February stargazing highlights

Feb 11th: New Moon

The new moon will not be visible so this is the best night for viewing far off galaxies and star clusters. In particular look out for the Pleiades and the Andromeda Galaxy. The Pleiades, sometimes called the 'Seven Sisters' is a cluster of stars easily visible towards the South just after sunset. The Andromeda Galaxy can be seen towards the West just after sunset near the Andromeda constellations.

Feb 27th: Full Moon

The Moon's face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Snow Moon because there were usually heavy snowfalls at this time of year. This moon was also known as the Hunger Moon, since the bad weather made hunting difficult.



RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Chipotle Butternut Squash Soup

Any other allotmenteers with a glut of butternut squash this year? I didn't have as big a harvest as in previous years on my plot, but have certainly been left with enough to get our family through the winter. It's so nice to still be eating food that was grown over the summer months; it's like tasting a delicious piece of the sunshine whilst in the depths of winter. This recipe is perfect for warming cold tummies and makes great use of any sort of squash or pumpkin you might have hanging around. It's dairy free, nut free and gluten free, so a great all rounder recipe using store cupboard ingredients. Make this flexible recipe your own by changing up the ingredients based on what's in your cupboards!

Ingredients:

- 1 pint organic veg stock (plus extra for cooking lentils if desired)
- 1 medium butternut squash
- 1 onion
- 4 cloves garlic
- A handful of baby plum or cherry tomatoes
- 1 tin chopped tomatoes
- 1 tsp ground coriander
- 1 tsp cumin seeds

Approx. 2 tbsps chipotle paste (or use a mix of approx 1 tsp each: chilli powder*, smoked paprika, cumin, oregano, onion powder, brown sugar and a good pinch of salt and pepper)

- 1 cup dried red lentils
- 1/2 cup frozen sweetcorn
- 1/2 block tofu, cubed (or use mushrooms, extra cubes of squash, cubes of potato or chicken if you're carnivorous! Substitutions need to be ready-to-eat as this is added towards the end of cooking)

Large handful spinach fresh or frozen

*if you don't like heat, you can use extra smoked paprika and less chilli powder, just adjust to your taste.

Method:

- Prepare veg stock and heat a large pan with a little oil. Also, simmer red lentils in a separate pan until tender(about 10-15 mins) *I cooked the lentils in extra veg stock but water is fine.
- Gently sauté chopped onions for a few minutes until they have a little colour, then add chopped squash and crushed garlic. Sauté for another few minutes.

We are so lucky to live in a village full of love and kindness.

It's like a virtual snuggly blanket! X



- Add spices (including the dry chipotle mix if you're not using ready-made paste) and tomatoes and cook for a minute or two more.
- Add the hot veg stock, chipotle paste if using, and simmer gently until veggies are tender.
- Once squash is tender, add the tin of tomatoes and warm through for a minute or two. Blend until smooth (or to desired consistency).
- Lentils should now be cooked. Combine them with the blended soup, tofu cubes, sweetcorn and spinach in a large pan. Warm through until hot, and spinach nicely wilted.
- Serve the chunky soup in bowls. Delicious with hunks of warm crusty bread.

Making every child wild

Don't worry folks—it is not as bad as it initially sounds! I have written in CAWN before about the importance of outdoor learning in terms of the educational and wellbeing benefits that it brings to young (and older) people. Children that are connected to nature are happier, healthier and more creative. Any villager who has witnessed the enthusiasm shown by the children during 'forest school' sessions run by Anna Houghton will recognise this. And for others it will explain the appearance of circles of tree stumps and a living willow wigwam in the school grounds!.

With this in mind, a few of us villagers have got together with the Head and staff of St Peters primary school and the Cassington Village Eco-Group to begin to look at ways in which we can make nature a part of every child's school time. The best way to do this will be through providing opportunities for wildlife-based learning activities inside and outside the classroom. So what do we have in mind?

The school grounds are potentially an outdoor learning haven – there is plenty of outdoor space which, with some inputs from us, we can elevate to good quality wildlife areas with loads of opportunities to encourage the school children to get up close and personal with nature. We have identified two key projects with which to begin the process.

The first is to provide two wildlife hedges within the grounds. The first will be a newly planted hedge, 80m in length, along one of the school boundaries. The second hedge will follow an existing (60m) hedge line around the pond which currently has major gaps due to an historic lack of maintenance resulting is some major gaps which we will "fill in". Currently there is a national initiative to encourage schools to plant wildlife hedges within their premises, with the sponsors providing the necessary whips (young trees), stakes and trees guards free of charge!

The school has applied to the initiative, requesting enough native hedgerow species to create/reinstate the hedges — a sum total of 1500 trees. Whilst the overall aim is to get the school children to maintain the hedges, using them to familiarise themselves with the species present and the plants and animals that come to depend upon them — in the first instance the whips will need to be planted.

This is a "grown-up" job and in order to get the project off to a good start we will be looking to put a St. Peters "Wild Force" team together to get the job done quickly and safely.

The second project is linked to the pond itself, the aim being to get it into a position where it can serve as an outdoor learning tool for the staff and children at the school. This is something of a bigger (and more expensive) job. Cassington is a "hot-spot" for a very rare species – the great crested newt, and in the first instance we will have to observe all of the necessary precautions linked to working on a site which potentially houses the newts. Once we have undertaken the necessary surveys and received permission to progress with the work, there are several large tasks to complete. In an ideal world we are aiming to re-profile/desilt the pond itself, remove a significant amount of the shrubs which are shading the pond, repollard the large willow and to create a walkway and pond-dipping platform from which the staff and children can work safely.

So there is lots to do and we will be coming back to you with a request for help with the tasks at hand. Several of you have already indicated your willingness to get involved — thank you so much for your offer — but we will need more, as many hands... Our ambitions are compounded by the current restrictions in place, but hopefully by the time for the hedge planting to begin things will have eased a little.

Parish Council meeting

Blenheim proposal for allotment site development.

The Parish Council have not heard further from Blenheim Estates.

Horsemere Lane and Cassington Lights

It is very frustrating but despite many attempts by Charles Mathew no further information has been received regarding the Bus Lane. It is understood that contractors have begun installing their site office and storage facilities close to Wolvercote.

Website.

The clerk has received the web site details and the site can be accessed to load up information. The clerk will work on this over the next month with a view to publishing. The clerk still needs good quality photos of the village.

School crossing/20mph zone.

The clerk is looking into the recently announced mandatory 20mph zones around schools. It is hoped we can get this instigated as soon as possible.

Tree Planting.

The Parish Council have received agreement from the Sports and Social club to plant indigenous trees along the southern boundary of the recreation field. On inspection it looks like 6 semi mature trees would fit the bill. Quotes are being obtained.

The clerk continues to deal with the day to day matters and if any residents have a question please do not hesitate to contact her.



January 2021

Dog Waste

The Parish Council has bought more signs to put around the dog walking areas. On the agenda for our next meeting is the consideration of putting a further dog waste bin at the entrance to the track up to the farm.

War Memorial. (same as last month, work in progress) Quotes are being asked for the remedial works to the main column. Once the quotes are received investigation will then follow to see what grants are available. It does however look like the remainder of the money will have to come from a rise in the precept.

Neighbourhood Plan.

The clerk is arranging the first meeting (via zoom) in February The Parish Council have appointed a professional body to guide the Parish Council representatives through this process. The fees will be the subject of a grant.

Defibrillator by Village Hall.

New Batteries and Pads have been purchased and the unit is now fully operational. Should residents need the use of the defibrillator they should let the responders for the Ambulance service know that there is a defibrillator close by and they will give a code to unlock the unit. Comprehensive instructions are with the unit. The Ambulance service will be aware of the unit as it has been registered by the Parish Council. Weekly inspections of the unit are being carried out.

Housing needs survey

The Parish Council have just received the results of the survey and will be discussing it at our next meeting.

Worton Entrance flooding

WODC are in contact with the owner of the land between Jericho Farm and Thames Water entrance and are hopeful this ditch will be cleared soon. Thames Water have also been contacted with a view to clearing drainage and culverts under the entrance.

Recollections of Cassington

What's it like to live in Cassington for the most part of 94 years? Over Christmas, Steve Wright interviewed Ian Waters, his grandad, to find out.



While much may have stayed the same, the Cassington of old had an operating railway, shops and even a food delivery service! "They had one joined onto the Bell and one at the Lion," Ian said, detailing the local shops. "They had a mobile shop that used to come around. We always had a good fire going and in the winter the delivery man would come in and have a cup of tea. He didn't want to go back out again! He was going around North Leigh and places at ten o'clock at night with ice creams! It was a different world."

Tuckwell gravel pits were in Bell Lane (located opposite the cottages, where the salvage yard and Bosworth clinic are now, and behind the old Bell Inn). They shut the pit away behind galvanised fencing but we used to go and play out there and get in trouble. 'Don't do this, don't do that'.

Harry Tuckwell used to come out with the wages on a Friday for the fellas that worked there. 'Please Mr. Tuckwell, can we have a ride in your motor car?' 'I'll give you a ride in my motor car if you keep out of my pit,' he said. 'Alright Mr. Tuckwell.' It was an old Morris with a dickey seat on the back. Three or four of us would clamber in there and he might take us to Yarnton but we'd have to walk back! We used to walk back and we were chuffed because we did get in the pit.

Around that time in 1934 the A40 was built. All the lorries going to Oxford or London came through Witney and either had to go through Eynsham or Cassington and Yarnton. Of course, when the A40 was built that was a wonderful thing.

The railway was built before my time. There was story that someone thought they knew where the railway was going to go and planted an orchard there so they could claim compensation when it was built but they got it wrong and the line was a bit further over. The trees were there though, over the other side from Horsemere lane. Pop used to go and pick apples there but I expect it's all gone now.

There was a bridge then over the Evenlode, I think it's still there and one over the canal but I think that got taken away but you could go right down to Fairford on the train. You used to get down to the railway with a horse and cart or walk down to the station and get the ticket at Yarnton when the train stopped there. It was different altogether. That's all gone.

Steam engines always had a driver and a fireman. Sometimes, they would drive and steer at the same time and they used to move a lot of English timber. I'd see them come up through Oxford with a trailer on the back and three trunks about 50 or 60 foot, the driver pulling that lot on his own. If anybody was in the way he'd be on that old whistle. There were a lot of decent fellas about then.


