A CALL TO ACTION (and a fitter community)

Cassington Sports and Social really need your support to help us maintain and improve the facilities at the Elms Road Playing Fields.

Two years ago, together with the support of the Parish Council, we upgraded the playing surface of the tennis courts to enable a greater variety of sport to be played on it. This new Multi-Use-Games-Area (MUGA) surface is suitable for 5-a-side football, tennis, hockey, netball, etc., but it comes at a cost. The surface will need replacing in 13 years time, so we are now having to set aside £2,075 per year to be able to fund this when the time comes. We are also setting aside £700 per year for the playing field grass mower for when it too needs replacing.

In addition we have annual expenses totalling around $\pounds4,000$ per year for insurance, electricity, water, floodlights, licences, mower servicing, diesel, etc. just to keep the playing field mown and the facilities open and available for anyone to use.

At the moment we receive income from teams from outside the village paying to hire the MUGA and the football/

cricket pitches. Tennis Club members also contribute a membership fee. This goes towards our expenses, but we still have to fund raise for the majority of what we need.

We are looking to replace the summer months tennis membership with an annual household membership of £50. All the money this raises will go towards meeting our annual expenses, and will enable members to use the MUGA throughout the year, at no additional expense. Even if you are not particularly sporty we would love you to join and help support this valuable village asset. We will continue to fundraise for necessary improvements to the Pavilion, and additional playground and outdoor gym equipment.

Please help us to keep this wonderful amenity available for future generations.

CALL TO ACTION – final few days to free the airspace

The current deadline to submit comments to the CAA is 5th April, but due to the parish council not been informed for the airspace changes, we will struggle to get any other comments in on time. We hope they might extend the deadline in view of their amazing inefficiency. Jane Randle, a Cassington resident, (jane6.randle@btinternet.com) will be available after the 2nd April and happy to advise/help. The more responses we have the more likely it is that changes will be made.

We need to consider noise: increase due to change of airspace from Class G, to Class D: between Cassington and the Hanboroughs; overlap of Brize Norton and Kidlington due to traffic overhead Cassington; expansion of London Oxford Airport should they be granted all the airspace they have requested – runway extension, more larger commercial aircraft. The requested Class D airspace is such that corridors of (Glass G airspace open to all) between London Heathrow Airspace (Class D) and Brize Norton and Kidlington, used by a large number of light aircraft, gliders, microlights etc will be come more dangerous with increased risk of collisions. Please do send your comments.

Reflections of a Retiring Headteacher

I have been going through a succession of last events and activities as I head towards my retirement as headteacher of St Peter's at Easter. This will be my last CAWN entry after nearly eight years of meeting that deadline of 19th of each month. Surprisingly I have not found this an onerous task! In fact at times it has been particularly joyous as I relive the excitement of events that have taken place that month. I thought that as this is my last article I would look back at some of the events over the past 8 years and over 70 article to recall some of the most significant events.

My very first CAWN article was about the older children's residential visit to Yenworthy in 2010. I particularly remember this as one of the classteachers broke her ankle on the moor and had to go to hospital, subsequently being off work for six weeks. Music, and singing in particular, has always been a passion of mine and in November 2011 I took the school choir to the Albert Hall in London to sing at the Youth Prom. It was a wonderful experience for everyone involved including the parents who hired a coach to take them to London. I remember sitting in the choir area by the organ in the Albert Hall and watching the children's faces as they took part in the singing. Singing 'Land of Hope and Glory' at the end of the concert was truly special.





One of the strengths of this school is the involvement of governors and over the years I have worked with many supportive and generous people. Every year the governors join us for our Christmas Dinner and I have reprinted this photo of Rev'd Morey Andrews tucking into the turkey in December 2013. The governors are the unsung heros of the school, and

considering they are all volunteers, work tirelessly, attending meetings, briefings, training, doing learning walks, talking to staff, talking to the head, talking to parents. I would like to say thank you to them all.

You may spot Kevin Hinton in the next photo taken from Book Week in March 2013 - he's the Big Bad Wolf. I did say that governors got involved! You may also spot me dressed as the wicked queen with Mrs Howe and Ms Bennett. Staff here have always thrown themselves into the challenges that have come along whether dressing up or improving the learning in the school. Again I have been blessed to work with teachers and support staff that have given unstintingly, following my vision of a happy, friendly, learning school with a strong Christian ethos.





2014 was a very significant year for us with the Nursery Unit opening in March and becoming part of the Eynsham Partnership Academy in June. Both events took a great deal of hard work to bring them to fruition. The opening of the Nursery Unit was particularly wonderful with the Bishop of Dorchester officially performing the cermony and blessing. There was also a huge cake, balloons and lots of singing from the school choir.

In September 2015 we launched our new set of 12 values with input from children, staff, governors and parents. Each half term one of the set of values is used as the theme for our Collective Worship, positive behaviour management and in the classes to reinforce our ethos. Having now completed the two year cycle I can say that the impact has been significant. The children nominate each other as having shown the value as part of our Celebration Assembly on Friday morning and there is never a shortage of children wanting to show that they understand how to live the value. We were incredibly pleased to achieve an outstanding grade in October 2015 following our

Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools visit. One statement in the report made all the hard work worthwhile: 'The statement in the aims 'Above all, make the best of the gifts God has given you as a unique individual' is meaningful in this school; it is not just words. Teachers have a strong shared vision based on this aim and they translate this into care and consideration for all pupils. The aim has encouraged all teachers to work together to provide a rich academic curriculum as well as many other activities designed to support pupils' personal development.'

In 2016 the school's results in Key Stage One and Two were above National, as were the phonics results and in April 2017 following the OFSTED inspection we achieved a good overall with outstanding personal development, welfare and behaviour. The report that followed was very positive and, for me and the school community, the confirmation of a successful school.

I have tried to keep this short, and there are many more events that I could include, but I would like to finish by saying thank you to all of the people of Cassington who, over the years, have supported the school and myself.

Our treasurer Sheila Nelson was able to deliver a positive report on our finances and after discussing other business we voted in the new committee and Glenda Appleton agreed to continue as our president. UP DATE ON A40 IMPROVEMENTS AND WEST OXFORDSHIRE GARDEN VILLAGE (near Eynsham)

The Oxfordshire Growth Board has welcomed the Government's confirmation that two of the county's bids to the Housing and Infrastructure Fund (HIF) are progressing through to co-development.

Detailed business plans will now be developed for the £300 million of transport infrastructure investment that will help bring forward the Didcot Garden Town and West Oxfordshire Garden Village, **near Eynsham**.

If agreed, the investment would substantially improve the county's transport infrastructure, including a new river crossing at Culham and an upgrade of the A40. The improved infrastructure would enable the development of new living and employment areas using sustainable design principles, including improved cycling provision.

Oxfordshire County Council, the county's transport authority, submitted the funding applications last September as part of a package of infrastructure investment needed to allow the development of new garden towns and villages across the county.

The announcement comes on top of the recently agreed £215 million Oxfordshire Housing & Growth Deal, which will fund transport improvements and more affordable housing.

Didcot Garden Town – £171m is sought for transport improvements including a Didcot Science Bridge and A4130 dual carriageway, a new river crossing at Culham and Clifton Hampden Bypass. This would support the delivery of over 22,000 homes in Didcot,

Culham, Harwell and Berinsfield. Additionally up to £70m of cycle and other sustainable transport improvements are proposed for inclusion in the bid plan.

West Oxfordshire Garden Village – £135m is sought for further upgrades to the A40, building on existing schemes and based on the approved A40 Long Term Strategy including development of the Rapid Transit network and additional highway capacity on A40 transport corridor. This would support the delivery of over 10,000 homes in Witney & Carterton, and around Eynsham.

The North of Oxford bid for infrastructure to support the delivery of 5,570 homes in Woodstock, Begbroke/Yarnton and the Northern Gateway, was not successful **at this stage**.

The Oxfordshire Growth Board comprises the six councils: Cherwell District Council, Oxford City Council, Oxfordshire County Council, South Oxfordshire District Council, Vale of White Horse District Council and West Oxfordshire District Council, together with and the county's Local Enterprise Partnership (OxLEP).


