Evidence that Neolithic man hunted Easter Eggs is found in Cassington

While excavating to create a new fire circle Kath Humphris and her team at Forest School Fun Under the Trees found some strange egg shaped stones. They called in the experts from Oxford University who concluded that these are fossilised Easter eggs from Neolithic times.



A full scale excavation of the site is now being planned. When asked about the discovery Kath said it was very exciting to find evidence of how our ancestors lived, although this does mean she has to find an alternative location for her Forest School.

In the meantime people are being asked to look out for the elusive Easter Bunny, as it has been suggested this might have been one of its original warrens, and it may still inhabit the area.

April stargazing highlights

April 1 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

April 16 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be fully illuminated. It was known by Native Americans as the Pink Moon because it marked the appearance of the moss pink, or wild ground phlox, one of the first spring flowers. This moon has also been known as the Sprouting Grass Moon, the Growing Moon, and the Egg Moon. Coastal tribes called it the Fish Moon because this was the time that the shad swam upstream to spawn.

April 22/23 - Lyrids Meteor Shower.

The Lyrids is an average shower, at its peak producing about 20 meteors per hour. It peaks on the night of the 22nd and morning of the 23rd. These meteors can sometimes produce bright dust trails that last for several seconds. Best viewing is from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Lyra, but can be anywhere in the sky.

April 29 - Mercury at Greatest Eastern Elongation.

This is the best time to view Mercury. Look for the planet low in the western sky just after sunset.

April 30 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky.

The Highway Code, neighbours, refugees and those in need,

You are probably aware that some new rules have been included in the highway code. In general the new rules are aimed at those driving or riding motorised vehicles giving greater consideration to (and in some cases priority to) all cyclists, horse riders and pedestrians. All of the 300 plus rules in the highway code are there to keep us safe and to help us to protect others – protect all "our neighbours" on the road.

One day a scholarly man comes up to Jesus and asks what he must do to obtain eternal life. Jesus says to him, "How do you read it in the scriptures – what do you think?"

The man answers, "To love God with all that you are and to love your neighbour as yourself".

Jesus says, "That's great - just do it."

However, the man says, "but who is my neighbour?"

Jesus then tells one of his most famous parables to get the man (and us) to figure out for ourselves who the neighbour might be who we are called to love. – The parable of "The Good Samaritan".

In Jesus' imaginary story a traveller is beaten-up and robbed and left for dead and two of his fellow countrymen "pass by on the other side" and give no help. However, a hated and despised foreigner - "a Samaritan" - goes to the man's aid. Jesus asks his questioner, "Who was the neighbour to the beaten-up and robbed man?"

The questioner cannot say "the Samaritan" because they were a hated race but just says "the one who helped him". Jesus says, "Go and do likewise".

With so many refugees fleeing Ukraine at the moment it is refreshing and amazing to see and hear of so many people in other counties, including our own, (and many from our village) ready to give money, clothes, food and even space in their own homes to these people in desperate need.

However, it is natural for us to respond more sympathetically to those who are 'close to home'. Those we see on our televisions who are 'like us', European, living lives similar to our own who we can identify with. Please don't get me wrong, these Ukrainian 'neighbours' do desperately need our help so please do continue to give in whatever way that you can to help these Ukrainian neighbours in their dire situation...

BUT, the real challenge of Jesus' parable is that the robbed man and the helper were not of the same race, culture or creed. In fact they were bitter enemies, and yet the Samaritan still helped the robbed and beaten man even though he had been left for dead by his own people. So, the question for myself is, "Who is my neighbour, and do I have limits to whom I consider my neighbour to be?"

Like the Highway Code the rules apply for all those "neighbours" in need of protection or who are vulnerable. Revd Roger Aston

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Village Hall AGM

22 February 2022

Chair's Review of the Year "Not just a building, but building a community".

How do we begin to sum up 2021? Another year we'll never forget? A year we'd rather forget? A year when the 'new normal' continued to mean 'abnormal'? Take your pick, and there are countless other options. For the Village Hall, 'valiant' seems appropriate. Our management team valiantly did its best to keep the place open and organise events; our dedicated manager valiantly succeeded in keeping on top of endlessly changing Covid requirements; and potential customers valiantly made occasional bookings even though their intentions often turned out to be frustrated.

Fortunately our income from lettings turned out better than first expected, with a total of £5,858 compared to £3,168 in 2020. That's nearly double, but still less than half our 'normal' which should be double again at around £12,000 a year to cover our core costs. Our events team Bryan and Adie did succeed with one live evening with comedian Shep Woolley, which was fairly well attended; and we re-started the cinema nights with three films but smaller audiences. The usual touring theatre companies abandoned their planned productions for 2021, and many people still seem cautious about indoor events. Our gross revenue from events and fundraising was £720 compared to zero in 2020. We also received donations of £125, plus around £250 investment income and Gift Aid.

But our overall income for the year came to a final total of £25,629, which is actually the most we've every achieved! In the last 'normal' year of 2019 for example, our income was £16,075. That's because once again our super-efficient treasurer Lorna Mills made sure that we applied for all the grants we were eligible to claim from the Government through WODC. As a result we received total grants of £18,675 to help cover the loss of income. Massive thanks to Lorna for sorting out all the paperwork so quickly and effectively.

Whether closed or open, the hall does cost money every day. Our expenditure last year was £7,823 before depreciation, well down on the previous year's costs of £12,605, but we had no major maintenance expenditure or new items last year. This was simply for our everyday running costs and the incidental maintenance issues that crop up. Many thanks to Dave and Malcolm who make sure that any problems get sorted out quickly and cost-effectively, often doing jobs themselves, and to Cassington residents Paul Woolford and Matt Terry who go over-and-above in support with plumbing and electrical problems.

So our finances are in still very good shape. After allowing for annual depreciation of £3,720, we had a surplus of £14,086 for 2021 (£2,284 net outgoing in 2020) and our cash position is stronger than ever. The new year 2022 has already begun and it's looking as though we may have fewer bookings this year too, and sooner or later the Government support schemes will presumably come to an end. So our cash balance will be vital to help us weather any storms ahead.

We're determined to press on with more live entertainment and our next event is Elephant Rock planned for Sunday 8 May 2022 at 6.30pm and particularly suitable for families. Past productions by this theatre company, The Bad Apple Theatre Group, have been extremely popular and successful. We're also investing in new equipment for the benefit of our customers, such as a replacement commercial dishwasher and the installation of a microwave oven. Let's all keep everything crossed!

Many thanks are due to all our hard-working volunteers on the committee: Penny Burroughs (Secretary), Dave Butlin (Buildings), Adie Gregory (Events), Lorna Mills (Treasurer), Bryan Partridge (Events and Vice-Chair), Sheila Nelson, Bridget Sherlock and Malcolm Teal. We owe especially huge thanks to our hall manager Kathryn Teal and our cleaner Pam Coates for their dedication and commitment. Our committee discussions were mostly about Covid risk.

Witney Rail project, February 2022 update

Witney Oxford Transport Group is a cross-party, voluntary organisation seeking to develop fast, reliable, sustainable transport solutions along the A40 corridor. Our primary focus is on restoring the rail link between Oxford, Eynsham, Witney and Carterton. This rail line would revolutionise travel in West Oxfordshire, with Oxford reachable from Carterton in 22 minutes, from Witney in 16 and from Eynsham in just 9.

Most of the proposed route follows the A40 very closely. It would run along the north side of the A40 as it passes Eynsham and then at the Eynsham roundabout it would leave the A40, and cross the fields to skirt around the western and northern perimeters of the village until it ultimately joins up with the existing railway line that passes under the road between Cassington and Yarnton. The nearest station for residents of Cassington would be the station at the new Eynsham Park and Ride site. There is no proposal to build a Cassington station. Whilst this may be disappointing for some people, it does mean that Cassington is less likely to have any large scale housing developments imposed.

Economically, it would encourage highly skilled employers to locate here, delivering high paying jobs. Environmentally, it would materially reduce West Oxfordshire's greenhouse gas emissions, roughly a third of which are generated from road transport. Socially, well, I don't need to tell anyone reading this of the frustrations and unreliability of the A40.

Our near-term goal has been to get the feasibility study done, so we all have hard data to review. To achieve this, we proposed a route; won support for the study from many parties including RAF Brize Norton, Oxford University, GWR, Carterton and Witney Town Councils and Eynsham Parish Council; and commissioned two projects. The outcomes of these projects gave the County Council sufficient comfort to fund the feasibility study. We hope the feasibility study will be conducted quickly and that the results of the feasibility study will be available in the summer.

This combined with the fantastic job our play leaders do in organising games at lunchtimes, encapsulates the spirit of the children at St Peter's.

We have already had a number of trips this term. Apple Tree class (nursery and reception) went to Farmer Gow's, near Faringdon, where they were able to have a very handson experience with many different farm animals. They thoroughly enjoyed their time and were a credit to the school with their exemplary behaviour. Oak class (year 1 and 2) went on a trip to Cadbury's world to support their current Africa and Fair Trade topic; as you can imagine, the children thoroughly enjoyed the visit! Willow class (year 5 and 6) have been to the Pitt Rivers Museum in Oxford to learn more about their Mayans topic. We are so lucky to have such a great resource on our doorstep; the children certainly made the most of the trip and came back with beaming smiles.

Thank you to the teachers for organising these trips — a huge amount of work goes on behind the scenes to make these trips so successful. INFORMATION FROM SSEN

The following information was provided by SSEN as a result of Storm Eunice, but is relevant whenever power is lost for an extended period.

Compensation for loss of power is governed by Guaranteed Standards of Service set by the regulator, Ofgem. Customers are eligible for £70 compensation under Guaranteed Standards if they have been without power for over 48hrs. A further £70 is due for each additional period of 12 hours in which supply is not restored, up to a cap of £700. Customers do not need to contact SSEN to receive this compensation. We will automatically issue a cheque to the address that was impacted by the storms based on the data we hold.

Where a customer has been without power since Friday and their Estimated Time of Restoration is later than Sunday evening, SSEN are offering to reimburse all reasonable costs for arranging alternative accommodation. Similarly, for these customers who have been without power since Friday, if you need to remain in your home due to circumstances such as mobility or COVID-19, SSEN are offering to reimburse reasonable costs for an evening meal or takeaway, up to the value of £15 per person and up to a maximum of £60 per household.

Eligible customers should book the accommodation and meals directly and retain all receipts which should then be sent to SSEN for reimbursement via the following link - https://tinyurl.com/EuniceClaim. All claims will be processed for reimbursement promptly once full restoration has taken place. We ask any customer in a vulnerable situation who may find it difficult to organise this for themselves to contact us so that we can look to support them on a case by case basis.

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Cassington Allotments Get Planting (and spawning)!

The days are getting longer, the weather warmer and less wet and the chiff chaffs have arrived on the allotment, which can mean only one thing, spring is here. Many of the allotment plots are looking very smart, with raised beds and new sheds. Luckily for the wildlife there are still areas of wilderness and bush, particularly at the ends of the plots and on the northern side of the plot. This is a haven for birds, attracting last year a range of birds including white throat, reed buntings, linnets, sedge warbler, willow warbler, garden warbler, black caps and others. Spring is when the migratory species arrive and establish territories and get on with the business of feeding and nesting in preparation for chicks. Several of the birds that use the allotments are RSPB Red Category birds meaning their numbers have drastically declined in the UK in recent years.

As with last year Sam Serra's ponds have attracted frogs leaving behind great gelatinous masses of black-eyed spawn. These are great predators of allotment pests, so we welcome them with open arms. The garlic is looking good, the onions coming through and the rhubarb is bursting forth and within



a few months will be producing in abundance. Potatoes and seeds are being planted or sown and allotmenteers are growing seedlings in their houses, cold frames or glasshouses. It is a busy time of year.



It is also a time of year to reflect on what has passed. Just 18 months ago our allotments were threatened with development. As a result of quick action amongst Cassington and

members of the Allotment Association the initial plan was rebutted and now things have gone quiet. The allotments were also declared an Asset of Community Value by West Oxfordshire District Council.

Members of the village have got together with the Parish Council and developed and submitted a Green Infrastructure Plan and Local Village Plan for Cassington. This has been out for comment on the Parish Council Website for several months and shortly we will revise the plan on the basis of comments received and then it will be put to the vote in the village. Keep an eye out in CAWN because this will be your opportunity to have a say in the future of the village.

The allotment has been in Cassington for over 100 years. Let's hope it is there for another 100 and continues to provide healthy food, greenspace and a place for wildlife to thrive for another 100.

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Recipe of the Month

Flourless Chocolate Orange Cake

Ingredients

2 small seedless oranges (such as navels)

6 large eggs

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

200g granulated white sugar

200g ground almonds

50g unsweetened cocoa powder

50g chocolate chips

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

Powdered sugar, for garnish

Method

Put the oranges in a large pot and cover with water by at least 2 inches. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for 1 1/2 hours, or until the oranges are soft. Remove from water, chop into quarters and place in a food processor or blender. If you can't get seedless oranges then you'll first have to remove the seeds. Everything else—skin, pith, pulp, etc. will go into the recipe.

Add the eggs, vanilla, sugar, ground almonds, cocoa powder and chocolate chips to the food processor or blender, and puree until very smooth (about 1-2 minutes). Add the baking powder and bicarbonate of soda, and mix again for 20 seconds or until evenly distributed.

Pour the mixture into a 20cm springform cake tin that you have greased and lined and bake 50 minutes to 1 hour, or until cake is set and a skewer inserted into the center comes out clean.

Let it cool in the pan for 15 minutes, then run a knife around the edges and remove the sides. Let cake cool completely before transferring to a serving dish.

Sprinkle with powdered sugar before serving, if desired

This is the most delicious chocolate orange cake I have ever tasted!

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
