# December stargazing highlights

### December 4- Total Solar Eclipse.

Limited to Antarctica and the southern Atlantic Ocean.

### December 13 and 14 - Geminids Meteor Shower.

The Geminids is considered by many to be the best shower in the heavens, producing up to 120 multicolored meteors per hour at its peak. The shower peaks this year on the night of the 13th and morning of the 14th. The moon will block out most of the fainter meteors this year. But the Geminids are so numerous and bright that this could still be a good show. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Gemini, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

#### December 19 - Full Moon.

The Moon's face will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Cold Moon because this is the time of year when the cold winter air settles in and the nights become long and dark. This moon has also been known as the Long Nights Moon and the Moon Before Yule.

#### **December 21 - December Solstice.**

This is the first day of winter (winter solstice) in the Northern Hemisphere.

### December 21, 22 - Ursids Meteor Shower.

The Ursids is a minor meteor shower producing about 5-10 meteors per hour. The shower peaks on the the night of the 21st and morning of the 22nd. The nearly full moon will block all but the brightest meteors. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Ursa Minor, but can appear anywhere in the sky.





### When cutting glass, "measure twice and cut once".

If you've ever had to cut a pane of glass you will know that it's not as easy as the professionals make it look but, with a bit of practice and a large, new, pane of glass you can be successful. But, one thing that is really very difficult is to trim a piece off the edge (particularly if the glass is old) and, if you cut it too small you can't make it bigger! Hence the rule "measure twice cut once". Don't try to trim.

Often people try to trim Christ out of Christmas. Maybe with Christmas cards that just have a snowman or a robin or Santa. - Don't get me wrong, I love receiving cards from family and friends regardless of the picture on the front – it's the words that are written inside that are important. (And some "religious" cards can be really tacky!)

However, there are a couple of other ways that people try to trim Jesus out of Christmas which are slightly ironic. Firstly, the use of "Xmas" and the Americanism of "Happy holiday".

The cross of "Xmas" reminds me that the reason for the birth of the Christ child was not only for him to grow up as

Emmanuel (which means God with us) but also that he came to bear our sins on the cross of Calvary where we can find our salvation.

Also, the word "holiday" originates from the phrase "holy day". Christmas is a most holy day because on that day that most holy child, even the Son of God, was born to bring in God's rescue plan for us.

Laid in a manger, announced by angels and worshipped by shepherds - "a Saviour who is Christ the Lord" That's a message that is too good to be trimmed.

If you have time read Luke chapter 2 verses 1-14 (if you still have a Jubilee New Testament from 2012 it's on page 64).

So, Happy Xmas and Happy Holiday!,



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# **CASSINGTON TORNADO**

### 31st October 2021

Yes it was a tornado. For anyone still in doubt the high wind that swept through the village, causing devastation in its path, has officially been classified as a T3 tornado, indicating wind speeds of up to 42-51 m/s (93-114 mph). A few days after the event Sarah Horton from the Tornado and Storm Research Organisation (TORRO) visited the village to assess and document the damage. She has prepared a comprehensive report, extending to 16 pages, some of which is included in this summary. The full report is available to view on the village website: https://cassington-pc.gov.uk/



The tornado looks started to have Eynsham and in provisionally the path being measured is ending at the as boundary of Worton. It had a width of around 160m and a provisional length of 3km. A clear path was seen through woodland at both ends of the village as well as through the

village. Many trees were lost, a good number of which had sentimental value. Tree damage showed strong elements of twist to wood fibres. Heavy projectiles travelled some distance. Many houses sustained some roof damage. Other property was damaged too, including cars, outbuildings, walls and windows. Some houses were coated in debris following the event.

### Regulation 14 Notice: Cassington Village Neighbourhood Plan

Notice is hereby given that the Cassington Village Neighbourhood Plan, Green Infrastructure Plan, Design Code and Analysis of the Village Survey relating to the first two documents is published on the Cassington Parish Council Website at: https://cassington-pc.gov.uk/ under the link Parish Council / Neighbourhood Plan.

The Neighbourhood Plan is a statutory document which lays out guidance and suggested management of future development in Cassington Village. The Green Infrastructure Plan details the history of Cassington Village, the green infrastructure in and around the village as well as a variety of issues of importance to the residents, landowners and others with an interest in Cassington. The Green Infrastructure Plan is intended to inform the Neighbourhood Plan but also covers issues not covered by the Neighbourhood Plan and planning in general. The Village Survey was aimed to garner views from the residents of Cassington on matters related to how they would like to see the village develop in the future. The Design Code appraises the main village settlement, and its content has informed the design policies of the Neighbourhood Plan.

Most residents that were spoken to likened the noise to jet engines, or like a noise that they had not heard before. Some compared it to the planes at nearby RAF Brize Norton. Those who saw the tornado spoke about



how difficult it was to see anything. They described levels of horizontal rain that some said they had not witnessed before. They also described a 'mist' that was impossible to see through. Some, however, said that they could see branches and debris swirling. Several people commented that afterwards they found their houses and cars were covered in shredded leaves and other debris.

Large projectiles were found to have flown some considerable distance. One lady said that she had left windows open and afterwards the carpets were covered with moss from the roof. She described it as looking like 'the floor of a woodland' after the event

It was shocking for all those who witnessed it and the devastation left behind. However the outpouring of concern, compassion and support that followed on various village social media forums was a testament to the wonderful supportive community that is this village.

Thank you to all those who came out to help clear up and support those who had suffered loss or damage. It is a huge relief that no-one appears to have been injured, and the village can even boast that we have a flying rabbit - who survived unscathed!

We request that anyone who lives, works or carries on business in the neighbourhood area of Cassington Parish should read the Neighbourhood Plan, Green Infrastructure Plan, Analysis of the Village Survey and the Design Code and, should they wish, respond to the plan and associated documents by email to: cassingtonclerk@cassington-pc.gov. uk or in writing to Ms T Cameron, 25 Lilac Way, Carterton OX18 1JH by the 18th of February.

The Parish Council and Neighbourhood Plan Committee would appreciate comments of support, additional suggestions or criticisms of the plans in order to include as wide a body of opinion on the plans as possible. #### Neighbourhood Plan.

The draft Neighbourhood Plan has been sent to Planning at WODC and we are awaiting the response from that. WODC has come back and advised that we don't need a SEA (Strategic Environment Assessment) or HRA (Habitats Regulations Assessment).

#### Horsemere Lane and Cassington Lights.

Tracey had a meeting with OCC with regards to Cassington Lights and how it will work on the A40. The PDF from the meeting is now on the website under Parish Council then Planning. The Parish Council also have another meeting on 24th November this will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting.

#### School crossing/20mph zone.

Tracey has now applied to OCC to have the speed limit reduced to 20mph. We should receive a response by the next Parish Council Meeting. The Parish Council are also asking OCC to move the speed monitor further up Eynsham Road so that it will pick up more car speed as they travel along Eynsham Road. Update still chasing.

#### War Memorial.

We have heard back from the War Memorial Trust. They have advised that they will not give permission for the discolouration to be dealt with.

#### Speed watch

Tracey has been in contact with Yarnton Parish Council and are looking at setting up a joint meeting with Thames Valley Police for camera training. – This is still ongoing

#### Walls both dry stone and pointed

The Parish Council intends to produce a register of all the walls in the village. Almost all are protected by planning however a register will offer further protection of this important aspect of our village. This is still ongoing

The Parish Council would like to ask if anyone in the Village would like to volunteer to do the wall survey. It will mean going round the village taking photos and measurements of all the stone walls. – if you are interested please contact the Clerk.

#### Precept


The Parish Council has decided on the precept for the next financial year. The increase will be 2.97% which takes the band D properties from £67.32 to £69.32

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### A new outdoor learning facility for St. Peter's School

After a very successful project to plant a native hedgerow around the periphery of St. Peter's, debate turned to what we might turn our attentions to next in our attempt to elevate outdoor learning opportunities for the children, whilst increasing the biodiversity value of our little village. Villagers of a certain age (50ish) will remember a time when there was a large pond within the grounds of the school, used by the teachers to learn about nature. Sadly, many years of neglect/lack of maintenance meant that the pond and the site in general had become very overgrown, resulting in the pond no longer being in existence. We therefore agreed

that we would restore the site and the pond to something like its former glory, with a view to the school using it as an outdoor learning facility.



The first task was to inventory the current wildlife use of the site in order to make sure that we were not going to contravene any protected species legislation. So in advance of any work, I undertook numerous wildlife surveys of the site, with a particular emphasis on locating any birds, bats, reptiles and amphibians that might have been there. Happily, as far as the restoration element goes, nothing of significance was revealed. We were good to go.

As we began to work on the site, it became evident that this was going to be a big job – much bigger in all honesty than I predicted, requiring some serious "toys" (diggers, chainsaws, fence augers, brush cutters etc.) and a lot of man hours to put the site back on track. Fortunately a number of villagers stepped in, some very extensively, to help deliver the end goal – and now is the time to extend my sincere thanks to them all.



The task would simply not have been possible without John Perrin coming along with his digger, to both clear large tracts of the site and to re-create the pond profile. Thanks also to Dave Butlin for undertaking a good deal of the tree work and heavy clearance. In order to make the site safe for the


children we needed to erect a significant amount of (costly!) fencing. This was very kindly donated by Kathie and Jim Thomson. Additional help was provided by Emily Lemaire, Lorna Mills, Billy Humphris, Bridget Sherlock, Kate Rogers, Cate Sirkett and Helena Nielsen. A special mention here to Alex and Candida Rogers and family, who despite the efforts of Covid and a global climate conference to speak at, managed to help out on several occasions. And finally – a MASSIVE thank you to my three compadre's on this project – Graham Mills, Matt Britton and Mark Finch. Collectively they supported the project throughout, selflessly giving their time, equipment, expertise and financial support to this crackpot idea of mine. Thanks fellas – I owe you!

Unfortunately, just as we were in the process of breaking out the champagne (well OK – beer), nature intervened in the form of some rather "unusual" weather, which resulted in two large trees coming down in the pond compound



(which we still need to attend to at the time of writing). Once this has been achieved, the school will have an outdoor area where the children can see and learn about the natural world up close and personal. I hope they enjoy it.

# A happy (folklore) Christmas from the Robin

For pretty much everyone the Robin is their favourite garden bird - energetic, confiding, and appealing to look at. But of course, at



this time of year the Robin moves centre stage as they adorn millions of Christmas cards, helping us celebrate this special time of year. As a birder and someone with a fascination for wildlife in folklore, they are a veritable treasure trove of stories to tell, so I thought I might share a few with you.

Pre-Victorian times the Robin was only (aptly) known as the redbreast, but as I have written before our Victorian forbears tended to give our most favoured feathered friends a Christian name as an indication of their affection for them (remember "Jenny" wren). And so, Robin redbreast became the bird's new moniker. It would appear however, that this was a short-lived title, with the Victorians dropping the "redbreast" opting just for Robin, which today is the birds most enduring name. Interestingly, the postmen during Victorian times wore a red uniform and were usually referred to as "Robins" by the public. It was also the Victorians who celebrated their affection for the Robin by selecting them to become the bird they most often drew/painted on their Christmas cards, delivered of course by a "Robin".

The iconic redbreast of the Robin is surrounded by myth, a good deal of which is religious in origin. It is suggested that the bird was an all-over brown colour until it visited Jesus on the cross. Depending on the source you consult, the Robin sang to Jesus as he lay dying on the cross or that he picked the thorns from the crown around his head. As the Robin did so his breast was stained by the blood of Christ. Another link between the Robin and Christianity comes from the story that as the baby Jesus lay in his manger the fire set to keep him warm began to fade and the Robin fanned the flames to keep the fire going, but in doing so burned his breast. Alternatively, the fire set to keep baby Jesus warm was large and began to shower sparks towards his manger, which the Robin caught on his breast. All these stories (and many more) forged the bond between the Robin, Christianity, and Christmas.



It is not all sweetness and light in terms of our appreciation for the Robin, as they are steeped in superstition. Where I come from (Yorkshire) if you are having a bad day/luck it is common place to remark "I must have killed a Robin", as it is a commonly-held belief that harming a Robin does not bode well. It was once thought that if you harmed a Robin that the hand that did the harm would tremor for the rest of your life. Even my Grandad would remind me as a child as I set out for a day's egg collecting (ahem!) "not to take a Robin's eggs". So many other stories surround the Robin and ill fortune. A commonly encountered old wives' tale is that if a Robin comes into your house or taps on your window, it heralds a death in your family. An addendum to this is that one coming into your house does not "count" if it occurs in November! I have tried to discover the origin of this but with no luck - so if you have an explanation – do let me know. The tapping on the window aspect of this superstition is interesting, as the Robin is fiercely territorial and of course if you see one tapping at your window it is attacking its own reflection as it misguidedly thinks there is an competitor on his patch.

So much has been written about our curious and often feisty garden friend, so obviously I could go on. Without doubt Robins are our most iconic bird, bringing joy to all of us who love wildlife and the wellbeing that this brings. I am sure one will be somewhere in your garden on Christmas day – look out of your kitchen window – you won't be disappointed.
