Have your say on the new Garden Village

Residents, businesses and organisations are being offered the chance to have their say on a proposed garden village set to be built to the north of the A40 near Eynsham.

A consultation has been launched focusing on key issues such as transport, housing, jobs and the environment which will form part of the Oxfordshire Cotswolds Garden Village Area Action Plan.

The proposals were initially discussed last summer as part of the Local Plan examination. The Planning Inspector has since informed the Council that, subject to some further changes, the Local Plan is likely to be approved. The Garden Village Area Action Plan is the next step in the process.

Cllr Jeff Haine, Cabinet Member for Housing and Development, said: "The creation of a new garden village is a first for West Oxfordshire and we want to hear as many views as possible on this important development.

"This initial consultation will help shape key opportunities for the site as well as tackling potential issues at a very early stage."

The consultation will run for six weeks from

Oxfordshire Cotswolds Garden Village

A key element of the West Oxfordshire Local Plan 2031 is the establishment of a new garden village to the north of the A40 near Eynsham.

The new garden village will make a major contribution towards providing much-needed homes and jobs in a high quality living environment. It will also unlock funds to improve infrastructure and boost the case for improvements to local transport links, including upgrades to the A40.

It will be a new standalone settlement, self-contained with its own village facilities, such as schools, community resources and employment opportunities, whilst taking proper account of environmental considerations and planned infrastructure improvements.

The initial garden village proposals set out in the Local

22 June until 3 August and will be taken into account as the proposals are worked up in more detail ahead of further consultation in the autumn.

As part of the process, council officers will be on hand to answer questions and provide further information at the following exhibitions in Eynsham:

Plan include a new science business park which will give local people an alternative to driving to work in Oxford. In addition, the nearby Hanborough railway station together with a new Park and Ride facility to the north of Eynsham (expected to be open by 2020) will give people an alternative to using their cars.

Area Action Plan

Working closely with a range of stakeholders - local residents, parishes, land owners, developers and specialists in environment and heritage protection - the WODC are preparing an 'Area Action Plan' (AAP) for the garden village. This will set out how the new development will be taken forward, what it will look like and how it will function.

The garden village is based on a 'working assumption' of around **2,200 new homes** although more detailed planning is needed to determine the most appropriate number and type of homes that should be built.

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What will you do on 15th July?

Some decisions are hard.

As you may know Sunday 15th July is the date of the final of The World Cup but also men's finals day at Wimbledon. Which do you watch? (If you are not a sports fan then I must apologies as this dilemma might seem trivial!)

However, the Tennis should start at 1.00pm and the Football 4.00pm so it might be possible to watch men's final and the world cup live. You could of course watch one and record the other (or use "BBC IPlayer" or "TVCatchup" etc to view one later).

With today's technology we get a second chance to view, and more than that, we get 3rd, 4th or more chances. There is no need to miss out – unless you choose to.

Jane and I use "BBC IPlayer" a lot but there is a catch – programmes are only available for a limited time. So it is possible to miss out, if you leave things too late.

It can be like that with spiritual choices. One thing

that can focus your mind on spiritual things is a funeral, particularly as you get older and close friends and relative move on. The realisation of our own mortality can come sharply into focus as those of our own age (or younger) die.

Other major world religions profess a need for us to work our way to salvation. Only the Christian faith professes a "second chance" (and even a 3rd or 4th chance) by God's grace, through Christ's sacrifice. But, because we are mortal there is a time limit, a decision has to be made.

Some choices can seem hard and stressful but in Chapter 11 verse 28 of Matthew's Gospel Jesus is recorded as inviting all to choose him:

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Page 13 in your Jubilee New Testament)

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"A job done well"

I hope as many folk as possible will read this Ramblings, you will then see the problem that the Parish Council has in dealing with Thames Water Authority. We at the Mill have a big problem that they have caused us.

When they were in charge of the rivers, Thames Water Authority were going to alter the flows on the Mill ponds and to put a water flow recorder in. They got the front mill pond done first – the flow was done on the wrong side, which I pointed out at the time. They said that was how the architect did it... that pond has silted up.

The back pond, I was not sure if this was right. We found out the next winter – it washed a hole in the far bank and flooded all the meadows. They piled the bank with steel, back filled. The next winter it bounced off the piles and washed a hole our side – within 15 feet of the Mill building. They tried to make me cure it. I had a go at the top man, who sent someone to see. He was walking round with a clipboard, so I went and said 'What are you up to?'. He said it was in answer to my letter and that I was right. They came and put 5 piles in, only to return and put 6 more in. They put 50 tons of crushed stone in behind all this. We now have a Mill pond full of rubbish with trees 12 inches across growing out of it instead of a nice clear pond. The piles are leaking now.

I will say the pipeline did earn me some money. I had to tow the artics backward, 6 one at a time loaded with pipes up the lane to the top of the hill. The crane took them off.

Now the problem is – who will put it all right? Thames Water, as far as I can see, has been taken over by an Australian bank who seem to have stripped all the assets. Where you go for help I don't know. Sorry Della Thompson I am so negative.

I know it took a long time to get money from them for putting the Alms Houses right.

I keep seeing all the moans about road repairs, not a word about river maintenance.

Here is another problem that will flood many houses if we get a very wet season. Water by-passes won't cure it. Dredging will. I know it will be costly, but if there is no room in the river for water, it will spread.

A bit different Ramblings. You will need to say a prayer to get out of trouble. The powers that be don't seem to understand... I expect they will get OBEs, etc. Sorry, I am being nasty.



Will you accept the challenge?

Hugh Warwick's HedgeOx campaign aims to save spiny species Naomi Herring @OxMailNaomiH

A RALLYING cry from Oxford's very own 'Mr Hedgehog' has gone out on behalf of the declining spiny species.

Hugh Warwick, also known as Hedgehog Hugh, recently launched his new HedgeOX campaign to save the popular prickly creatures.

The miniature mammal's numbers have plummeted across the UK in recent years as its hedgerow habitats have been lost but Mr Warwick hopes to reverse the trend in Oxfordshire with the help of 'hedgehog heroes' pledging to do their bit.

Mr Warwick, from East Oxford, said: "We know that urban hedgehog numbers are down by 30 per cent in the past 17 years, and that for rural hedgehogs it is even worse, with the population down by 50 to 75 per cent.

"Hedgehog Street has been helping urban hedgehogs and there it looks like the decline for them is levelling off, but rural hedgehogs present a whole new set of complications that we are now looking at more closely."

Ecologist and author Mr Warwick began working with hedgehogs more than 30 years ago including his efforts with the Hedgehog Street campaign – a conservation effort between the British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) and the People's Trust for Endangered Species. HedgeOX will focus some of that work in the county in a bid to halt the increasing fragmentation of populations.

The campaign is being funded by both BHPS and The Felix Byam Shaw Foundation which was set up in memory of the North Oxford schoolboy.

Felix passed away in July 2014 after contracting meningitis, his family and friends have continued his legacy through the foundation supporting many local causes in honour of his love of nature – especially hedgehogs.

Mr Warwick said: "Oxford has been my home now for nearly 25 years now and the county has a wonderfully diverse set of potentially hedgehog-friendly habitats, yet the population has fallen as much here as anywhere else. I want to reverse that."

The campaign is calling for 'hedgehog heroes' to work with neighbours to make a 'hedgehog highway', cutting CD disk-sized holes in fences to allow hedgehogs to pass.

Farmers and gardeners are also being encouraged to plant more hedges and allow the ones already there the space to grow into a hedgehog habitat.

As part of HedgeOX Mr Warwick will also be running a Hedgehog Roadshow touring village halls, groups and clubs and teaching communities about how they can help.

The campaign was officially launched at Oxford University Natural History Museum on 12 June backed by poet Pam Ayers, from Stanford in the Vale, who read her latest work The Last Hedgehog.
