THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION Remembrance 2020

This year Remembrance Sunday falls on 8th November.

Sadly Covid-19 restrictions will prevent us making the usual house to house collection for the Poppy Appeal this year. We hope to be able to place collection points and poppies inside the usual premises with the agreement of the owners.

Cassington Branch of The Royal British Legion will not be having the usual parade with our Branch Standard at the village war memorial service on Remembrance Sunday. We recognise this will be deeply disappointing for all who normally attend this annual event in our village but it is not a step that has been taken lightly. With one exception, neighbouring branches are not holding their usual ceremonial events either.

Whilst the annual Service of Remembrance at The Cenotaph will still take place, neither veteran participation through the March Past nor public spectators will be possible this year. Royal British Legion is encouraging people across the nation to ensure Remembrance Sunday is still marked appropriately by taking part in remote and socially distanced Remembrance activity, whether that be watching the small but significant service at The Cenotaph on BBC One or pausing for the Two Minute Silence in their home or on their doorsteps.

November stargazing highlights

Nov 10: Mercury at Greatest Western Elongation

This is the best time to view Mercury, low in the eastern sky just before sunrise.

Nov 11/12: Northern Taurids Meteor Shower

Best seen just after midnight radiating from Taurus.

Nov 15: New Moon

The new moon will not be visible so this is the best night for viewing far off galaxies and star clusters.

Nov 16/17: Leonids Meteor Shower

Best seen after midnight radiating from Leo.

Nov 30: Full Moon

This was known by Native American tribes as the Beaver Moon because it was the right time to set the beaver traps before the swamps and rivers froze. Also known as the Frosty Moon or the Dark Moon.

Nov 30: Penumbral Lunar Eclipse

The Moon passes through the Earth's partial shadow. This is only visible from N America, the Pacific and NE Asia


Local doodler and design guru Kevin Hinton will be leading the judging panel and will help to turn the winning design into artwork that is suitable to print.

Do you know anyone with the initials FN?



Back in the summer my wife (Jane) and I drove down a very quiet and narrow country lane in Hampshire to the tiny village of East Wellow. There, in the graveyard of St Margaret's church, we found a family memorial in the shape of a very small tower and spire. On three sides are the names of those who were clearly members of this prominent and wealthy family. However, on the fourth side there is just a cross and the bare initials "F N" with the dates of birth and death (1820 and 1910). There are no coach parties of camera wielding tourists, yet here lies one of this nation's greatest heroines.

The modest inscription chosen by this person as their epitaph speaks of this modest and humble, but determined, woman who gave her life to the service of others (and if you haven't realised yet the memorial marks the grave of Florence Nightingale).

We have all heard of the "lady with the lamp" saving the lives of those injured in the Crimean war but her story starts well before this and extends long afterwards. At age 17 she nursed her village and household in the flu epidemic and flood of 1837 and, against her families wishes and strong opposition, she went to work as a nurse in Salisbury hospital. However, as well as leading by example she laid the foundations for the training of nurses writing numerous

books and reports to the government that led to important reforms.

Her books contained comprehensive diagrams and statistics and she became the first female member of the Royal Statistical Society. In 1910 at age 90 she was still working and campaigning for better midwifery care and also the rights of prostitutes.

This year is the 200th anniversary of Florence Nightingales birth and as a commemoration of this anniversary a new stained-glass window was commissioned and installed at Romsey Abbey near to her family home. I'm not sure whether the modest "F N" would approve of the commemoration but the window is a fitting tribute and was unveiled earlier this year.

The artist (Sophie Hacker) has entitled the window "The Calling" reflecting on an entry in Florence Nightingale's diary just before her 17th birthday, "God spoke to me and called me to His service". At bottom of the window is an echo of a verse from the Old Testament Bible book of Isaiah where Isaiah has a vision of God's calling and he responds with the words 'Here am I. Send me!'

As I write the Nightingale Hospitals are being prepared for active service in the second wave of the current pandemic. May those who serve in these facilities and our regular hospitals continue to be our inspiration, and may we all, in the tradition of Florence Nightingale, be those who listen for God's call and be ready to respond, "Here am I. Send me" as she did.

The Green Heart of Cassington Village

Cassington Allotments have been a feature of the village since at least World War 1, more than a hundred years. Many of you will have enjoyed the green views across the allotment from the garden of the Red Lion, walked through it with your dogs or entertained your children on the "BMX tracks", the wild space between the allotments and the sports field. The 30 plots are now fully rented out with a waiting list. Some allotment holders cultivate more than two of these long plots, others, like myself, share one with other members of our community. Some of our cultivators have been on the allotment for decades and its produce feeds families in Cassington and beyond. During Covid it has been extremely important in allowing its members to get out, enjoy the fresh air, get some exercise, socialise at a distance and grow food. It is also an extraordinary haven for wildlife and probably acts as a reservoir of biodiversity for the rest of the village. The allotments also lie along the northern edge of the Conservation Area of the village which includes a wealth of Grade 2 listed buildings and other features of historical interest and remembrance, such as the War Memorial.

For all these reasons the "consultation document", little more than a slick brochure which dropped through my door on 1st October was a shock. The leaflet was sold as having been developed through consultation with members of the village (a total of 5 people/households I believe) and makes much of providing affordable homes to local families, "improving" the allotment and village connectivity. The proposal in reality means the loss of two thirds of the allotment area and a chunk of the wild space beyond and doesn't connect anywhere in the village that is not already walkable. It is an example of gross over-development for Cassington. 40 – 50 rental properties come with 1.5 allocated parking spaces each, so at least 60-75 cars and probably more, all exiting to the main road in Cassington via Elms Road. It is not included in the Local Plan and comes on top of the 20 houses built by Blenheim Estates potentially increasing the size of the village by 20% in total.

The Eynsham – Woodstock sub-area has already been allocated 5,596 houses which are in the process of being built to the year 2031. This is by far the largest housing allocation of any sub-area in West Oxfordshire and forms a third of an estimated 15,950 houses being built in the district (99% of this need has been met with

existing plans). At Yarnton and Begbroke 4,400 houses are planned, including on green belt land, effectively fusing the two villages. These developments are eroding our health and well-being through the increasing impact of traffic on the A40 and using the village as a rat run as other routes such as the A4095 and A44 become congested.

This is why the Cassington Allotment Association have asked you to join us in defending this vital local amenity for young and old (and those of us between). It is literally the green beating heart of the village and its concreting over will change the character of Cassington forever. We have asked all of those in the village to join us in rejecting the Blenheim Estates plan in any form that affects the allotment and adjoining wild space and to initiate a local Neighbourhood Plan. This will give Cassington Villagers a voice to determine what we want to see in our village. We have also gathered a group of local activists to defend the allotment including local expertise in topics like wildlife and development. I am immensely impressed by the views of 85-90% of the villagers we have consulted, now more than half the village, who have signed this statement and provided insightful comment on the development. Cassington Allotments has appeared in the Oxford Mail, and the Witney Gazette locally but also in the internet version of the Daily Mail and, on the 13th October, in The Times (Gardeners Dig in to Fight Palace Homes). We also have a national petition on Change.org to Save Cassington Allotments, which at the time of writing had more than 4,700 signatures. I would therefore like to thank all of you for your enormous support.

This development, however, has not gone away. Blenheim have steam-rollered other villages around us. Their consultants are lobbying at every step of the planning process from district down to local level and they have formed an "Affordable Housing Partnership" with West Oxfordshire District Council. This infiltration of West Oxfordshire's planning process raises a great danger of subverting the independence of the planning process and undermines the local democratic process of planning and government. The fight is not over. Therefore, we ask those of you who have not yet signed the Cassington Statement or who we have missed in our postal shot of the village to please sign the statement on the back page of this newsletter and post to my address (8 Orchard Close, Cassington, OX29 4BU) or email me with your address and we will come and collect (alex.rogers@revocean.org). You can also sign the Save Cassington Allotments petition on Change.org, display a poster in your windows showing your support and join us on the Save Cassington Allotments Facebook page.

Allotments and Wildlife

Wow - what a couple of weeks it has been! The news that the allotments are the proposed site for a major new housing development has sent shock waves through our normally sleepy village. For me it has meant that many folks are both asking me about the wildlife that is present on the site and perhaps more importantly, informing me of what they have seen. This is great, and I can assure you all that there are many working behind the scenes to ensure that the importance of the allotment site and its wildlife are being fully documented, particularly in relation to the raft of legislative and regulatory planning instruments designed to protect wildlife. There will be more on this soon by way of update for those interested in CAWN.

But all this discussion set me to thinking whether we ever stop to consider why the allotments have become so special for wildlife? There are many factors in play, but undoubtedly one of the biggest drivers behind its biodiversity is its age. We are all now aware that the allotments have probably been around for a hundred years or more, during which there has been fluctuating use of the site in terms of human activity. So, while the lack of access to a water source on site has been a major headache to the allotment owners down the years, it has been a good thing for wildlife as disturbance has been kept to a minimum.

Every time I walk around the allotments I "get" why it is so biodiverse. Every plot is different in terms of the produce grown, which means that there is an array of different food items and structures present for wildlife to exploit. Nature likes diversity, and so the mosaic of different plots collectively renders the site a wildlife haven. Add to this the wildlife "highways" that exist in the form of the access paths and hedges that criss-cross the site and it becomes obvious that these provide an important function in terms of wildlife being able to move around the site relatively unheeded and out of sight of predators. This is particularly important for my favourite allotment "resident" the aptly named slow worm who would not win any medals in the "most mobile animal" category.

Whilst these paths are important conduits of movement, it is worth noting that they have less appeal the more they are mowed or strimmed. These activities can easily physically damage/kill an array of critters and equally as important, they reduce the structural and species diversity an "untidy" plot provides. Nature likes to be untidy, so spare a thought for the hedgehogs, toads, and a multitude of other wildlife inhabitants on the site who much prefer the rather unkempt look.

The allotment owners take on their plots for a variety of reasons – exercise, well-being and of course to produce food, often organic food. All great things for wildlife! Low dependence, or even better still a complete lack of reliance, upon chemicals to manage the pest species that seek out the food grown results in an array of plants and animals on site. Couple this with the increasingly acknowledged benefits of companion crop planting on plots and the physical removal of the problem species, and we begin to understand why wildlife loves our allotments. I also notice that many allotments have areas of flowers planted, possibly to help with pest control or maybe just to bring a splash of colour to the plot. Whatever the reason, it is good news for wildlife as they provide a valuable nectar source, which, with careful choice in terms of flowering time, provide an almost year-round food supply to a host of insect pollinators.

I have only scratched the surface in terms of pointing out a few aspects of why wildlife loves the allotments. The allotments bring people up close and personal with nature. It is always good to see so many families working their plot, as this introduces young and old to the natural world - Cassington's very own Serengeti plains! I am fully behind the call to oppose any housing on the site as I know it makes a valuable contribution to both Oxfordshire's wildlife diversity and the sense of community which makes this village so very special. It would be a real shame to lose such an integral part of our way of life.

Cassington Allotments

Resume of the statement read out before the discussion at the last Parish Council meeting:

The Parish Council will not be consulting with Blenheim Estates in the time frame suggested by the published document.

The Parish Council will be taking professional advice which will need a longer time frame.

The clerk will be receiving residents' comments for the Parish Council to take forward.

Initial elements of concern which were highlighted: -

- Number of dwellings proposed
- Parking spaces
- Access and impact on Elms road



On a breezy and sunny October afternoon after school, several of the Cassington Eco group members' children and St Peter's Eco Group pupils helped to sow and plant wildflower seeds in the Churchyard. This was part of a Wildflower seed mix experiment to take place over the next 3 years to improve our local Bio diversity.

The project is being organised with Eynsham Nature Recovery group. A patch of lawn was selected in the corner near the gate and steps on the corner of Churchyard and a small bed was prepared and a mix of native wildflowers sown and our efforts recorded and monitored to see what might thrive over time under different conditions. The children enjoyed exploring the seed mix with the different varieties, shapes and sizes, as well as the much needed stamping down afterwards. We all now wait with some excitement to see what starts to emerge in the Springtime and hopefully seeing some additional colour and wildlife of Bees, Butterflies and insects in this area. All going well, we plan to replicate this site with other wildflower patches throughout the village and encourage residents to find spaces to let nature and wildlife thrive in their gardens and other green spaces.
