July stargazing highlights

July 13 - Full Moon, Supermoon.

The Moon will be on the opposite side of the Earth to the Sun so its face will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Buck Moon because the male buck deer would start to grow new antlers at this time of year. This moon has also been known as the Thunder Moon and the Hay Moon. This is the second of three supermoons for 2022. The Moon will be near its closest approach to the Earth and may look slightly larger and brighter than usual.

July 28 - New Moon.

The Moon will be on the same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

July 28, 29 - Delta Aquarids Meteor Shower.

The Delta Aquarids is an average shower that can produce up to 20 meteors per hour at its peak. It is produced by debris left behind by comets Marsden and Kracht. The shower runs annually from July 12 to August 23. It peaks this year on the night of July 28 and morning of July 29. This is a great year for this shower because the new moon means dark skies for what should be an excellent show. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Aquarius, but can appear anywhere in the sky.



I do hope that you are enjoying the book "Our Faithful Queen" given to each household in Cassington and Worton, by

St Peter's church. If for some reason your household did not receive your free book please collect a copy from the church (which is open during the day). Also, if you would like an additional copy for friends and family please take an extra copy or copies from church for a donation of £1 each. Donations can be placed in the wall safe on the wall opposite the main door.

In Chapter 1 of the book page 8 the young queen is quoted as saying that she had not chosen "this office" but, having been appointed to it she felt called to follow God's will for herself echoing the prayer of Jesus' mother Mary, "Be it unto me according to your will (word)". Mary's response, in our modern translation, is in Luke chapter 1 verse 38, "I

am the Lord's servant... may your word to me be fulfilled." Which you can find on page 63 in the 2012 edition (p 62 in the 2022 edition)

This verse is in the account of the angel Gabriel foretelling the birth of Jesus to Mary and her acceptance and obedience to God's will. (You can read the whole passage from verse 26) We may not be visited by angels but seeking God's will for us and being obedient to it might be a good aim for us all – to have a "servant heart".



Recipe of the Month

Lemony Lamb.

Ingredients

Joint of lamb, preferably use lamb shoulder (bone in or out) just adjust timings to suit

Make a marinade from:
Zest and juice 1-2 lemons
4-6 cloves of garlic
Rosemary leaves from about 10cm of stem
Enough oil to make it gloopy

Method

Whizz, blitz or smash together the marinade ingredients in a pestle and mortar, but do not add any salt at this stage, so as not to dry out the meat.

Rub all over the meat, cover and leave for 4 – 24 hours

Next day - (or at least 4 hours later)

Season the meat with salt but don't remove the marinade. Roast at high temperature for 30-40 mins till skin has taken on a reasonable colour, then turn the temperature down and continue cooking till it is right for you. This is when you get some magic juices in the pan to make the gravy.

Turn the oven temperature back up to roast the spuds, while the meat is resting on a clean dish under a cover in a warm place.

Use the juices in the pan to make gravy by just adding flour mixing well and adding water, boil hard - long enough to cook out the flour, then transfer the gravy to a saucepan to make it easier to reheat just before serving.

You can add wine to the pan instead of all water, but it's probably not necessary as the marinade has made the juices very tasty.

I used 1.5 kg boned meat and it took an hour to cook and then rested it for an hour. You can adjust the quantities of marinade ingredients if you have a larger shoulder.

Thanks to my cousin Annie, for this delicious marinade for roast lamb.




Not another Power Cut!




Cassington and Worton friends, it's been a wonderful journey. It's 12:58am and I can't sleep because I'm thinking about how to write this month's entry.

Gardening Tips for July



- Sow spring cabbage, turnips, Oriental vegetables, chicory, fennel, and autumn/winter salads.
- Protect heavily-laden fruit tree and bush branches against snapping under the weight.
- If necessary, prune cherries straight after harvest.
- Check plants regularly for aphids.
- Keep an early eye out for the sunken brown patches of blossom end rot on tomatoes.
- Continue to hoe off weeds in dry weather. Done in wet weather, the weeds are liable to re-root
- Pull off suckers appearing around the base of fruit trees.
- Give regular liquid feeds to plants growing in containers.
