The Mongol Rally 2019 The Caspian Three

We The Caspian Three, Kanhai Dalal, 21, (Rosehill), Toby Lindenbaum, 21, (Wheatley) and Chris Noton, 45, (Cassington) are doing an intercontinental drive called the Mongol Rally. But it will not be a comfortable trip – we will travel to Mongolia and Russia – via Europe, Turkey, Iran and the Stan's – in a 1.2 litre Nissan Micra which was given to us by a sponsor. The Mongol Rally is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity; we will experience cultures contrasting Europe in the west with the east. We will see some of the most beautiful landscapes and meet the most amazing people we're likely to ever meet.

The Mongol Rally is different to other rallies in that there is no set route nor support. Instead, participants decide how they will travel across Europe and Asia themselves. Teams who sign up for the rally must raise a minimum of £1,000 to participate. Half of the money goes to the rally's official charity, Coolearth, and the other half goes to a charity of the team's choice, in our case Oxford Mind.

Sponsors have donated a car, a car stereo - Oxford Car Audio, tyres from Motorline Nissan and various outdoor stuff from WS Army Surplus, medical treatment from Oxspines Osteopathy, mental training from One Hypnotherephy both from Wheatley. The list goes on, including new air conditioning - Wootton Trucks in Abingdon, stationary - Fine Print Witney, charcoal - Oxford Charcoal, tyre valves - Charlett Tyres Yarnton, raffle prizes - Halfords, Harley Davidson UK & also getting in there with the big boys THE RED LION Cassington. Help with fuel and repairs along the way are by Nicolas Jones Residential Lettings, Turners Estate Agents, Ecobee Cleaning, One Hypnotherapy, QI Associates and Katheryn for our CB radio. We have received a lot of support already and we've only been planning for three months. We've managed to get things sorted quickly with peoples help. Many thanks for all the donations already.

My two friends and I will set off from Cassington, drive to Goodwood and travel through Europe before meeting a convoy of ten other drivers also going through Iran and then onwards, the only problem is that Toby hasn't driven since passing his test three years ago. Kanhai and Toby are both currently studying to be doctors in Leeds which I am most



grateful for. They're trainee doctors so they'll keep me alive while I'll keep the car spluttering on. We are due to set off on our four-week adventure on July 21st. I'm super excited to set off and can't wait to be cruising through the Pamir highway in our totally unsuitable car.

To be fundraising for Oxfordshire Mind along the way too is epic, it's going to be quite a ride. We're winging it but also having a bit of organisation - but all in all I'm more excited than anything. I'm not wondering when we'll break down because that's all part of it - the question is, how many times will we break down?

And then the twist, we drive back... or I might fly... the car is not going to be sold but hopefully reused for future fund raising and shenanigans.

Do you read Tee-Shirt Slogans?

Some brand names and tee shirt slogans I find really objectionable – or am I just getting old and grumpy? The French Connection UK (FCUK) logo I do find offensive, but I have almost got used to this one.

However, some time ago I saw a man (in Witney) picking up his young children from school wearing a tee-shirt emblazoned with "FCUK for England". I also more recently saw a young mum with her children on the bus wearing a sweatshirt with the same message. To my shame I didn't go and challenge either of them over it. How can someone think that this is appropriate? I personally think that this is offensive and outrageous but also, in both these cases, it gives a very unhelpful message to impressionable young people and a very negative parenting role model.

Another tee-shirt which I saw recently was while shopping in Sainsbury's. A man was wearing a tee-shirt with a trail of bare footprints on it and the slogan "Barefooting". I thought it unusual but then, seeing the man a second time, realised that he was shopping in bare feet. When I got home I did a search on "Barefooting" online to find that there is a movement of people who have given up wearing shoes and socks completely and going

"barefooting" all the time.

Of course, over the centuries, and even in our current age, many if not most of the world population go bare foot and it is maybe a minority of us who wear smelly socks and shoes.

In Jesus' time many would have gone bare foot or in simple sandals and it was commonplace in more wealthy households to have a servant or slave who would wash the feet of guests when they came to visit. St John records in his Gospel that, at the last supper with his disciples. Jesus wrapped a towel around his waist and proceeded to wash the feet of his followers. (chapter 13 -page 119 in your Jubilee New Testament) Peter was particularly indignant that Jesus should do this menial task for them. Peter found Jesus' actions offensive and outrageous. However, Jesus said and showed that he had come to serve and not to be served and instructed them to do likewise saying, "Now I, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do what I have done for you". What Jesus said and did may have been offensive and outrageous but contrary to the parents above He gave the disciples and us a very positive role model to follow in the service of others.

Commemorative poppy-planting ceremony to be held in Woodstock by students of Marlborough School

As part of The Marlborough School WW1 Project, Woodstock Then and Now, the school's art department have been working on an idea which ties in with the centenary of the Treaty of Versailles, in remembrance of the soldiers that fell in the Great War.

A group of students have been making poppies which will be 'planted' in the grounds of Oxfordshire County museum, as part of a formal ceremony in conjunction with the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum on 28th June 2019. The poppies will remain on display to the public at the site until 24th July 2019.

Invited guests will include Alice Hipkiss and Isabel Wheeler, the Marlborough students behind the project, and individuals with connections to the town's fallen soldiers, but all are invited to watch the ceremony which will be held at 11am on 28th June. SOFO Museum previously supported Woodstock Then and Now, exhibiting Alice and Isabel's work in 2018.

Following the formal proceedings, Marlborough students will facilitate an art installation, based on paper poppies, which will reflect visitors thoughts on remembrance, as part of the national Kids in Museums Takeover Day event, at SOFO Museum. They will also guide visitors around the county's military history museum, which currently features exhibits such as Oxford: The War and the World 1914-1919, offering an insight into Oxford's international connections during WW1.

Discounted admission prices will also be offered to those visiting the museum between 11am and 1pm on 28th June.

Community Education at the Marlborough School, Woodstock

This month, we're sharing some insights from our home herbal tutor Angie Woodard. She says: "Being outside is well-known for lifting your mood but with a little extra know-how, you can get even more health benefits from specific plants in your local area.

One great plant to grow is Yarrow (Achillea Millefolium). People often plant this for its appeal to insects but did you know it has medicinal purposes too? Made into a tincture, it can be used for cuts and wounds, or steeped in natural oil, it makes a handy bug spray to keep away the mosquitoes.

If you're despairing of the weeds in your lawn, many of those are more useful than you think too. Plantain (Plantago Spp) can be made into a salve for bumps and bruises and is even better than dock leaves for those nasty nettle stings. Try spotting it next time you're out: you'll realise it's always growing somewhere nearby."


