest period to our own, although even so from the fifth century AD to the post-medieval era. In 2011 came the second monograph covering the Iron Age and Roman Period. In the recent past the series was completed by a third volume – on the Neolithic and Bronze Age settlement and landscape; it has a publication date of 2016 but has only just become available.

All three volumes, under the general editorship of Dr Gill Hey who led the excavations, are written in a lucid, very approachable style and include many illustrations and maps. The later, more technical sections are wonderfully detailed for the professional archaeologist but the early chapters are well within the scope of the general reader. These are, however, not your typical library books. Monograph 39 alone weighs 3.25kgs / 7 lbs and has 776 pages, so it is hardly bedtime reading!

To the consternation of West Oxfordshire residents, each volume is entitled "Yarnton", yet the back cover clearly

states "a rich, pre-historic landscape was unexpectedly revealed on the Thames floodplain (on the gravel terrace) during investigations in advance of the gravel extraction in the parishes of Yarnton and Cassington". More than one third of the excavated site lies within the present parish, and the 2005 extension is unquestionably in Cassington. The latter is more significant for the late Bronze Age settlement as the remains were more evident and ordered than elsewhere to the east and the excavations of the 1990s; chapter 2 of Monograph 39 focuses on this site. The early settlers moved around, unconcerned about the right to roam – which means little to the present landowners either.

There are many aspects of the three monographs to admire but two final observations must suffice. First, the beautifully presented illustrations remind us how wooded the whole area was before clearance for the settlement. Secondly, there is no chance of seeing the site now. Much of the area has been used for landfill or left as a huge lake, which may one day, one hopes, be opened to bird watchers, walkers and others with an eye to our historical roots. For the time being – short of hiring a drone – we must rely on the written accounts.

We should be grateful for the publications by Oxford Archaeology and to the library service for making available (in Witney, Oxford or Kidlington) two of the three volumes. One must add that the sum of £29.95 for the latest title is not exorbitant by today's standards – less than the cost of two hard-backed novels. Let us be proud of our heritage and admire our distant forbears for their ingenuity in their land use.

Chairman's Report to the AGM

2017 was a year on the 'up' for the hall. Bookings were up, our income was up, our costs were up, and our net balance was up too. So all in all, another successful vear. Many thanks to all our users, our donors, and our hard working team of committee members who make it happen. The hall continues to be a very popular community venue and a great asset for the village.

Our income from hall lettings for the year was up by almost 3% at £14,528 (£14,132 in 2016), continuing the trend back to our 2014 high point of £14,928. Our revenue from fund raising events was up by an amazing 44% at £3,854 (£2,673 in 2016). As well as providing a popular service for the village, our events also make a profit, which is good news. Our income from donations was up by over four times at £982 (£210 in 2016) but still below our recent record of £1,360 in 2015. So together with bank interest and Gift Aid, our total income for the vear was up by almost 14% at £19,415 (£17,057 in 2016).

We spent more this year too, and our expenditure before depreciation was up by over 13% at £13,655 (£12,033 in 2016). After allowing for annual depreciation of £2,964, that leaves net incoming resources of £2,796, up 36% on the £2,060 net result in 2016. So in cash terms we again improved our healthy position and finished well up on the year.

Although we had no major refurbishment costs in 2017, there was a steady stream of spending on minor repairs and maintenance, week in and week out behind the scenes. In total we spent £1,946, that's 89% up on the £1,029 spent on repairs and renewals in 2016. Our

many thanks are due to expert volunteers within the village who helped to fix things without charge during the year, in particular Dan Bakewell, Marcus Copelin, Graham Mills, Matthew Terry and Paul Woolford.

Our hard-working volunteer trustees for the year were Ruth Bakewell (Events), Penny Burroughs (Secretary), Lorna Mills (Treasurer), Frank Nelson (Buildings), Bryan Partridge (Vice-Chair), Carol Mitchell (Parish Council), Bridget Sherlock, Malcolm Teal and Di Williams. During the year we sadly said goodbye to Kathryn Teal who had been hall cleaner since 2008. Thank you again Kathryn for all your hard work over the years, it was greatly appreciated. But we were delighted to welcome Rebecca Copelin as our new cleaner, and a massive thank you as always to our dedicated and long-serving booking secretary Nicky Copelin. Great thanks are due to the whole team.

The village hall is a registered charity and relies totally on income from bookings and donations to keep the place going. We receive no state subsidies and depend on the goodwill, time and energy of many volunteers. The hall is effectively owned by the village and run by the village for the benefit of the village. We always welcome new volunteers to come and join us. so if you're interested please do get in touch.

We launched the Patrons of Cassington Village Hall over a year ago to help us continue to plan for the future, and the scheme has started to work well. If you value the hall at the heart of our community and wish to see it kept in the best possible condition for everyone to enjoy, both today and tomorrow, then please consider joining us.
