## New Year's Resolutions To Help The Environment

With 2020 just around the corner, people are beginning to think of their new year's resolutions for the next 12 months.

A new year presents the ideal opportunity to set goals and make positive changes in your life. There has never been as much focus on saving our planet from the doom and gloom of global warming and climate change than now. This means that 2020 is the perfect time to create new year's resolutions centred around reducing your carbon footprint and living a greener life.

### 1. Make your bathroom plastic-free

The first thing we must all stop doing is treating bathroom waste as if it's exempt from the recycling process. Plastic shampoo bottles are more likely to end up in the general waste bin because a lot of people neglect to separate out their bathroom rubbish. Here are a few ways in which you can increase sustainability in your bathroom:

- Use environmentally friendly cleaning products:
- Buy biodegradable cotton buds and toothbrushes: Cotton buds tend to get flushed down the toilet, find their way to the ocean and do a huge amount of damage to the marine life that ingests them. Wooden toothbrushes are also available
- Use bar soap rather than heavily packaged liquid soap: Ensure it doesn't contain palm oil. You can also get plastic-free shampoo bars.
- Buy shampoos, shower gels, etc. in bulk: This reduces the overall amount of packaging, especially if you buy refillable products.
- It's easy to find recycled toilet paper, but it generally comes in plastic packaging!

### 2. Eat with the seasons

Eating foods that aren't in season inevitably means buying products that have been transported a significant distance for your enjoyment. It wouldn't be easy to give up everything that has been imported but the more locally produced seasonal goods we consume the better. Eating the seasons mean we reduce the energy and associated CO2 emissions required to get food to our table. Locally produced seasonal foods are fresher, and therefore taste better and provide higher levels of vitamins and minerals. Imported vegetables have often been treated with chemicals or gasses post-harvest to extend their shelf-life. Seasonal food is also generally less expensive than imported food that is out of season in the UK.

### 3. Carry your own water bottle

You may think that as long as you recycle your water bottles, you're not doing any harm. However, recycling costs money, and is a complicated process, often meaning than not all of the bottle is recycled anyway. It's a far better idea to carry your own bottle, and refill it when it's empty. There are lots of different types to choose from; some are very light; some have a lovely design; some keep drinks cool, and you can add fruit to some for a little bit of flavour.

### 4. Use public transport, walk or cycle

It doesn't always seem especially convenient to take public transport, walk or

cycle. However, there are so many benefits, and we recommend giving it some serious thought:

- Less vehicles on the road reduces emissions that harm the environment.
- $\bullet$  Fewer emissions result in healthier air for people's lungs especially in cities, and for those at 'exhaust level' i.e. children!
  - Walking and cycling are great exercise.
  - It could be much cheaper for you!

You could even compromise by using a Park and Bike system. Of course, some areas are not well served with public transport, and some rail season tickets are extremely expensive. If you rely on a car to get to your place of work, offer to share with a colleague – if you work in a big city you may get there more quickly than everybody else thanks to car-sharing lanes.

### 5. Cut down on food waste

Here's a couple of statistics that aren't very easy to digest:

- A third of food produced in the world every year is lost or wasted. That's approximately 1.3 billion tonnes.
- Per capita waste by consumers is over 10 times higher per year in Europe and North America than in sub-Saharan Africa, south and south-eastern Asia.

Consumers aren't responsible for all of this – some is destroyed at the farm gate because it might not be the correct quality – but there's still a lot we can do to reduce this obscene amount of waste, such as:

- Support retailers offering imperfect fruit and vegetables at lower prices.
- Steer clear of 2 for 1 and BOGOF deals in supermarkets unless you are absolutely sure the items are something you will definitely consume, or something you can freeze for a later date.
- Learn to make soups, stews and smoothies to use up fruit and vegetables that are past their best. The benefit of doing this ensures you'll get your 5-a-day!
- Remember that Best Before dates are just that Best Before! If it looks, tastes and smells fine, then it will be fine. The important date to take notice of is the Use By date. These are applied to products that become unsafe to eat quite quickly, even though they may look fine.

### 6. Switch off appliances when not in use

Did you know that electricity still runs inside an appliance while it's switched off if it's left plugged into a live wall socket? According to The Energy Saving Trust, we could also save ourselves around £80 per year on our electricity bills if we didn't leave items on 'stand-by'.

The main culprit for wasting energy in our homes whilst on stand-by is the television, which is on stand-by for an average of 11 hours per day, costing £23.8million annually. Wow!

After that, computers, tablets, mobile phones, set-top boxes and consoles waste the most energy on stand-by. As well as saving money and energy, it's worth remembering to switch off a computer, as its lifetime is dependant on how much it's in use. Just don't unplug your Sky+ box if it's set to 'series link'! Make sure you, and the rest of your family, don't leave lights blazing in rooms you're not even in, and install some LED light bulbs, which not only use less electricity, but last longer, reducing the need to recycle them.



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## January stargazing highlights

**Jan 3/4:** Quadrantids Meteors - The first major meteor shower of 2020, the Quadrantids, peaks on the night of January 3 and early morning hours of January 4.

**Jan 5:** <u>Earth's Perihelion</u> - At 07:47 UTC, the Earth will reach its perihelion—the point on its orbit that is closest to the Sun.

**Jan 10:** Wolf Moon - The first Full Moon of the year is colloquially known as Wolf Moon in many northern cultures. This occurs when the Sun and the Moon are on opposite sides of the Earth.

**Jan 10/11:** <u>Penumbral Lunar Eclipse</u> - There's also a penumbral lunar eclipse on January 10/11, depending on your timezone. Most penumbral lunar eclipses look like a regular Full Moon.

**Jan 24**: New Moon - The Moon will come between the Sun and the Earth, and the illuminated side of the Moon will face away from the Earth. A New Moon is almost impossible to see, even with a telescope.

Sometimes we need to admit that we cannot fix things on our own – but in the case of our faith and hearts, and our sin, there is help available.

Even I eventually bought a new washing machine!

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### BLADON COMMUNITY JOINS FORCES TO SAVE PUB WHERE CHURCHILL "LEARNED TO DRINK"

Inspired by the great man himself, locals have formed a "War Cabinet" as they give people the chance to buy shares in the pub— and are being supported in their effort by Sir Winston's great grandson Randolph Churchill.

The White House pub has been at the heart of the Bladon community since the 17th Century and is the last remaining pub and community facility in the village.

It's also the pub where Churchill, who was born at nearby Blenheim Palace, "learned to drink". With a growing population of just under 1,000 residents and thousands of visiting tourists, this important and historic pub is the lifeblood of the community.

Anticipating that the current owners, Greene King, would try to sell the White House at some point, in June 2019, Bladon Parish Council with the support of Bladon villagers, successfully applied to West Oxfordshire District Council for the pub to be listed as an Asset of Community Value (ACV). The community now has an opportunity to put in a bid to buy and manage the future of the pub. A group of concerned residents have been working hard to determine if this is viable and now plan to make it a reality. But they have only until March 2020 to raise the £500,000 required to buy the pub for the community and so far villagers have pledged over £120,000.

Mike Edwards, of Bladon Community Pub Committee, said: "To quote Sir Winston, we plan to 'never give in, never give in, never, never, never." Now that Greene King has made the decision to place the pub on the disposal list, Bladon locals have followed the example of The White House's most revered patron, Sir Winston, by forming our own War Cabinet and society to keep this Churchillian centre to our village open."

Randolph Churchill, great grandson of Sir Winston Churchill added: "Our family is very proud of our association with Bladon and the love and care the community gives towards my great grandfather's resting place. Your plans very much have our family blessing."

In the UK, nearly 100 pubs have been taken over by the community and every one of them continues to thrive. Early and regular engagement with the community through leafleting, public meetings (attended by over 100 residents) and numerous conversations has shown that there is a strong level of support for a community purchase in Bladon.

The community pub bid has widespread support and Dominic Hare, Chief Executive Officer, Blenheim Palace commented: "We are delighted to support the Bladon Community Pub project. The White House has been one of

the hubs of community life in Bladon for a very long time and we believe that it is very important for all Bladon residents for it to remain this way. We will support the project team at every step and urge others to do so too."

Robert Courts M.P. commented: "As a local resident of Bladon, I know just how important the White House is to our community. As a village in a rural area too, the pub is a vital resource for those vulnerable residents who may not be able to travel further afield for the services it provides, and it can help to alleviate rural isolation. I am fully behind the campaign to run the White House as a community pub."

The Bladon Community Pub Committee has been in contact with a number of successful community pub groups to gain insight into the challenges and opportunities ahead. It has also joined the Plunkett Foundation – an organisation that supports communities with initiatives like this.

Together they will develop a business plan and make the project a success as they have for so many other community pubs.

The Bladon Community Pub Committee has been really encouraged by the wide support for this community purchase, not just from Bladon Residents, but from surrounding villages and further afield. Several individual investors have pledged their support. The White House has enormous potential and could be a social hub for the village offering a whole host of services.




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## Observation

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

# Cassington's Vanishing Wildlife?

I have a friend whose thirty-year old daughter didn't know what a primrose looked like, which left me wondering how many children in the village have ever seen a primrose, a harebell or a cowslip ... let alone heard an owl, a cuckoo or a woodpecker? If like me you find this distressing, you may be interested in a **nature recovery workshop** that is being held in Eynsham village hall on Wednesday 15th January at 7.30pm. It will be chaired by Catriona Bass who runs the Long Mead Meadows project, a designated county wildlife site just north of the toll bridge and one of the 3% of traditional hay meadows left in Britain.

Catriona and Kevan farm Long Mead in the traditional way, taking a late hay cut thus allowing wildflowers to grow and nesting birds to breed. The meadow is then grazed by

cattle or sheep. Visiting the site in June, surrounded by a sea of different wild flowers, butterflies and the buzzing of insects, one experiences the full extent of what has been lost.

The nature recovery idea is to find similar sites in Eynsham and the surrounding villages to promote the return of diverse wild flowers, butterflies, bees and other insects. # Cassington surface water drainage and recent flooding

I thought it would be a good idea to write a small piece indicating the main routes of the surface water drainage in the village.

There are **three main water courses** that drain the main part of the village.

The first and main course is the ditch that runs behind the houses on the right-hand side of Elms Road. It has tributaries that join it at the top of Elms Road that run right and left. The right branch drains to the side and part top of the recreation area and the left goes up behind the pavilion and then links to the balance pond on the Blenheim owned land in the right corner near the track that goes up to farm. When we have heavy rain there is a substantial flow of water coming down the ditches to the side of the track and this was the reason for the balance pond to try and hold back some of this sudden flow. There is also a ditch behind the houses in Elms road left side (odd numbers) which drains the allotment area which connects to the big ditch and culvert near number 2 Elms Road by way of pipe and ditch in front of 1 Elms Road. This ditch does not produce much flow and maybe blocked and consequently back flowing to the ditch behind the pavilion.

A meeting has been arranged with Blenheim to see if this can be investigated.

Going back to the main ditch and drain next to no 2 Elms road this by culvert and open ditches makes its way down under Little lane path into the open ditch between the school and St Peters Close. After this the water flows into the ditch beside Horsemere Lane and then under the A40 to the Thames.

There are small pipes and tributaries that feed into this ditch from the school field and Church Lane.

The <u>next flow of water drains</u> the area by the Hollow Furlong, Williams Court and Eynsham road which either drains down Mill Lane or into Church Lane and across the school land as mentioned above. There is an open gulley opposite the archway for the Chequers which catches some

of this flow and by pipe and manholes diverts this water down a pipe in Mill Lane.

The water that goes down Mill Lane drains by pipework into the field beyond the five-bar gate. This in turn should goes into a culvert under the A40 down to the Thames. This culvert does not seem to be working and has been reported to Oxfordshire County Council.

The <u>last water course is Batimer Ditch</u> which runs under the road about 100 meters east of the Bladon turn. This drains water off the field to the left going toward Bladon and the area above in the fields and industrial buildings as well as Jericho farm. This ditch eventually finds its way to the Thames.

All these ditches and drains are important to keeping the village safe from flooding. It is important that they are kept clear of rubbish and vegetation.

These are the open ditch and culvert situations but there are many other gullies and drainage pipes under roads that link into the open ditches that go to the Thames.

These pipes and gullies are not kept as a record by the Parish Council, but it hoped that WODC will have records which will enable us to understand this how surface water is handled in the Village.

With the current forecasts for more rainfall with climate change it is important we understand this drainage.

Equally important is for us as a village to make sure all water courses ditches and culverts are kept clear of obstructions

There are various agencies who work to make this drainage work. The Environment agency looks after the main water course from Horsemere Lane to the recreation ground where there is public access.

Oxfordshire County Council and West Oxfordshire District Council have responsibilities which are not always easy to establish.

The Parish Council do not have funds to take on any ditch clearing. If you see areas of concern let the Clerk know and we will see if we can get the appropriate body to deal with it.
