Cassington care home owners cycle to Paris and raise over £15,000 for blood cancer charity

Owners of a care home in Oxfordshire have raised money for Bloodwise, a charity who funds world-class research in blood cancer, by cycling the 500km from London to Paris as their supportive residents watched on.

Owners of Churchfields Care Home, Jane and Gerry Roberts, embarked on their recent journey, departing from London as they biked their way towards Paris, travelling via Folkestone, where they made the voyage across the channel. They then made their way to Abbeville, Beauvais, and finally on to Paris, with the ride taking four days.

As the duo continued on their journey, residents at the home kept track of their progress, using a board to monitor their locations. Each day, Gerry and Jane would send new photographs of different landmark's they'd reached, giving the Churchfields community an opportunity to share in the experience.

Jane and Gerry, with friends, helped raise a staggering £15,000. Jane Roberts commented; "We care for so many people who have been, or are currently battling different forms of cancer. It was wonderful to have the opportunity to raise the profile of this incredibly important charity and to help contribute donations towards much needed and ongoing research."

Continuing, she added; "The support of our residents has been incredibly important to both Gerry and I, and has been a strong source of inspiration through the more challenging sections of the ride. We're glad it's also given them a fantastic chance to relive some of their fondest memories, and for others, a chance to see parts of the world they've never had a glimpse of before."

The event as a whole featured 160 riders, all raising a grand total of £500,000 for blood cancer research. Cancer of the blood is the 3rd biggest 'cancer killer' and is the 5th most common amongst cancer sufferers making research into the disease all the more important.

Effective village communication – what is it? How do we achieve it? I'm talking about a meaningful two-way conversation and sharing of ideas.

Why do I ask? In the Parish Council update under the Men's Sheds item the following sentences have been added to last month's entry: "This is a second notice of this. We will ask a third time next month and if there are no takers will let it pass."

So I ask, is the CAWN the only way to effectively communicate with residents? It's a one-sided means to communicate and it has its place – community groups and valued advertisers believe that, but I don't believe it facilitates a two-way conversation. Equally, posting formal Parish Council meeting minutes on noticeboards or websites is only a one-sided communique. If you want to get a sense of what some of the village think, and it is only a portion, try social media – the recent street light topic showed some residents had some strong (unfiltered?) opinions but few were willing to share those within the pages of this magazine (and that was a protracted process over several months).

Perhaps the answer is to only discuss major, significant issues – such as the eco-group – and get a non-parish councillor to take the lead and organise a village meeting and then use the CAWN as a noticeboard. So how do we discuss minor issues? You could attend Parish Council meetings but the opportunity to discuss issues is limited in my personal experience.

So perhaps I am really asking, once an issue is raised via the CAWN or Parish Council minutes, how do we as a village then effectively talk about, discuss and explore options and agree an approach / direction on the given issue? I'll post this piece on the closed Cassington family group page on Facebook after the start of the month so you can reply or drop an email to CAWNeditor@gmail. com or stop your parish councillor, when you see them around the village, for an old fashioned face-to-face, two-way conversation.



New Cycling Champion backs residents getting on their bikes

A new Cycling Champion has been appointed at West Oxfordshire District Council.

Cllr Dan Levy has been tasked with promoting cycling across the District as a healthy and sustainable form of transport as well as listening to the needs of other cyclists.

"We need someone to ensure cyclists are properly looked after and take responsibility to ensure Cllr Dan Levy, Cycling Championtheir issues are handled effectively," he said.

Cllr Levy has cycled all his life and was part of the Cyclox pressure group in Oxford. One area he has been working on is ensuring the A40 cycle track is fit for purpose before and after the new park and ride is built.

Measures proposed to tackle new development issues

Action is being taken by the Council to tackle noise and pollution from a growing number of building sites in the District.

Councillors are looking to appoint an officer dedicated to liaising with developers and residents and ensuring environmental regulations are correctly enforced.

Recently there has been a three-fold increase in the number of residential developments in the District which has led to a rise in the number of complaints surrounding noise, dust and mud from existing residents.

Roman Mosaics

North Leigh Roman Villa's mosaic house was opened on 14 & 15 September as part of English Heritage's Open Days weekend. The warm, late summer weather meant that over 400 people enjoyed the beauty of the second and third century AD North Leigh site in glorious sunshine. A new group of volunteers from a range of neighbouring villages, working with English Heritage, staffed the open days. Their plan is to begin a regular pattern of openings for the mosaic in summer 2020.

The first open days by North Leigh Roman Villa Volunteers proved very encouraging. Visitors were delighted to see the mosaic, sometimes for the first time up close, sometimes having waited many years to do so. The open days doubled the numbers of people wishing to volunteer at the site, and

He will also be working with Oxfordshire County Council as the highways authority to ensure cyclists are given priority on new and existing roads with adequate parking provision, particularly in town centres.

New housing developments will also be priorities for Cllr Levy ensuring provision is made for cyclists.

Other areas will include promoting the District as a cycling destination for tourists, highlighting routes that may not be widely known while he will personally be encouraging his fellow councillors to set an example and cycle as much as possible.

Cllr Levy added: "Ultimately cycling is a healthy and effective form of transport and by getting more people on their bikes we can make a real difference to our communities and the environment."

breaches, often minor non-criminal offences, have now meant planning and environment officers' workloads have become unsustainable.

A motion has now been passed by the Council's Development Control Committee which would see the officer ultimately appointed to oversee all new developments.

The intention is to fund the post through developer contributions allocated to community facilities.

Cllr Jeff Haine, Cabinet Member for Strategic Planning, said: "There has been a major upswing in development across the District driven by the need for more housing and in the future we will have major schemes such as the Oxfordshire Cotswolds Garden Village starting.

"Developers have strict guidelines in which they have to work but increasingly we have seen these being breached. Having an officer who can liaise with developers, council planners and residents can only be beneficial for all sides."

Cassington Climate / Eco Group

Our first meeting at the Village Hall on Weds 16th Oct was very well attended. It was encouraging to find we have a great resource of residents that are well experienced and interested to support.

It was decided that our group would become a sub group to the already well established Green TEA (Transition Eynsham Area). This is a local environmental group which has been active for the last ten years, based in Eynsham and includes Cassington and nearby villages. 

There have been all sorts of dilemmas running through my skull this past month, perhaps none more so than the extent to which I should offer my colleagues tea or coffee in the office. Cassington W.I.

Our meeting this month was terrific. Our speaker Helen Plumb was telling us about gem stones. She studied to be a geologist at university and during her time studying various minerals in different parts of the world was able to find the best places in parts of the world for particular gems which had fascinated her since early childhood. She was working for B.P. at the time who sent her around the world searching for new oil fields so was able to buy gems at their source fairly cheaply and able to sell them for a profit in the U.K. Eventually she decided to take another degree in gemmology and set up her own business in sourcing, selling gems and making jewellery. The qualities she looks for are colour, reflection, durability, and hardness of which diamonds are the hardest so can be polished to reflect light the best. Many of the gems come in a huge array of colours not just the the ones we think of. Then we have pearls of which the natural ones produced in oyster shells are more valuable than the cultured ones but they can dissolve if coming into contact with vinegar or lemon juice. Jade comes in many colours and despite not being particularly prized in the west is very valuable in China with Imperial jade being very dark and translucent, diamonds are used to cut jade. Rubies from Burma and Mozambique are hugely valuable, Tourmalines from Brazil come in many colours but turquoise is the best and green garnets from the Urals in Russia were used by Faberge to decorate his eggs and artefacts. Helen brought many sample of gems to show us but in my opinion the best ones were the ones she was wearing! Our next meeting on 21st November will be open to everyone as our speaker Stephen Dawson will be telling us about Oxford Preservation Trust and we look forward to seeing you there.

WW2 Collections Day Event at Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum

On **2nd November 2019** Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, the county's only dedicated military history museum, will be holding their We'll Meet Again event, celebrating the museum's WW2 collections and appealing to visitors to share their own military stories and objects with the museum. **The event will run throughout the museum's opening time, 11am to 5pm.**

The museum is preparing a reminiscence display and is looking for local people's stories from the outbreak of the Second World War to the 1980s, which will focus on key moments and memories of Oxfordshire life throughout the decades.

Items recently donated to the museum following appeals include an evacuee's coat, a wedding dress made from a WW2 parachute and an extensive range of diaries, photographs and drawings from a member of the county regiment who was held as a POW.

On the day visitors can come along and share their reminiscences, photographs and objects with SOFO Museum volunteers, some of which could feature in the reminiscence display in the future. The day will also feature a range of 1940s-themed activities, displays and experiences for all ages.

Families will get the chance to handle real WW2 objects from the museum's own collection and take part in a 'Make Do and Mend' activity while discovering what objects can tell about life on the Home Front, or even craft their own gas mask.

A pop-up Gin Bar and 'Iron Rations Café' will cater for adults while children enjoy the many workshops and activities available throughout the day. Local living history groups will provide small displays and interact with visitors, as they portray members of 1st Battalion, Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry and the Oxfordshire Home Guard.

Eynsham Park and Ride scheme

Eynsham, Freeland and Cassington Parish Councils have all made it clear to OCC that the present scheme does not tackle the problem of the congestion on the A40. The current housing schemes to the west are only going to make this the problem worse. It needs a radical approach with firstly the bottle neck at Dukes cut being widened and a relief road built across to the A44 Frieze way roundabout with easier access to the A34.

Charles Mathew our County Councillor is very much of the same opinion and goes further looking at light railway options.

I have personally written to Robert Courts who tells me he backs the Park and Ride scheme but also agrees that other options need to follow on. This is qualified as to when funds are available.

None of the above Councils thinks this is the answer and have requested meetings with the Transport Minister.
