Bees, birds and butterflies: care home designs eco-garden to bring wildlife back

A care home in Oxfordshire has designed and built an ecogarden to encourage more wildlife to the home, following requests from nature loving residents.

Churchfields Care Home's meadow and prairie area features paths that lead to birdboxes, surrounded by hedgehog homes and a variety of plants and flowers, all carefully positioned to make it accessible to residents. Through the development of the new garden area, the Cassington-based home hopes to not only attract more wildlife but also encourage residents to spend more time in the garden.

The home selected over 1,500 types of plants and flowers that will attract bees, butterflies and certain birds, as well as hedgehogs, which will enable residents to observe the wildlife making their way back into the garden.

Jane Roberts, Churchfields Care Home owner, commented: "This is a project that has taken considerable thought and planning. We are hoping that bringing wildlife back into the garden will give residents a purpose when enjoying time outside. Some of our residents are keen gardeners and wildlife lovers, and we listened to their requests when thinking about the design of the garden.

"Our new Gardener is passionate about involving residents in all aspects of the garden. To see everyone's enthusiasm and enjoyment is wonderful."

Michael and Amoy, residents at Churchfields, are already pleased with the results of the blossoming garden. Amoy likes to be taken to the garden every day and watch the development of the flowers, whilst Michael often takes his bird watching book to the courtyard, where he is keen to spot the first birds on his very own bird feeders.

Michael commented: "I think that the first birds to visit will be wagtails, but I'm not sure. I'm looking forward to watching them and seeing who comes first."

Amoy added: "It's just beautiful. It's lovely to see the flowers growing from the home, but it's not until you come and sit amongst it that you really get a true feeling of what the garden is all about. It's very special."

The home is planning a celebratory event in September, where local MP, Robert Courts, and chairman of the Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust, Barbara Mason, will be visiting the garden and chatting to residents about its benefits. Other improvements planned for the garden will be an allotment area and summer house.

Have your say on garden village proposals

A consultation has been launched on proposals for the Oxfordshire Cotswolds Garden Village.

Following initial consultation last year and taking account of various studies undertaken since then, the Council has published a 'preferred options' consultation paper which sets out current thoughts on how the garden village site should be taken forward.

This includes a draft vision and objectives for the site together with a series of proposed policy options on issues such as green space provision, healthy and active travel and climate change.

Over the next few weeks, residents and any other interested parties have the opportunity to comment on the preferred options before a final round of consultation takes place later in the year.

Exhibitions of the plans will be held at **Eynsham Village Hall on 6 September** and Hanborough Pavilion on 20
September. **Both will run from 2-8pm.**

Additional information

A key element of the West Oxfordshire Local Plan 2031 is the establishment of a new garden village to the north of the A40 near Eynsham.

It will be a new standalone settlement of 2,200 new homes and a new science business park which will give local people an alternative to driving to work in Oxford.

In addition, the nearby Hanborough railway station together with a new Park and Ride facility to the north of Eynsham (expected to be open by 2020) will give people an alternative to using their cars.

It will have its own village facilities, such as a school and community resources, whilst taking proper account of environmental considerations and planned infrastructure improvements.

The new garden village will make a major contribution towards providing much-needed homes and jobs in a high quality living environment. It will also unlock funds to improve infrastructure and boost the case for improvements to local transport links, including upgrades to the A40.

An Area Action Plan is needed for any location or area of significant change; it sets out how a new development will be taken forward, what it will look like and how it will function.

It was stipulated that there should be an Area Action Plan for the Garden Village as part of West Oxfordshire's Local Plan.

Maps vs SatNav

I love maps, looking at them, planning routes and discovering places, getting a feeling for whole areas and countries. So, until recently I said that I would never buy a SatNav. But then I was given one for my birthday because, teaching our second of our grandsons to drive, he needed to be able to follow a SatNav for the new driving test.

It took a while for me to actually use the SatNav for myself and then I realised some of the benefits. For example, if you miss a sign and take a wrong turn "Sally" SatNav can tell you and reroute you. (Many arguments with the wife saved! - Not to mention the speed camera warnings!)

However, there is a big disadvantage in just using SatNavs because SatNavs are about destinations rather than the journey, so you may have little idea where you are at any given time, or where you are near, or places you are passing. There is little experience of the journey that is passing you by.

Many peoples' attitude to religion is a bit like the SatNav. They want the destination, talking about being "with God" or enjoying "a better place" with some expectation or hope of the "hereafter".

Fewer people are interested in the spiritual journey.

This may not be new. I recently came across the quote below from a booklet ("The imitation of Christ") by Thomas à Kempis who was a 15th century Christian writer.

"Jesus today has many who love his heavenly kingdom but few who carry his cross; many who yearn for comfort, few who long for distress. Plenty of people he finds to share his banquet, few to share his fast. Everyone desires to take part in his rejoicing, but few are willing to suffer anything for his sake. There are many that follow Jesus as far as the breaking of bread, few as far as drinking the cup of suffering; many who revere his miracles, few that follow the indignity of the cross."

You see religion and faith are not just about the destination but about the journey as well.

Now for long journeys and holidays I still plan my route using a good road atlas and detailed local maps to enjoy the journey (whether easy or hard). However, I also now use the SatNav to keep an eye on my destination.

The season of Harvest is approaching and it's the time of year when the Food Bank needs to replenish the dwindling stocks in their store.

The Food Bank makes up basic food parcels for individuals, couples and families who have been referred to them because they are in real need. They provide an array of basic food items to suit their situation and they value what they are provided with, but the store has many empty storage boxes in it.

Without the support of organisations including schools, churches and individuals throughout North Oxfordshire they cannot manage to provide the level of parcels that they do. The following items are needed for the Food Bank:

Tins:

FRUIT (Mandarins, pineapple, peaches, pears, fruit cocktail) - CUSTARD OR RICE PUDDING - MEAT (all types including tinned pies) FISH (Tuna) - VEGETABLES (peas, carrots, sweetcorn, potatoes) - SOUP, BAKED BEANS, SPAGHETTI, VEGETARIAN MEALS

Packets/Jars:

RICE, NOODLES, PASTA (500g packets) - Pasta SAUCE - Breakfast cereals (NOT oats) - COFFEE, TEA (and other beverages) - SUGAR (small packets) - MILK (UHT, powderd) - Long life FRUIT JUICE - BISCUITS, JAMS & SPREADS, TREATS

Also welcome are: TOILET ROLLS, WASHING UP LIQUID WASHING MACHINE TABLETS

When donating food, please ensure that it has a "best before date" of at least 6 months in advance

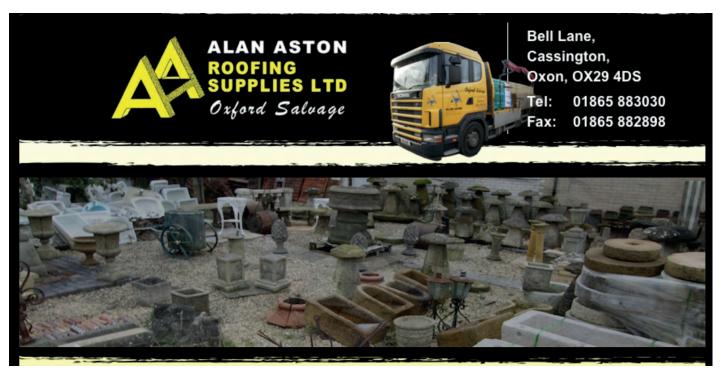

Things get off to an excellent start when our flight from London Stansted to Vienna, Austria is delayed by roughly two hours. We're flying on Laudamotion, an airline setup by the legendary Austrian racing driver Niki Lauda, so it's somewhat ironic that his crew are two hours late.

Once aboard the plane, I take some time to figure out how my seatbelt works. I feel quite relaxed about it, until my struggles signal the Australian bloke to my right to ask "how many pints have you had today mate?" I may have been putting the seatbelt on the wrong way round, but I tell him that I had only had one or two. "I expected double figures," he mused. Bloody Australians. Anyway, we eventually land in the eerily quiet city of Vienna, find our shabby hostel, and take to the local boozer to wrap up the night. After a few hours, Jon insists "I'm not drunk, but I'm very, very, very tipsy," the first of his distinct one-liners throughout the holiday.

We wake up to our first full day in Austria, so decide to really embrace the local culture, first by visiting LIDL and then by eating at McDonalds. We discover that, with a mobile app called Lime, we can ride electric scooters around the city to get everywhere much faster. We do finally embark on a proper tourist activity by taking a free walking tour around the sun-soaked city. We laugh as our tour guide pronounced cocaine as 'cok-eye-een', but the tour proves to be an enjoyable way to kill time.

Three years of studying at university have clearly taken their toll on Jon's brain, as he proceeds to announce the next day that "I wouldn't eat a knife and fork with a pizza," before managing to lose his hat in a women's toilet because he assumed they were gender neutral. One train ride to Budapest, Hungary later and we're in the second leg of our

From Oxfordshire to the Orne: Normandy 75th Anniversary exhibition comes to the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum

The new exhibition, Normandy 75: Oxfordshire to the Orne, will go on display at the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum from 7th August – 3rd November 2019. This exhibition will combine a travelling exhibition from the National Army Museum with stories that staff at the museum have collected from around Oxfordshire. These stories will be told through objects, a map of key locations, and quotes from Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire-born soldiers who served on D Day and beyond.

The National Army Museum's touring exhibition marks the 75th anniversary of the Normandy Campaign. The exhibition will tell the courageous stories of soldiers who fought in Normandy and during D Day, and will detail the events that helped secure an allied victory.

To enhance the National Army Museum exhibition, staff at the museum have been working to collect stories of World War 2 from around Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire.

Peggy Ainsworth, Collections Manager explains, 'In addition to our own regimental stories, we wanted to use this exhibition as a way to represent the local soldiers who contributed to the Normandy campaign. There have been many fascinating stories coming in from the public, which we will be telling through artefacts from our collection and information gained through our Stories of Conflict and County campaign launched last year.'

Soldiers from the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry were some of the first to set foot in Normandy on the 6th of June 1944, and were perhaps most famous for the capture of Pegasus Bridge in the early hours of the morning, prior to the beach landings. Visitors can put themselves in the shoes of these soldiers and sit inside a life-size reproduction of a Horsa Glider's compartment and listen to recorded interviews of D Day veterans.

The exhibition will run from the 7th August – 3rd November 2019 and will end with a special collecting day on the 2nd November. SOFO's 'We'll Meet Again' Collections Day will encourage members of the public to bring objects to the museum and tell their stories of Oxfordshire from the Second World War to the 1970's. Any objects donated or loaned on the day will be used to form our Second World War and Reminiscence displays.
