Care Home residents monkey around

Residents at Churchfields Care Home in Oxfordshire were delighted to receive a visit from some cheeky guests.

Two squirrel monkeys, named Antonio and Tia, took a day out from their zoological home in Chipping Norton to visit residents at the home in Cassington.

Studies have shown that caring for an animal has proven health benefits. With this in mind, residents were able to pick up, cuddle and feed worms to the very lively furry monkeys.

Stephanie Eley, Manager at Churchfields Care Home, commented: "Residents and staff alike were enthralled by the monkeys, who were using the home as their playground.

"They were so friendly, and we know how beneficial animal therapy can be for older people, especially for those living with dementia."

Residents at the care home regularly enjoy visits from animals, including 'pat dogs' and the star penguins that appeared in the local news last year.

Resident Muriel commented: "I was eager to ask the keepers about the age and names of the monkeys, and also what they ate. It was a wonderful opportunity to learn." Eve added: "I couldn't believe how agile they were, and I loved seeing them jumping about."

Jim Clubb from Heythrop Zoological Gardens commented; "Our common squirrel monkeys are regular visitors to care homes. We have been told by both specialist therapists and the

staff at these homes that residents/patients benefit immensely from the visits.

"Likewise, we have seen nothing but positive results with our squirrel monkeys. They are naturally intelligent and social animals that live in their large multi-generation captive-bred breeding colony back at our zoo.

"Being trained animals they are very familiar with human beings and interact with them on a daily basis throughout their day as well as performing their natural behaviours in their specially constructed homes. Animal training provides mental stimulation and promotes more confidence in zoo animals.

"Visits to these homes provides a natural extension and variation in their enrichment programmes."



HORSEMERE LANE Letter to the Editor

In 2016, OCC disclosed they were to close Horsemere lane in Cassington, this was stopped by our cllr Charles Mathews until we had a village vote and consent. So, we had a village vote and an overwhelming result to close the lane. After 4 years, yes 4 years of meetings, design, local consultation and a traffic survey with the transport department, we moved to close Horsemere Lane as per recommended by the Transport Department. We where suddenly presented with a potential bill for approximately £6000 to provide the gates, signage and OCC's consultation process. Even though OCC wanted the lane closed we suddenly had to pay. The Parish Council agreed to use and support the closure by utilising the Blenheim Sec106 building money from the large development in the village to pay for the consultation. The villagers reluctantly raised the money (£2600) for the physical works and signage. The cabinet member presiding on the consultation was advised by our Parish Chairman not to close the lane, minutes read as below. "Hugh Thomas for Cassington Parish Council confirmed that while there was a level of support for closure this was an important access route out of the village with 500 cars currently using Horsemere Lane. That traffic would have to go somewhere with closure inevitably causing an increase

in traffic at the traffic lights." and "Mr Thomas responded that in that case the Parish Council could not support the prohibition and would want Horsemere Lane to remain open." Our Parish Council decided traffic would be too busy passing their houses as traffic may block up from the traffic lights. There is no evidence to prove this and if traffic would find other routes. The vast majority of the parish council live in that end of the village. So, the parish council mislead us of their intentions and unfortunately wasted £3000 of village money as they decided to change their minds and decided their ideas TRUMPED what villagers voted for and OCC Transport department recommendations. As Parish Council members are voted in by villagers you would think it's their primary responsibly is to deliver what people voted for. This wasn't complicated like BREXIT, but we have lost over £3000 because the Parish Council decided to go with their own ideas even though the law dictates they have to disclose their own interest which they have never done. The lane had become plagued by massive potholes which where mended two weeks ago but unfortunately have already been ruined, the lane cannot take the amount of traffic as it wasn't designed for. Large vehicles and normal traffic belongs on the main roads not Horsemere Lane / Bridal path #welldone #wasteofmoney

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


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February stargazing highlights

February 9 - Full Moon, Supermoon. The Moon will be located on the opposite side of the Earth as the Sun and its face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Full Snow Moon because the heaviest snows usually fell during this time of the year. Since hunting is difficult, this moon has also been known by some tribes as the Full Hunger Moon, since the harsh weather made hunting difficult. This is also the first of four supermoons for 2020. The Moon will be at its closest approach to the Earth and may look slightly larger and brighter than usual.

February 10 - Mercury at Greatest Eastern Elongation. The planet Mercury reaches greatest eastern elongation of 18.2 degrees from the Sun. This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the evening sky. Look for the planet low in the western sky just after sunset. **February 23 - New Moon.** The Moon will located on the same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

SAM AI AM theatre review

Imagine a time in which anything in your world can be upgraded via scientific technology – including young people! Well that is exactly what happened when the cast of the latest offering from Dream Between of Dreams Studios got together – they imagined that time, setting their storyline against a backdrop of climate breakdown and the attendant environmental degradation that accompanies it. The play was self-cast with significant inputs from all involved giving a result which both provoked thought and debate.

Central to the story was Sam, expertly played by Hannah Buckner, who challenged the audience to consider the consequences of technologies' possible impacts to mankind – her stark reminder to all that she needed good old-fashioned Beatles style "Help". The question here is why did she need help? The audience were in no doubt why – her engineers had done their best to rob her of all human traits – but had not quite succeeded. The perpetrators of this crime against mankind, albeit in the name of scientific "progress", were wonderfully portrayed by the Professors Jefferson (Eva Ospina), Suckling (James Martin), Quantik (Joban Dey) and Frankham (Zoe Rogers) – clinical and cold-hearted to a scientific man or woman! We have to commend the Professors on their performance in terms of the dialogue and monologue they had to deliver on occasion throughout the play – complex (and sometimes long) elements tackled with aplomb.

But who was to expose the wrong doings of this well-intended scientific intervention? The heroes of course! And we had so many to choose from. Any piece of skulduggery requires exposure by a team of committed super sleuths determined to let the world know the truth. Enter Gail and Harry, Dreams' very own Mulder and Scully confidently played by Amelia Bolton and James Fox. Throughout their scenes the two manged to deliver an appealing blend of detective urgency sprinkled with a little bit of infatuation, giving a lighter twist to an otherwise sombre tale. There were even a few damp eyes evident throughout the audience at James' final exit. Testament to their commitment and conviction.

Despite the dark storyline, however the audience were given hope by the "youngsters" the confident Ali (Thomas Want), 'voice of an angel' Bee (Seren Lemaire), reliable Frankie (Oli Lewis), supportive Don (Shannon Jennings), reassuring Chris (Katie Leach), and the mind-boggling Elfie (Freya Rogers). She was quite the handful for her poor mother, Mrs Elfred (Maia Buckner), who played the oblivious parent with an appropriately light touch, and, like Ella Tompkin (Mrs Clarke and Lee), carefully managed her two distinct roles, also playing Marty.

The aforementioned Seren Lemaire sang 'To Be Human', originally recorded by the Australian Sia for the soundtrack to the 2017 superhero film 'Wonder Woman'. The message 'To be human is to love' was appropriate for this festive season as the village of Cassington and proud parents and friends came together to celebrate the skills of these young superheroes and their very special drama mentors Mandy and Rich Constance. The script and futuristic technological setting were simply Wonder-ful! Thank you, all.

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


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Observation

If you have many passwords it's a good idea to to use a password manager e.g. Symantec Norton I density Safe or True Key (which is free to B.T. Broadband customers) You can use one word which will release all the other passwords when you go on the site. 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

Cassington Birds by Alex Rogers (Cassington Eco-Group)

Last summer, lying in bed early one morning I heard a strange but distinctive "qwork" come through the window. That, I thought to myself, sounds like a raven, but I've never seen one in Oxfordshire. Sure enough, a few hours later when sitting in the garden reading, I heard the sound again.

"qwork"

I looked up and there was the midnight black, broad winged corvid so familiar to fans of Game of Thrones. The first raven I have seen in Cassington.

In the 16th century it was illegal to kill ravens and red kites, another bird that has made a big come back to Oxfordshire, because of the service they provided to humans through removal of rotten carcasses. Somehow, in subsequent years, these birds became looked upon as vermin and were persecuted to the point where they largely vanished from the UK (see Joe Shute's wonderful book A Shadow Above for a more in depth discussion).

These are not the only spectacular birds that live with us in Cassington. Anybody in the village who sleeps with the windows open at night may have heard the tawny owls calling to each other to establish territory. The males produce the classic "hooo huu" whilst the females reply with a screechy "keewik". I have heard three or more owls calling at once, sometimes from the trees immediately behind the house. It is the large trees in Cassington that are key to the presence of these nocturnal hunters right in our midst and actually quite a wonderful aspect of our village.

There are other day time hunters around as well. In the autumn of 2019, we were made aware of a falcon lying on the gravel outside the house. Zoe, my daughter, who has always been fascinated by birds, immediately charged outside and picked up the bird. Her face full of wonder she looked up and exclaimed "A sparrowhawk".

It was a spectacular bird, with a brown back, pale speckled front, bright yellow eyes, sharp talons and beak. For some reason (probably in a chase) it had nose-dived into the gravel on our drive and knocked itself senseless. We put it in a cardboard box in the garden and half an hour later it had recovered and flown off. I have seen these birds dashing across the roads in Cassington and also through the garden trying to catch smaller birds from our feeders. During the summer you may also hear the distant "pee-ow" of a buzzard and a quick scan of the sky will soon reveal several large birds of prey circling on a thermal floating across the village.

Unrecyclable plastic can be reused

It is better to reuse objects than to recycle them because it involves using less energy. If you rinse out a plastic bottle and stuff it full of plastic that you would normally throw in your grey bin the bottles can be used in construction. You need to only use clean plastic materials in the bottle and pack the bottles tightly so that the sides cannot be depressed. I will place one of the old recycling boxes just inside my property **(70 Eynsham Road)** which will make it easy to drop a bottle into it as you walk past. Once there are enough bottles

We encourage birds into the garden by feeding them. This is quite a commitment as once you start you have to keep on feeding them. This is because as their natural food sources have declined in the countryside as a result of changing agricultural practices, use of pesticides and urban development they have come to rely more and more on what we do locally to encourage wildlife. I sat at my desk just the other day and saw 7 goldfinches, with their stunning red faces and black and yellow wings, 4-5 bright green greenfinches and several chaffinches. Robins, dunnocks, blackbirds, wood pigeons, jackdaws and even the odd blackcap also visit. Birds nest in the garden in the ivy, wisteria and rose bushes, and our garden is very small! There is also nothing I like better than sitting in the garden on a summer's day watching and hearing the screaming swifts and house martins wheeling around our houses (although sadly swifts are in major decline).

In short you will be amazed to see what lives around you if you take time to watch and listen.

So, to complete this piece what can you do to encourage birds in Cassington. I have the following suggestions:

- Set up some bird feeders, being aware to ensure they are safe from pet cats. We normally feed ours with sunflower hearts (good general feed) and nigella seeds (attractive to goldfinches). Buying seed in bulk over the internet is the cheapest way to get it. We also have fat balls up in winter (robins and jackdaws like these).
- Supply birds with water, they love a good water bath but again ensure it is safe from predators and kept topped up.
- Plant to attract birds. Trees and shrubs are great for nesting birds especially if they provide dense cover and are protected from the worst of the weather. Trees and shrubs that supply fruit and berries are also great food sources.
- Don't use pesticides. Garden organically and avoid chemicals which can kill insects which many birds depend on. A patch of wildflowers can really encourage insects which birds love and finches will even take seeds directly from plants like sunflowers and cosmos late in the year.
- If you're very keen you can think about setting up nesting boxes or even get some swift next boxes for your house.
- Finally, join the RSPB, go bird watching locally (Otmoor is fantastic guaranteed marsh harrier sightings and we've seen bittern, kingfishers and hobbies there). Contribute to the RSPB Garden Bird Watch. Join your local Wildlife Trust or muck in with the local Cassington Eco Group!

Personally, I'll be keeping my eyes peeled. I've just read on the BBC news that a sea eagle (white-tailed eagle) has taken up residence in Oxfordshire!
