November stargazing highlights

November 4 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky.

November 4 & 5 - Taurids Meteor Shower.

The Taurids is a long-running minor meteor shower producing about 5-10 meteors per hour in two separate streams. The new moon means dark skies for what should be an excellent show. Best viewed just after midnight. Meteors radiate from Taurus, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

November 5 - Uranus at Opposition.

Uranus will be at its closest to Earth and its face will be fully illuminated. It will be visible all night long, but it will only appear as a tiny blue-green dot in all but the most powerful telescopes.

November 17 & 18 - Leonids Meteor Shower.

The Leonids is an average shower, producing up to 15 meteors per hour. However the nearly full moon will dominate the sky this year, blocking all but the brightest meteors.

November 19 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be located on the opposite side of the Earth to the Sun and its face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Beaver Moon or the Frosty Moon or the Dark Moon.

November 19 - Partial Lunar Eclipse. The eclipse will only be visible from Pacific rim countries.

THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION POPPY APPEAL 2021



This year Remembrance Sunday falls on 14th November. I am happy to report that after a year when Covid restrictions prevented it,

the Poppy Appeal House to House Collection will take place once again.

During the period running up to Remembrance Day authorised collectors, who are well known to most of you, will be calling. In 2019, the last year when we were allowed to collect, the Appeal raised over £1100 in Cassington and Worton – less than in some years but still a most commendable amount for a village the size of Cassington. May I, on behalf of the Royal British Legion, thank all of you who so generously supported the Appeal then, and those who contributed to the collection tins we were able to put out last year. May we once again rely on your generosity.

Today the Legion is still being called upon to give support to bereaved families, and to others who have been severely injured in wars and more recent conflicts. Costs to do this are continually escalating. The Royal British Legion does not advocate war or glorify it, but attempts to relieve the suffering caused by it.

"I'm all right Jack??"

In most of the main stream religions the "Golden Rule" is promoted, that you treat others as you would like others to treat you". Jesus, when asked what the greatest commandment was, said that the first is to love God with all that you are but that the second is to love others as you love yourself. (Luke 10:27 page 79 in the Jubilee New Testament) Jesus never said love yourself more than others.

In the lockdowns most people were genuinely sensitive to the needs and anxieties of others but I'm concerned that "restriction fatigue" may now have set in, with most legal restrictions lifted and masks and social distancing having become voluntary.

It's interesting to observe the wearing, or not wearing, of face masks now. Some folks seem to have consigned their masks to the bin, now that wearing is not a legal requirement. It seems that many have missed the point about face masks –

that they don't protect you (and never did) but they protect others from you.

Now, with cases rising again, people may well be infectious without knowing. How do others know that you are not potentially infected or a potential threat? How can they feel safer when in your involuntary company?

People who are, or just feel, vulnerable may well be intimidated by the insensitive actions of those not wearing masks coming into close proximity to them, such as on public transport or in shops or even in church.

Let us continue to be sensitive to the concerns and fears of others who may be, or may feel to be, more vulnerable as we head into what may be a very difficult winter. Let us treat others as we would like to be treated if we were in their situation, or if we had their fears.



Parish Council meeting

The next meeting will $\overline{b}e$ on Thursday 4th November 2021 in the village hall with full Covid precautions in place. Please contact the clerk if you want to attend.

Neighbourhood Plan.

The draft Neighbourhood Plan has been sent to Planning Department at WODC and we are awaiting the response from them. The committee has another meeting planned for 8th November.

Horsemere Lane and Cassington Lights.

Tracey and Cllr Thomas have a meeting with OCC on 2nd November. But have been advised that the video won't be available until the end of October. Hopefully there will be something to report at the next meeting.

School crossing/20mph zone.

The clerk has been in touch with OCC regarding the rollout of this initiative and is awaiting further information. Update still chasing.

The Parish Council are also asking OCC to move the speed monitor further up Eynsham Road so that it will pick up more car speed as they travel along Eynsham Road. Update still chasing.

Save Sandy Lane Level Crossing



Sandy Lane level crossing between Kidlington and Begbroke/ Yarnton is under threat of closure. This will result in:

- Increased traffic on the A44
- Impeded access to local facilities
- Impaired community and social activities
- Reduced trade for local businesses

This survey is organized by Yarnton Parish Council. Last year over 2,000 people signed a petition against the proposed closure, but local residents' views are being ignored. We now need to demonstrate that the crossing is important by showing who uses it and why. Please help us to compile this evidence by completing this survey and sharing it with other local residents and businesses. This will help Oxfordshire County Council make an informed decision about the future of the level crossing. Flood Fair

West Oxfordshire District Council will be hosting a Flood Fair in Witney to inform residents about how to prepare and what to do during a flood.

Cllr Norman MacRae, Cabinet Member of Environment for West Oxfordshire District Council said:

"This is an educational

event where we will share the types of floods that can occur and who to contact in the event of any, and what type of support each agency or organisation provides. We will also give information on where to find flooding products and other vital resources.

The Flood Fair is open to the public and it will take place in Witney Town Centre on Thursday November 4, 2021 in two sessions from 10am to 12noon and 1pm to 4pm. It will be hosted in the Town Centre Shop on the High street on the corner of High Street and Welch Way. There will be representatives from Oxfordshire County Council, the Environment Agency and Thames Water in attendance.

Through the winter months, a flooding awareness campaign in West Oxfordshire will run to inform and educate residents ahead of, and during, any flooding incidents.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

BEEF CASSEROLE WITH HORSERADISH DUMPLINGS

Ingredients

750g braising steak 1 onion 2 carrots 1 parsnip 1 turnip 2 stalks celery 30g butter 3 tbsps olive oil 2 cloves garlic 2 tbsps plain flour 500ml beef stock 250ml red wine 1 tbsp tomato puree Rind of one orange 1 bay leaf 3 good shakes of tabasco 2 tbsps chopped parsley Salt and pepper

For the Horseradish Dumplings

175g self-raising flour75g beef suet1 tbsp hot horseradishSalt and ground black pepperwater to bind

To Cook the Casserole

Peel and cut the onions and crush the garlic. Cut the meat into cubes (about 4cms). Coat the meat in seasoned flour. Heat the butter and oil in a large saucepan and fry the beef in batches to brown the outside. Add the onion and garlic and fry for 3-4 minutes. Add the tomato puree and cook for 2 minutes.

Add all the meat back to the pan, put in the red wine, stock, orange peel and bay leaf. Deglaze the pan, which means scrape the bits off the bottom of the pan into the liquid. Stir well. Bring to the boil then reduce the heat to simmer. Prepare the rest of the vegetables, then add these and the tabasco and seasoning. Cook on a low heat for $2 - 2\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

To Make the Dumplings

Place all the ingredients in a bowl and bind together with cold water to form a firm dough. Shape into balls, then flatten one side slightly and sit on the top of the casserole mix. Transfer to a warmed heatproof casserole dish if you are cooking it in a saucepan. Cook for a further 20 mins. uncovered until the dumplings are golden brown on top.

Remove the bay leaf and orange peel, check seasoning and sprinkle with chopped parsley. Serve in a wide soup bowl with mash and savoy cabbage, or just crusty white bread, which is perfect for soaking up the gravy.
