WODC is responsible for local services such as waste collection, planning, licensing, housing, parking and leisure with the county council delivering other services such as maintaining roads, adult social care, education, children's services and public health.

Gardening Tips for January

- Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring
- Dig over vacant plots that have not been dug already
- Disperse worm casts in lawns
- Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out
- Prune apple and pear trees
- Start forcing rhubarb
- Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the year.
- Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds

January stargazing highlights

January 2 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

January 3, 4 - Quadrantids Meteor Shower.

The Quadrantids is an above average shower, with up to 40 meteors per hour at its peak. The moon will set early in the evening leaving dark skies for what should be an excellent show. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Bootes, but can appear anywhere in the sky

January 7 - Mercury at Greatest Eastern Elongation.

The planet Mercury reaches greatest eastern elongation of 19.2 degrees from the Sun. This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the evening sky. Look for the planet low in the western sky just after sunset.

January 17 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be located on the opposite side of the Earth as the Sun and its face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Wolf Moon because this was the time of year when hungry wolf packs howled outside their camps. This moon has also been known as the Old Moon and the Moon After Yule.

They think it's all over! It is now!! - (Oh no it isn't!!!)

But I'm not talking about football or even Formula 1! I'm talking about Christmas.

Many of us, encouraged sadly by shops and media, have been conned into believing that Christmas starts in mid November (or even earlier) and then that it's all over after Boxing Day or, at the latest, New Year's Day. I even know of people who take their Christmas tree down before Christmas day!

Christmas Day is the beginning not the end of Christmas. The 12 days of Christmas start at Christmas Day and end at midnight on 5th January (which is "12th night"). The next day (6th Jan) is Epiphany, celebrated as The (3) Kings Day in many countries, when presents are exchanged (rather than on Christmas day). At Epiphany we celebrate the visit of the Magi (wise men) to the infant Jesus (maybe 2 years after his birth!). See Matthew chapter 2:1-12 page 2 if you have a Jubilee New Testament

At Epiphany we also celebrate Jesus being revealed (or manifested) as Christ or Saviour to all people, not just to the Jews. (The Magi were almost certainly not Jewish).

Christ's work as Emmanuel (God with us) starts here, it doesn't end here: even at, or after, Christmas; or on, or after, Epiphany; or even on, or after, Easter.

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
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CASSINGTON BURIAL GROUND AND CHURCHYARD



There are five burial Areas: A, B, C, D, E, F Areas A, B, and E are full and not being used for new burials.

Area F is full and not being used for new burials.

(There are a few plots which were reserved several years ago which will be used when required.)

Area C is being used for current burials.

Area D is being used for current interment of ashes.

Any person living in the parish of Cassington at the time of death is entitled to be buried in the churchyard. A oneoff fee is charged 'for the right of burial' at the time of death and a plot is allocated by the church office. (This charge also applies to reserved plots.)

Payment of the fee does not give the purchaser permission to do anything they please with the plot as there are statutory regulations for the use of churchyards and the erection of memorials (including size and type of stone), for which permission must be obtained from St Peter's Church. There are additional restrictions in Areas C&D.

Fees collected by the church are transferred to the Parish Council which is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of the burial grounds, although family members/ friends are encouraged to tend individual's graves.

Graves should be ground levelled, clear of vases, pots, plastic flowers, ornaments etc. in order to keep the area looking tidy and enable the use of mowers and strimmers.

AMENDED NOTICE

In the last edition of CAWN a regulation 14 notice was published concerning the Neighbourhood Plan, which assumed the Parish Council would approve the draft and allow publication for comment. However the Parish Council deferred approval until the January meeting to allow further time for perusal of the various documents. An amended notice is now published below:

Regulation 14 Notice: Cassington Village Neighbourhood Plan

Notice is hereby given that the Cassington Village Neighbourhood Plan, Green Infrastructure Plan, Design Code and Analysis of the Village Survey relating to the first two documents are due to be published on the Cassington Parish Council Website at: https://cassington-pc.gov.uk/ under the link Parish Council / Neighbourhood Plan on 10th January 2022

The Neighbourhood Plan is a statutory document which lays out guidance and suggested management of future development in Cassington Village. The Green Infrastructure Plan details the history of Cassington Village, the green infrastructure in and around the village as well as a variety of issues of importance to the residents, landowners and others with an interest in Cassington. The Green Infrastructure Plan is intended to inform the Neighbourhood Plan but also covers issues not covered by the Neighbourhood Plan and planning in general. The Village Survey was aimed to garner views from the residents of Cassington on matters related to how they would like to see the village develop in the future. The Design Code appraises the main village settlement, and its content has informed the design policies of the Neighbourhood Plan.

We request that anyone who lives, works or carries on business in the neighbourhood area of Cassington Parish should read the Neighbourhood Plan, Green Infrastructure Plan, Analysis of the Village Survey and the Design Code and, should they wish, respond to the plan and associated documents by email to: cassingtonclerk@cassingtonpc.gov.uk or in writing to Ms T Cameron, 25 Lilac Way, Carterton OX18 1JH by the 28th of February.

The Parish Council and Neighbourhood Plan Committee would appreciate comments of support, additional suggestions or criticisms of the plans in order to include as wide a body of opinion on the plans as possible. The documents can be provided in hard copy for people without access to the internet. Requests for hard copies should be sent to the Clerk of the Parish Council.

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New Year Resolutions

New Year is traditionally the time that people make resolutions. Generally these resolutions are to give something up, like smoking or drinking, or to try and achieve a goal, such as losing weight. But where does this tradition come from?

4,000 years ago the ancient Babylonians were the first recorded people to hold New Year celebrations, although these were held in mid March, when the crops were planted. During a 12-day religious festival known as Akitu, the Babylonians crowned a new king or reaffirmed their loyalty to the reigning king. They also made promises to the gods to pay their debts and return any objects they had borrowed. These promises are, perhaps, the forerunners of our New Year resolutions. If the Babylonians kept to their word, their gods would bestow favour on them for the coming year. But if they failed to keep their word, then they would fall out of favour!

In ancient Rome the Emperor Julius Caesar introduced a new calendar in 46 B.C. which declared January 1st as the start of the new year. This honoured Janus, a two-faced god who symbolically looked back into the previous year and forwards into the new year. The Romans would promise good behaviour for the year ahead, whilst making sacrifices to Janus.

In the Middle Ages knights would renew their vow to chivalry by placing their hands on a live or roasted peacock. The annual "Peacock Vow" would take place at the end of the year, as a resolution to maintain their knighthood values. In 1740, the English clergyman John Wesley, who founded Methodism, created the Covenant Renewal Service, most commonly held on New Year's Eve or New Year's Day. These services are also known as watch night services. Now popular within evangelical Protestant churches, especially African American denominations and congregations, watch night services held on New Year's Eve are often spent praying and making resolutions for the coming year.

Despite the tradition's religious roots, New Year resolutions are now, predominantly, a secular practice. Instead of making promises to the gods, most people make resolutions to try and "improve" themselves.

Events such as COP26, and numerous weather related disasters, have made us all increasingly aware of the issue of global warming, and it is incumbent upon each of us to do our bit to try and save our planet. So why not consider a New Year resolution this year to try and do something for our planet? Perhaps you can recycle or reuse items better, maybe cut down your consumption of meat or dairy – perhaps have a meat free meal once or twice a week, cut down on the number of plastic bottles you buy and look for food and drink in more sustainable containers, plant a tree, walk or cycle rather than drive somewhere.

There are lots of things we could all do if we set our minds to it. So maybe that should be our collective New Year Resolution. After all, in the words of a well known supermarket chain, "Every Little Helps"!

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
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ENTERTAINMENT FOR 2022 in the Village Hall

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RECIPE OF THE MONTH

At the time of writing there are no lockdown restrictions so hopefully you have managed to share your cheeses with family/friends but if you still have some cheese to use up here are some ideas other than cheese on toast!

First of all, hard cheese freezes well - grate it first then pop it in a suitable container or bag then pop into the freezer to use on top of pasta, pizza or add to soup and sauces.

If you are ready to use the cheese you could try one of the following recipes:

Cheesy pasta bake

Almost all pasta tastes better with lots of cheese, so make a white sauce (flour/butter/milk/pepper) and add any amounts of leftover cheese to use up.

To up the flavour add a teaspoon of Dijon or English mustard if you have it.

Add to just cooked pasta with any additional leftover ham/turkey along with broccoli florets and bake until bubbling.

Serve with extra grated cheese.



Cheese fondue

One for the kids - not a formal fondue but make a white sauce like above and add your cheese remnants. Serve with just about anything chopped to fit on the end of a fork and dip! Raw pepper, leftover cooked potato, tomatoes, turkey, ham or mushrooms work well as does crusty bread.

Cheese, veg, potato tortilla

'Spanishy' version of bubble and squeak. If using up leftover vegetables (sprouts, broccoli, leeks) and potatoes slice them prior to adding to a non stick frying pan with some butter. Warm through and crisp up the edges before adding: 6 beaten eggs

leftover cheese (blue cheese would work well in this recipe) salt and pepper and if you like some chilli flakes

Cook for 10 minutes on a low heat until the egg is set. A few minutes under the grill with an extra sprinkle of cheese makes it extra tasty.

Serve in large slices with a salad or with a fried egg and baked beans for brunch.

The Parish Council are also asking OCC to move the speed monitor further up Eynsham Road so that it will pick up more car speed as they travel along Eynsham Road. Update still chasing.

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


