Cassington War Memorials G Walker and W Walker

A family historian, assisting a family research a relative who lost his life in the Great War, started to

look into the story of 44483 Pte T.W.Walker of 2/5th Bn, Gloucestershire Regiment who lost his life on 25/4/1918, aged just 18. He has no known grave and is commemorated on panel 63 of the Memorial to the Missing at Dud Corner Cemetery, Loos, France.

More research showed there was an error in the records of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) regarding this soldier. In fact he was 44483 Pte William Thomas Walker. He is the W.Walker you have on the Cassington village war memorials.

His brother, George, is also listed on the Cassington war memorials. These men were the sons of Alfred and Matilda Walker of Church Cottage, Cassington. The Parish Council have been sent a copy of this family's entry on the 1911 Census (1911 WT Census). George was killed on 28/4/1917 with the 2/4th Ox and Buck LI and he is commemorated on the Memorial to the Missing at Thiepval, Somme. One person missing from this census return is another sibling, Alice. Matilda was a widow as the time of the death of her two sons.

This family historian, David Whithorn, has been in contact with the CWGC. They have examined the documentation and rationale for the case submitted to get their records changed to correct this error. In late September David was advised the GWGC have accepted his evidence and their database will now be updated with the correct information for William Thomas Walker. Moreover, as this error also carried across to the engraving of his name on the Memorial to the Missing at Loos, the CWGC have made plans to have the relevant stone re-engraved with his correct details.

This means that potential family members and other researchers will be able to find William in the records and indeed visit the place he will be now rightly



commemorated.

In the CWGC's defence they checked their records to find they had contacted William's next of kin, his mother Matilda, at the time to ensure they had his details correct. There had been no response. They had proceeded with the (unfortunate erroneous) information they had.

David writes "As you might imagine, today has been a very rewarding day indeed for me, hence my desire to contact you with this news. I have not been to Cassington, but this looks to a particularly lovely village from internet pictures I have seen. I have not been able to determine where Church House was, nor whether there remains any members of this Walker family left in Cassington today (it would be lovely if there was!)".

Hopefully, this may serve to increase villagers' awareness of the part men and women from Cassington played in the Great War and the sacrifices made, especially as we are now so close to the centenary of the Armistice in November.

Know your plastics

Residents in West Oxfordshire are being urged swot up on their plastics in a bid to boost recycling rates in the District.

With a greater public awareness of the devastating effects of plastic pollution, the Council has launched a dedicated guide highlighting what can and cannot be recycled.

Plastics that can be recycled include pots, food trays and bottles, most of which are in everyday use in the kitchen and bathroom.

But about 18 per cent of what is collected in the Council's blue-lidded recycling bins is non-recyclable with one of the most common incorrect items being flimsy plastics such as carrier bags and cling-film.

Cllr Steve Good, Cabinet Member for the Environment, said: "Knowing which plastics can be recycled is confusing, but it is important that we get it right. As well as wanting to



recycle as much as possible, there is a cost of placing items in the wrong bin as they have to be removed at the processing plant and this often done manually.

"We are keen to build on the momentum created by powerful TV programmes such as Blue Planet II which have shown how damaging plastic pollution can be. They have

motivated many more people to care about the environment in a way they never have before."

Cassington W.I.

Our first meeting after the summer break was delivered by Arthur Harold a man who joined the customs service sixty years ago. As you can probably imagine it was a fascinating talk, hearing about the various ways people try to smuggle items into the country. He worked for many years with American service men at Upper Heyford, they had a monthly duty free allowance from the P. X. (the equivalent of our Naffi for our service personnel) for cigars, cigarettes and alcohol. They would sell them or use them as payment for things like garage bills etc. the mark-up on booze and cigars in particular could be eye-watering. Anything confiscated by customs officials had to be destroyed. He also had worked at Brize Norton for many years.



Parish Council News

September 2018

Horsemere Lane Closure

Prices have now been received for the physical elements that will form part of closure. OCC will close the lane after consultation with the proposed bus lane and park and ride. The lane could be closed earlier if residents in Bell lane and Horsemere lane meet the cost of the physical elements. However earlier closure would have to be in tandem with extensive improvements at the traffic lights to accommodate the extra traffic generated. The Parish Council are in communication with OCC on the subject.

Speed watch

The Parish Council are going to get volunteers involved shortly in monitoring speed through the village.

War Memorial repairs

The Parish Council hope to have the work started shortly and finished in time for Remembrance Sunday.

Benches on the Green.

The installation of the benches will start shortly.

Watermain flooding

The Parish Council have a meeting with Thames Water and Blenheim on the 21st September to establish what is to be done to protect the village from further breaks in the large watermains that run in the fields above the village. The Parish Council will report at our meeting in October the result of this meeting.

Fix My Street

Residents are reminded that blocked gullies, drains and potholes can be recorded on the OCC website at Fix My Street.

Neighbourhood Watch and Police presence in the village.

At our meeting in September this item was discussed with residents at some length. It was concluded that attempting to reach the police on 101 was a waste of time and this has been highlighted recently with crimes in the village. We are now being told by officers that they concur that this is the case and we should complain vigorously if we want change. The Parish Council will be taking this up with our MP to see if he can orchestrate a change. The Parish Council will have another item on the agenda to discuss this at our October meeting and would encourage villagers to attend. It is a very worrying situation.

Neighbourhood watch coordinators are currently preparing applications to make Cassington village a "NO COLD CALLING" area in an attempt to combat the recent problems with the "Nottingham Knockers".

Oxfordshire County Council sapling and plaque to commemorate end of World War 1

The Parish Council have ordered a sapling and plaque and with consultation decided to plant the sapling on the area of green between the school and village hall away from the larger trees.

It hoped to have an event for the planting on the sapling

The Parish Council are working closely with Sports and Social club on improvements and repairs to the pavilion. It is hoped that new windows and roof repairs can be ordered soon. Grants for play equipment are being coordinated and it is hoped that at least three pieces of equipment can be ordered soon. The Parish Council are grateful to Suzi Lewis for all the time she has spent getting the grants.

Robert Courts MP - October update

It is remarkable to think of the many ways technology has changed our lives; we rarely go a day without relying on our smartphones, computers, or even the technology in our cars to help us navigate the modern world. We have developed numerous forms of technology that have given us the ability to transform lives for the better, and in no field is this more abundantly clear than in healthcare. It is therefore important that digital technology plays a key role in the innovation of our NHS, driving the transformation needed to support our excellent NHS staff going forward.

In my response to the Oxfordshire health bosses' recent consultation, I made the case for greater use of technology in our healthcare. I therefore welcomed the Health Secretary's recent announcement that the Department for Health will be investing an extra £20.5 billion into the NHS, to ensure we have the means to harness the benefits of frontline healthcare technology. The first

example of this step forward will be the new NHS app; a project that will be piloted in five areas in England from next month, ahead of a national rollout in December. Using the app, patients will be able to book GP appointments, access the NHS 111 service and view their GP record – all in the palm of their hand.

Our local NHS services will benefit from this innovation, although this is by no means the only transformation I am campaigning for; I have pressed for closer working between health bosses and planning authorities. We live in a growing area, and our health services should be growing to match this need. For the first time, organised by me, health and planning authorities are working closely together to map future growth and need, to ensure that the crucial health services we need are provided at the same time as new homes. I will keep working to make this happen.




