An apology

Last month I wrote an article in frustration that on reflection included comments that were too personal, and I'd like to apologise to those affected. I feel the article from the residents of Horsemere Lane in this edition better reflects the current position and recognises the efforts the Parish Council

are making to balance the different viewpoints across the village.

I believe the closure of Horsemere Lane will now be funded by the A40 bus lane scheme. Separate to this, the Remain Open of the lane has cost approximately £1000. Not sure the break down or who pays for that?

A note from residents of Horsemere Lane

In 2014 Oxfordshire County Council indicated an intention to close Horsemere Lane. As residents of the lane we fully supported this idea, the lane is legally a Restricted Byway, unsuitable for the approximate 500 vehicles that use it each day, predominately non-villagers seeking a quick access point onto the A40. It is frequently used by lorries above the 5-tonne limited, and by vehicles using it in the wrong direction to escape traffic on the A40. The Parish Council ran its own village survey in 2016 which resulted in them unconditionally supporting the planned closure.

A lack of funds and the proposed works on the A40 resulted in nothing further happening until OCC undertook a formal consultation process in 2019. A number of responders to the consultation expressed concerns about the impact of 500 vehicles a day needing to use the traffic lights junction, causing queues back into the village along the Eynsham Road. The Parish Council amended its position to fully supporting the closure of Horsemere Lane subject to mitigation works being undertaken at the A40 junction to improve the number of vehicles exiting the village at each sequence change of the lights.

As villagers, whilst still fully supporting the closure of Horsemere Lane, we have never wanted it to inconvenience other villagers. In reality we suspect that many of the 500 cars will find easier and quicker ratruns and will avoid the village entirely, however we do fully support the position of the Parish Council who have a difficult role to play in trying to represent and accommodate the views of the whole village. The A40 bus lane developments are progressing, closing Horsemere Lane seems to remain a part of those plans and now OCC are recognising that mitigation works will be required at the main Cassington junction. Overall this seems a good result for the village, facilitated by the position of the Parish Council working to protect the interests of all villagers.

The longevity of this process (2014!!) has, at times, led to frustrations that nothing is happening. The world of local politics appears bureaucratic and cumbersome but we recognise that our local Parish Councillors understand that world better than we do, and appear to have navigated a route that will ultimately provide a solution that works for the entire village and we remain fully supportive of them in this process.

STATEMENT FROM CASSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Horsemere Lane Closure

- 1. Cassington Parish Council (CPC) are not the highway authority. Decisions regarding road closures are the responsibility of Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) and not CPC.
- 2. Following the result of the village survey conducted in 2015. CPC agreed to recommend to OCC that they trigger the formal consultation process regarding the closure of Horsemere lane (HL) refer to minutes of CPC meeting date 5th November 2015
- 3. CPC's position, as reported in the minutes of PC meetings (refer to minutes of CPC meeting April 2019) is that OCC should provide a slip road and make changes to the phasing and timing of the lights at the A40 junction with Eynsham Road to allow for the extra traffic that may result from the proposed closure (mitigation measures).
- 4. During the formal OCC consultation CPC wrote to OCC requesting the implementation of the mitigation measures as part of the closure of HL
- 5. Following the consultation, CPC were invited to attend a meeting with OCC on 12 September 2019. During the meeting, CPC confirmed their position regarding the implementation of the mitigation measures. At the meeting OCC decided to defer the closure of HL pending... https://mycouncil.oxfordshire.gov.uk/ieListDocuments.aspx?CId=931&MId=5738&Ver=4

- 6. CPC have always maintained that the payment for the closure of HL and any associated works should be paid for by OCC. CPC does not have funds for roads, and has not collected any funds for roads.
- 7. OCC received £3,000 from a levy on the Manor Farm development for the closure of HL. CPC had no control over the amount levied, nor how the money was spent.
- 8. CPC received almost £20K as a section 106 payment on the Manor Farm Development and together with another £5K from a separate Blenheim grant spent the £25K on improvements to the Pavilion and subsidiary improvements around the recreation ground.
- 9. The PC is formed of members of the community elected by the community and its purpose is to represent and to serve the interests of the community. PC meetings are held in public, with members of the community encouraged to attend meetings. Minutes of the meetings are published in CAWN and are displayed on parish notice boards.

Councillor Mathew comments

I have given below a brief synopsis of the Horsemere Lane saga, in which I have been involved for a considerable time and corrects some of the misleading information in the February 'Letter to the Editor'. I would be grateful if you would publish this in March..

My recollection of the Horsemere Road closure discussions are-

I was contacted by David Tole(OCC Highways) in 2014 to inform me that they were closing Horsemere Road to through traffic. My reaction was to ask whether the Parish Council had been consulted and suggested they should be.

There followed over the next few years detailed discussions within the village and in particular the effect on the exit from Eynsham Road at the Cassington lights was a matter of concern.

All the way along, OCC had been continuously encouraged by Cllr Mathew (publicly and privately) and the Parish Council to build within the A40 Road plans a slip road at the Cassington Lights to allow cars to go left onto the A40, thereby relieving any queue at rush hour.

Eventually this resulted in a RTO appearing in the Oxford Times, to which there were objections (Jan.2019). The Delegated Cabinet Meeting at OCC arranged for was cancelled at the last moment (Feb.25th.2019)as OCC said their lawyers had problems. Further discussions led to the new Delegated Cabinet meeting on September 12th. , which took place, and it was at this meeting that the Chairman stated that the closure should not go ahead without the said slip road being built. Cllr Mathew reiterated his repeated wish for that slip road. Cllr. Yvonne Constance, the responsible OCC Cabinet Minister residing, then deferred any decision and asked the OCC officers to revisit the 'Slip Road' issue. Subsequently I have sent update requests to OCC on this issue and have had no response (see below).

At no time did the Chairman of the Parish Council state at the OCC meeting that they opposed the closure nor that they had changed their opinion .

The situation remains that Cassington Parish Council and Cllr Mathew await news from OCC Highways on the future of the slip road onto the A40.

I'm Red Faced!

Did you spot my mistake in my February CAWN article? I said that the first 5 of the Ten Commandments are about our relationship with God. I must apologise because it is the first 4 commandment (not 5) that are to do with our relationship with God. The remaining commandments are about our relationship with other people. The first four are: 1) Love God and no other, 2) don't worship idols, 3) don't misuse God's name and 4) keep the sabbath day holy.

Thank goodness for Jesus who, when asked what the most important commandment was, condensed all 10 commandments into just two. Jesus said that the first and greatest commandment is to love God with all that you are. Then he said that the second most important commandment is to love your neighbour as yourself. (Matthew chapter 22 verses 34-40 page 28 in the Jubilee New Testament)

You can visualise these two commandments as a cross: the upright (love God) and the cross beam (love others). The

upright is of course bigger than the cross beam (Jesus says that loving God is the first and greatest commandment) but the upright then supports the cross beam (to love others). Loving God commits us to loving others – or should do.

However, elsewhere in the bible it says: "Whoever claims to love God yet hates a brother or sister is a liar. For whoever does not love their brother and sister, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen. (1 John 4:20).

March 1st is the first Sunday of Lent. Lenten fasting is a discipline that some people take seriously (or not so seriously) for the 40 days before Easter. However, instead of fasting or giving up something, Christians often take on extra prayer, Bible reading, charitable giving or charitable actions. In the remaining days of Lent before Easter why not try the Lent challenge to do one good deed to help someone you don't know each day.

Have you heard about the new WIZARD?

He's here to help but not through magic! Have you ever wondered in which bin to place an unwanted item? For example a torn or stained T shirt. In Blue Planet II, David Attenborough made us all aware of plastic waste but did you know that a third of all clothes in the UK end up in the wrong bin/(WRAP).

OXFORDSHIRE'S WASTE WIZARD (www.oxfordshire. waste.wizard) came on line in January this year. Developed by Oxfordshire Recycles a joint partnership between the County Council and all 5 district councils, all you need to do is put in your postcode and the name of an item and the Wizard will tell you whether and how you can dispose of that item.

THE WASTE WIZARD also tells you where you can donate items, sell them or get them repaired. Plus the Oxfordshire Recycles website has information on how to recycle different types of plastics; reduce your food waste and what happens to all your rubbish and recycled material.

BUT REMEMBER if you don't want to dispose of the T shirt, you can also mend it yourself or take it to a repair cafe. The next one is on 7th March 2-4.30pm in Eynsham village hall. Or cut it up for cleaning cloths, dolls clothes or patchwork.

AND THE MOST IMPORTANT MESSAGE - Buy less or better quality clothes that last longer.

Walkers urged to help save historic footpaths before 2026 deadline

All rights of way must be identified before a government deadline of 2026, after which it will no longer be possible to add old paths to the official record.

Under English common law, rights of way do not expire but the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 required all rights of way to be recorded. The Ramblers is calling on the government to extend the deadline for registering historic paths by at least five years.

The walking group Ramblers is calling on walkers, historians and map enthusiasts to use its new mapping site to identify missing footpaths.

The online tool divides the official map into 150,000 1km squares so users can compare historic and current maps side by side, spot any differences and submit missing paths.

Once mapped, Ramblers will recruit volunteers to make applications to restore paths to local authorities before the 2026 deadline.

Jack Cornish, the project's manager, said: "Our paths are one of our most precious assets. They connect us to our landscapes – ensuring we can explore our towns and cities on foot and enjoy walking in the countryside – and to our history and the people who formed them over the centuries.

"If we lose our paths, a little bit of our past goes with them. This is our only opportunity to save thousands of miles of rights of way and time is running out."

Some lost paths are still in use, while others have become overgrown, but all were omitted from the "definitive" maps of 140,000 miles of paths that councils were required to draw up in the 1950s.

Some walkers are already applying to local authorities to recognise lost paths but fear there are many more than the government's estimate of 10,000 miles and in some areas it is believed groups need to make two applications a week to register all the paths before 2026.



A new exhibition of artwork, both produced during and depicting scenes from the Second World War, will go on display at the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, Woodstock, from 5th March to 7th May 2020.

The Art of World War II exhibition has been curated from John Noott's personal collection of work, gathered together during his career as an art collector and dealer for more than 40 years. The pieces themselves form a history in pictures of the Second World War, but give incredibly personal perspectives reflecting a varied range of experiences before, during, and after the conflict. Through the work of artists of the time, visitors can see the war unfold 'as it happened'.

Visitors to the exhibition will be able to see a view of Dunkirk as troops are evacuated, painted by a nephew of Winston Churchill, John Spencer Churchill, reflecting what he had witnessed during his own army service. The artists would return to England to inform his uncle personally of the need for boats to assist in rescuing the troops there. Elsewhere, the plight of both evacuees and refugees is seen as artists of the time depict the many people displaced by war, such as those coming to Britain as part of the Kindertransport rescue programme in the build up to the Second World War.

The artists whose work is included in the collection range from skilled amateurs to professionals, from those already renowned at the time to those who would go on to make a name for themselves in a post-war world. A sketch by Eduardo Paolozzi, better known as a pioneering pop-artist, contrasts newly arrived American troops with a typical Oxford scene of a student cycling through the city with the famous skyline as a backdrop. The artist faced discrimination and later internment under the Enemy Aliens Act, along with many of his family, because they had moved to Britain from Italy. The exhibition also features art from Vogue fashion illustrators forced to flee Paris, and Beano cartoonists that turned their hand to cartography to aid General Montgomery in North Africa.

Collector John Noott also knows how wide-reaching the impact of the war was on a personal level, having grown up in wartime Britain. He was seven years old in 1939, and remembers clearly many nights in air raid shelters and his father's service with the Local Defence Volunteers after work (later to become the Home Guard, or 'Dad's Army'). These lived experiences inspired him to gather the collection throughout his own career, which will now be put on display for the first time in Oxfordshire.

The Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum is open from Tuesday-Friday 10am-5pm, Saturday 11am-5pm and Sunday 2pm-5pm. The country's only military history museum is located in the grounds of the Oxfordshire Museum, Park Street, Woodstock.



Lady Salisbury started organic gardening at Hatfield House in 1948 and was the driving force starting Prince Charles's interest in organic. To my mind Christine Facer Hoffman was one of the most interest because she was a highly qualified scientist in medicine research but is now a very famous garden designer all around the world and many of her designs include a medical symbol. It really was a most enjoyable evening.




