OXFORDSHIRE ARTWEEKS IS LIVE!

Oxfordshire Artweeks is the UK's biggest artist open studios and pop-up exhibition event and runs throughout May. Last year, due to the pandemic, the festival was online only but this year, provided the restrictions don't change, there should be 250 'live' venues operating in a similar way to non-essential shops. Venues in the North and West are open from the 1st to the 9th of May, with other



parts of Oxfordshire later in the month, plus more online throughout the festival. See www.artweeks.org for details.



Local artist, Kevin Hinton will be holding a popup exhibition at his home - Mill Lane House, Mill Lane (opposite the Chequers) - from the 1st

to the 9th of May from 11am to 6pm each day. To comply with Covid restrictions, only one family group of up to four will be able to enter at a time and you will be asked to wear a mask, use the sanitiser provided and respect each other's space. If there are several groups at one time there will be some seating in the garden.

If you are uncomfortable with these arrangements, then please look at the exhibition online. Turning in the lane is difficult, so if you come by car please park at the Village Hall.

There is a great mix of artists showing in Eynsham (see the map on page 3), and a preview of Kevin's work and theirs can be seen in the Eynsham Art Window, at 66 Mill Street.

May stargazing highlights

May 6-7 - Eta Aquarids Meteor Shower.

The Eta Aquarids is produced by dust particles left behind by Halley's comet. These meteors often produce long streaks of light, or trains, that persist for several seconds.

May 11 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

May 17 - Mercury at Greatest Eastern Elongation.

Mercury will be at its highest point above the horizon in the evening sky. Look for the planet low in the western sky just after sunset.

May 26 - Full Moon, Supermoon.

The Moon's face will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Flower Moon because this was when spring flowers appeared in abundance. This moon has also been known as the Corn Planting Moon and the Milk Moon. This is also the second of three supermoons for 2021. The Moon will be near its closest approach to the Earth and may look slightly larger and brighter than usual.

For those who aren't familiar with my work, it is mostly everyday things drawn in pen, ink and coloured pencil, with individual images and montages available as limited edition prints. Many of the images are from or inspired by the series of daily drawings I began making back in 2018. Having made it beyond the first month I was further encouraged when my sketch of a cheese grater was selected for the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition.

John and Sue Hemingway kindly hosted an exhibition of the first year's collection '365 Days and Counting' in the summer of 2019, and I continued drawing every day through to September last year when I reached over 1,000 sketches.

I have since been working on commissions, more involved drawings and practising portraits in oils, some of which will also be on show, including a portrait of a young paramedic which was painted as part of the Portraits for NHS Heroes project initiated by local artist Tom Croft. See the map below for all the local venues during the first week. I hope you enjoy the festival, in person or online, and look forward to showing you my work.



Village Hall AGM 23 February 2021

Chair's Review of the Year - John Hemingway "Not just a building, but building a community".

2020 was a year we'll never forget, and we will each carry with us our personal pandemic memories. For the Village Hall, it was a year of mostly enforced closure. Between lockdowns we did have a few bookings, but there were no events, and committee discussions were mostly about coronavirus risk assessments and precautions. Many sincere thanks to Kathryn Teal for taking the lead on this heavy-duty task.

We were delighted to make the hall available free of charge for the temporary community shop set up by Neighbourhood Watch, which proved so valuable to many people in the village. As well as helping other people, their activities generated a surplus of £418 which they generously donated to the hall. Many thanks to Vicky Thomas-Clarke and team for their enterprise and great support for the community.

We took the opportunity during lockdown to carry out some essential maintenance - a new boiler, hot water taps in the gents toilets, and renewing the emergency lighting. Many thanks to Paul Woolford for very generously giving his time to carry out the plumbing work at cost, and to Matt Terry for the electrical work. We also need to thank the Parish Council for paying £1,000 towards the cost of the boiler.

We did manage to generate some income from hall lettings during the first two months of the year, and in the short period between lockdowns we had a few socially distanced bookings. Total income from lettings was £3,168. This compares with £12,669 in 2019 and we usually take around £1,000 a month in bookings to cover our running costs. Fortunately we have a super-efficient treasurer in Lorna Mills who is always on top of the situation, and we were eligible to claim support from the Government through WODC and received a one-off fixed grant of £10,000 to help cover the loss of income. We were also granted business rate relief, which helped us to reduce our costs. Many thanks to Lorna for sorting out all the paperwork so quickly and effectively.

To generate extra income we normally run events such as the film nights and live shows from touring companies, but none of these were allowed this year, and of course there was no

Bike Night. So our revenue from events and fundraising was zero, but we did receive donations of £90 and the £418 from the community shop. Plus bank interest, investment income and Gift Aid, that made our total income for the year £14,041 - not too far below our income of £16,075 in 2019.

Although closed for most of 2020 and (at time of writing) still closed now in 2021, the hall does continue to cost money. Our expenditure for last year was £12,605 before depreciation, well down on the previous year's costs of £16,745, but within that we spent a record £4,488 on repairs and maintenance to keep the hall in top condition and ready to re-open as soon as permitted.

The end result financially, after allowing for annual depreciation of £3,721 (£3,720 in 2019), was net outgoing resources of £2,284 (£3,651 net outgoing in 2019). Our cash position is still very positive, and we ended the year with almost £1,500 more cash in the bank than at the start of the year. So overall our finances are in very good shape.

We had far fewer committee meetings this year and mostly met remotely on zoom. Many thanks are due to our hardworking volunteers on the committee: Ruth Bakewell (Events), Penny Burroughs (Secretary), Lorna Mills (Treasurer), Bryan Partridge (Vice-Chair and Buildings), Dave Butlin, Sheila Nelson, Bridget Sherlock and Malcolm Teal. We also need to give massive thanks to our hall manager Kathryn Teal and our cleaner Pam Coates for their ongoing commitment. We always welcome new volunteers to join our team, so if you're interested please do get in touch.

Also please consider joining the Patrons of Cassington Village Hall for as little as £10 a year, and you can also Gift Aid your donation to make it tax efficient. The village hall is a registered charity and relies totally on generating its own income to keep the place going. If you value the hall at the heart of our community, making a small regular donation is a great way to help.

Many thanks to everyone for your patience. The hall will return as soon as we are allowed to open and we're sure that it will once again be a very popular community venue. It is a great asset, effectively owned by the village for the benefit of the village.


I will never forget the kindness of neighbours and friends leaving me treats while I had Covid, and our Social Worker's concern to provide the right support for Elisa.


I am passionate about equality. I was a gender and diversity specialist in international development. I want to apply this passion to West Oxfordshire, where I have lived for 20 years.

CASSINGTON ALLOTMENTS

bursts forth into Spring



April has arrived with a high pressure sitting over England and sunny days bringing cowslips scattered along the Cassington "exercise" track and insects such as solitary bees searching for nectar on the allotment. Our gardeners are getting busy, building raised beds, preparing a community plot (come and grow something!), planting, mulching and nurturing seedlings. The wildlife has notably picked up with residents and migrants starting to stake their territories including black caps, dunnocks, chiff chaffs, robins, blackbirds and others. A kestrel regularly hunts for mice, watching over the beds and couch grass from the electricity wires over the central path. Samuel's tadpoles are also getting fat on the juicy algae and plants in his wildlife ponds.

To add to our excitement this month we had a fact-finding visit from Dominic Hare, the CEO of Blenheim Estates. Dominic came to talk to the Allotment Association and walk the site with us to find out a bit more. The meeting was also attended by Hugh Thomas from the Parish Council. The conversation wandered as we walked around but revealed a number of interesting points. First, Blenheim Estates remain determined to build on the Cassington Allotments or elsewhere in Cassington. So, look out folks, the fact a revised plan for the allotments has not appeared does not mean it isn't coming.

Secondly, the minimum size of development that will be imposed on the village is upwards of 40 properties. This is well above the housing needs identified by the recent village housing needs survey and represents a significant increase in the size of the village, more than 10% or 20% if you include the previous two Blenheim Estates developments. The reason for this substantial size of development is viability ("the numbers don't work otherwise"). The meeting in the allotments was followed by a further meeting between Blenheim Estates and the Parish Council to discuss other land in the village that belongs to the estate and which may be suitable for development.

So, the meeting raises many questions, probably more than we started with. Will they, won't they try and build on the allotments knowing the Cassington Allotment Association and the majority of the village are opposed and will fight every inch of the way. Will Blenheim Estates put forward alternative proposals on other land and will these be more or even less acceptable to the current residents of the village? Forty houses will represent the same increase in traffic and pressure on amenities and facilities wherever they go. But could an alternative site be less impactful? A lot to think about for all of us and also for us to consider in the Neighbourhood Plan. There are alternative building sites that do not belong to Blenheim Estates and therefore, again, would not be financially viable for them. So, watch this space villagers, we await further developments (or perhaps hopefully not.....).

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Wild Garlic Pesto (makes one small jar)

50g Wild Garlic leaves*, washed

30g Hazelnuts, chopped and briefly toasted in a little oil in a frying pan

30g Parmesan cheese, freshly grated 80ml olive oil, plus extra to cover Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Simple method: Put everything except the oil into your food processor, then blitz. Gradually add the olive oil via the processor funnel.

Traditional method: Finely chop wild garlic leaves, then use pestle and mortar to grind together with the nuts and parmesan. Add olive oil at the end.

Add to jar, popping a dash of olive oil on top to keep pesto covered. Close the lid and store in the fridge. Under the layer of oil, will keep for a few weeks. Alternatively, freeze portions in ice cube trays.

*Note: Wild garlic grows across the UK from late winter until the end of spring. Wild garlic does look similar to lily of the valley, which is poisonous, so please be very careful!

Add to a batch of savoury scones - delicious hot from the over with melted butter

Layer on top of salmon - pop in the oven for a lovely flavourful crusted salmon

Enjoy with your favourite pasta for a simple dinner - do add even more parmesan on top!

WI Meeting

This month our meeting was again held on Zoom and our speaker was Charlie Maynard, Chair of West Oxfordshire Transport Group. He was briefing us on three proposals for the planned rail link between Witney and Oxford.

The first plan could connect into the Cotswold line west of Yarnton and north of Worton and staying well away from the villages but running through open countryside. A proposal was under consideration for a station near the Siemens site in Eynsham.

The second plan for consideration was to lay a new route immediately north of the A40 but that might cause upset in the community if it was too close to gardens.

The third option was to build the track on the south side of the A40 and tie this in to the expansion of the new bus route expansion.

All of these are undergoing a feasibility study with all departments who would be involved and would be expensive and probably take several years to complete. Of the people who were asked for an opinion 97% gave their support for a railway to link Witney and Oxford. Watch this space!

Our next meeting on 20th May will be to discuss this year's W.I. resolutions. At present we are still unable to meet in the village hall, so it will be on zoom.
