The benefits of exercising as a family

Getting children interested in exercise can be difficult and establishing healthy habits in early life are vital. Being physically active as a family can be not only beneficial for children but parents too.

Establishes healthy habits

Shocking figures have highlighted that there are now 124 million obese children worldwide. Children develop habits early in life and most often than not these will be taken into adulthood, therefore the earlier healthy behaviours are established the better. Parents who encourage children to exercise as a family are minimising sedentary behaviours of watching TV or playing video games. Children who have had exercise as a fun part of their everyday life are more likely to exercise when they are adults.

Increasing activity levels

Exercising as a family will get everyone moving and will be beneficial to the whole family's health. According to the NHS physical activity on a daily basis is important for the healthy growth and development of babies, toddlers and pre-schoolers. Children aged 5 to 18-years old need to be doing at least 60 minutes of physical activity every day and

Narrow vocabulary 'hits pupils' grades'

Monosyllabic adolescents may be nothing new, but the latest research suggests a big chunk of them do not know enough words to do well at school.

According to academics, four out of 10 pupils in their first year of secondary school have such a limited vocabulary that it is affecting their learning.

Many teachers from the 800 secondaries involved in the Oxford University Press research say the problem is worsening.

They blame the "word gap" on too little reading for pleasure.

Studies suggest breadth of vocabulary is strongly influenced by the number of words a child comes into contact with on a daily basis.

This includes conversations with parents, siblings and friends, as well as what they read.

The report, focusing on schools in England, says the number of pupils with limited vocabulary remains "stubbornly high" across all age groups, despite a range of programmes addressing literacy.

And 80% of the teachers surveyed said children with limited vocabulary would find it "extremely challenging" to understand test papers.

A very high proportion of the teachers said the word gap held

on three days a week, it should include exercises for strong muscles and bones. Adults aged 19-64 should try to be active daily in order to remain healthy and should be doing at least 150 minutes of moderate aerobic activity. Exercise is essential if you want to live a long healthy life and is key to preventing numerous diseases such as heart disease, diabetes, cancer, dementia and obesity.

Improves communication

Exercising as a family can mean you will be working as a team, therefore you will need to communicate and work together. Children may also be more willing to talk and be open about their lives when being active as a family. It will help to strengthen your relationship and build happy memories.

Provides fun-filled family time

Exercise can be seen as a chore; therefore, it is important that children view physical activity as a positive fun activity and exercising as a family is the perfect opportunity to do so. Children view parents as their role models and constantly watch their every move, so exercising together can make for fun family bonding. Whether it is swimming, playing tennis, trampolining, football or basketball, you can make it as fun and silly as you want.

back progress in not just English (91%), but in history (90%), geography (86%) and religious studies (78%).

Lionel Bolton, of the Oxford University Press, said: "Whether a child is 11 years old and in Year 7, or 16 years old and in Year 11, if there are words in a task that they do not understand, they will struggle to complete the task.

"The 11-year-old is likely to be able to ask for help or access a dictionary; a 16 year old in their GCSE exam cannot.

"And if they do understand all the words in the task, if their vocabulary is lower than their age, their written response may be less articulate, less effective, and ultimately achieve a lower mark.

"This of course is not new - it has ever been thus.

"But with the changes that have been brought in by the new GCSE exams - increased rigour, removal of controlled assessment, and tiering in most subjects - the vocabulary challenges posed are even more pronounced."

Geoff Barton, general secretary of the Association of School and College Leaders - and an English teacher for 32 years said: "In reality the word gap will depend on your circumstances rather than your choices - your home, your family, the richness of language and relations, the presence of books and conversations, the habits you form as you grow up. "These are things largely beyond our control."

Democracy – what does that mean to you? Some say there a four key elements: (1) a political system for choosing and replacing the government through free and fair elections; (2) the active participation of the people, as citizens, in politics and civic life; (3) protection of the human rights of all citizens; (4) a rule of law, in which the laws and procedures apply equally to all citizens. Democracy contrasts with forms of government where power is either held by an individual, as in an absolute monarchy, or where power is held by a small number of individuals, as in an oligarchy. Nevertheless, these oppositions are now ambiguous because contemporary governments have mixed democratic, oligarchic, and monarchic elements. For some democracy focuses rather on opportunities for the people to control their leaders and to oust them without the need for a revolution.

To volunteer is to choose to act in recognition of a need, with an attitude of social responsibility and without concern for monetary profit, going beyond one's basic obligations.

But how do we hold these groups / individuals accountable for their actions or lack thereof? The answer is to be active members and / or to attend public meetings and / or to openly debate successes and failures. If this publication can play a role in that, do let me know your (constructive) thoughts and views.

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The Lord is my shepherd

I recently was privileged to hear an elderly and gracious North Korean lady named Hea Woo.

Hea Woo spoke about her persecution as a Christian in N Korea (through an interpreter) and answering questions about her former life in her home country.

Hea Woo's mother was a secret Christian. Even to own a Bible in N Korea is to risk internment or worse. People having a Bible often have to keep them secretly buried in the fields and not in the house but most do not have a bible at all. Hea Woo had copied out her bible by hand.

Life in the rural areas of N Korea is hard and poor. One of Hea Woo's adult daughters died of starvation during a famine. Her husband became a Christian AND was a pastor but was arrested and detained in a labour camp where he suffered torture and hard labour. Conditions were truly terrible where many died from malnutrition, forced labour, torture and/or illness. Bodies of the prisoners are left for days. When cremated their ashes were scattered on the paths where the inmates had to walk to their daily labours. Hea Woo's husband died in the camp.


Hea Woo was separated from her children but escaped to China. However, she was repatriated to N Korea and, like her husband before, sent to a labour camp. Conditions in the women's camp were as disgusting as the men's but she managed to survive and help other women in the camp. Some of the women would risk their lives by secretly meeting with Hea Woo in the "toilet" area to worship and pray. When asked what kept her going during those terrible years she replied her memorised passages from the Bible and in particular the 23rd Psalm ("The Lord is my shepherd" - see below in Korean).

Hea Woo stood and led us in singing "Amazing Grace", she in Korean and us in English, and gave a small bow. Such a gentle and humble women but a spiritual hero.

Hea Woo and other persecuted Christians are supported by the international Christian charity "Open Doors" whose UK base is in Witney. You can find more about Open Doors and Hea Woo's story on-line. www.opendoorsuk.org

New pothole fixing machine ensures rural pothole problems don't Drag-on

Another pothole-blasting monster has taken to the roads in Oxfordshire is joining two others already patrolling the county's rural routes.

Oxfordshire County Council and their contractors, Skanska, have taken delivery of another Dragon patching machine which uses a combination of compressed air, heat, bitumen and chippings to repair holes.

Quicker and cheaper repairs

Because it can repair a number of holes at the same time, and much faster, it can carry out repairs far more cheaply than before. A Dragon Patcher fixed hole costs just under £14 (m2 repair) whereas one fixed using conventional methods on a non-rural road costs, on average, just above £60.

On a good day a Dragon can repair up to 200 potholes and that, combined with the low road repair costs, means that the investment is a sound one.

Report problems that you find

The Dragon's workload is based on information picked up by the county council's road inspections and problems that have been reported online via Fix My Street.

You can report a range of problems from potholes to damaged signs via

https://fixmystreet.oxfordshire.gov.uk/

Every report is investigated and repairs ordered where necessary. Things that you report on rural roads could lead to a visit from the Dragon, although teams using more conventional repair methods also carry out work depending on what is required.

I recently came across a writer called Mark Boyle who runs a series on The Guardian's website called 'Life without technology'. It's a fascinating insight into what it's like for someone who suddenly chose to up and leave the Information Age altogether - yet it's one that many of you live today, given the relative youthfulness of Facebook et al. Now, Mark's decision to eradicate technology from his life entirely does seem quite extreme. Even my grandparents, who understandably wouldn't have a clue how to like a post on Instagram or swipe right on Tinder, watch the television most nights. It's obvious that TV's can be entertaining, educational, and beneficial to our lives in other ways. I enjoy going around my grandparent's house when I'm in Oxford so we can scoff at Cowboy Builders, roll our eyes at crime on Police, Camera, Action, or watch some old guy with curly hair plant some seeds on a gardening programme.

I like the idea of doing something like what Mark does, but it struck me just how strong his willpower must be when he wrote that he couldn't even watch Match of the Day or find out what the football scores were, if he remembered that it was a Saturday in the first place. I'm afraid, that is a step too far for me.

If a life without technology is a life without football then I'm going to have to make some amendments to this project. When Oxford United appoint a new manager, I want to know immediately who it is, rather than waiting in the dark for 9 weeks becau... oh. That actually happened anyway.

OXFORD Airport is celebrating 10 years of growth with plans to open a new Premier Inn at the airfield.

The privately-owned airport near Kidlington, also known as London Oxford Airport, is ranked the fifth busiest UK business airport and among the top 20 in Europe.

It is among a handful of UK business airports that have seen consistent growth after the financial crash of 2007 and a new hangar is about to be completed to cater for increasing demand.

Short-haul flights from Oxford to Edinburgh could be reintroduced if passenger facilities at Oxford are improved.

The Premier Inn chain's involvement was confirmed earlier this year and it is expected that a 101-bedroom hotel will be built at the entrance to the airport.

Hotel guests are expected to include catering for air crew, owners and pilots bringing aircraft in for maintenance, and friends and families visiting air cadets at resident pilot training schools CAE Oxford Aviation Academy and Airways Aviation.

The hotel is scheduled to open in summer next year.

James Dillon-Godfray, head of business development at Oxford Airport, said London Luton Airport has kept its crown as the number one airport for business aviation movements but has become 'increasingly squeezed for slots, to the benefit of airports like us'.

He added: "With night flights constrained at key peer airports we can still operate to midnight seven days a week."

The airport is responding to demand for more home-based and visiting business jets with the completion of a new 16,000 sq ft hangar. The hangar doors were fitted last week and space is Unfortunately, even if I were to commit to such a lifestyle, with the industry that I am working in it's impossible to avoid technology. But does it really help you sleep at night knowing that you've seen a video of a dog looking cute in a laundry bin? My Facebook news feed is pretty much You've Been Framed on a laptop, and I certainly don't wake up wanting to tune in to Harry Hill's irritating voice. Not to mention, Facebook is becoming more and more dangerous in an era when Zuckerberg and co can use it to harvest your data and manipulate public voting.

Don't take this as me suggesting that all technology is bad. Advances in technology to help with medicine are a god-send, as are dishwashers. In my student house, we don't have a dishwasher. We have to do it the old way. I hate the idea of it but for some reason it sometimes feels quite therapeutic doing it. But I'd never choose to do it over having a machine do it for me. The point I'm making is that certain technologies have unquestionably improved the quality and convenience of our lives – they free up time and energy that allow us to do other things. But how we spend that free time is how other devices such as the iPhone can be damaging.

Anyway, if you'll forgive me, I'm going to end this column so I can go and do nothing because it's too cold and snowy outside and those pointless dog videos won't watch themselves.

already being allocated.

Mr Dillon-Godfray added: "With the continuing demand for space we are working on plans for the next major expansion to the north of the site, fulfilling the need for aircraft residency - there are about 25 business jets residing at the airport."

Oxford Airport is owned by the Reuben Brothers. Investment activities include private equity, real estate ownership and development.

In December it emerged that flights across Europe could soon be a reality from the airport but only if it is allowed to expand into the Green Belt.

Airport operators said short-haul flights to Edinburgh, Dublin, Belfast, Amsterdam and Glasgow, as well as weekend charters to skiing holiday destinations, were viable.

It comes as joint proposals from RAF Brize Norton and Oxford Airport are in motion to triple the 'controlled airspace' in the area.

The plan has proved controversial, with a petition launched against what many amateur pilots say is an 'enormous threat to free flying'.

Oxford Aviation Services, which runs Oxford Airport, conceded the Oxford-Edinburgh route was the only one likely to be reinstated unless passenger facilities were allowed to expand.

Oxfordshire Growth Board chairman Bob Price said it was time Oxford had an airport to match its 'global significance' and backed the expansion.

Commercial services to Jersey, Dublin and Edinburgh have flown from Oxford over the past decade but proved unsuccessful.

Oxford Airport is about the same size as London City Airport, which flies short-haul journeys to Amsterdam, Zurich, Geneva and Dublin and takes passengers as far as New York.





Robert Courts MP - update

I greatly enjoyed my recent visit to the new Cassington Green Gym. I was very pleased to see this fantastic community project, which I am sure will be an enduring gift to the local area – fitness in the beautiful countryside!

Many of you have contacted me about the condition of roads in West Oxfordshire, and I am very aware of the damage that has been done to our roads during these past winter months. I therefore welcome the Government's recent announcement that local roads badly affected by winter weather will benefit from a further £100 million to help repair any potholes and other storm damage. This means £1.8m will be available for Oxfordshire to repair potholes; when coupled with other funding announcements, this means we will have nearly £3m to fix our roads. Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) are working hard, using this funding to patch the areas that need it most, and I welcome the good work they have done so far. Nevertheless, I know there is more to do - but this is certainly a large step in the right direction.
