November stargazing highlights

November 4, 5 - Taurids Meteor Shower.

The Taurids is a long-running meteor shower producing about 5-10 meteors per hour. The nearly full moon will block out all but the brightest meteors. Best viewing will be just after midnight from a dark location. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Taurus, but can be anywhere in the sky.

November 8 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be on the opposite side of the Earth to the Sun so its face will be will be fully illuminated.

November 8 - Total Lunar Eclipse.

Sadly this eclipse will not be visible in the UK.

November 9 - Uranus at Opposition.

The blue-green planet will be at its closest approach to Earth and its face will be fully illuminated by the Sun and will be visible all night long. This is the best time to view Uranus; but it will only appear as a tiny blue-green dot in all but the most powerful telescopes.

November 17, 18 - Leonids Meteor Shower.

The Leonids produces an average of up to 15 meteors per hour at its peak. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Leo, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

November 23 - New Moon.

The Moon will be on the same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky.



A friend in need is a friend indeed

This is a strange saying. If you or I were in need and someone helped us they would certainly be a friend to us, the needy. But the saying implies that if we befriend someone when they are in need then they are a friend to us, the helper – it suggests a friendship the opposite way round. We are blessed in the action of helping them!

Sunday 6th November will be the last time that I will preach at St Peter's church as licensed "Associate Curate" to Cassington and Eynsham having reached 70 years of age. However, I will be leading the Remembrance Day services on 13th. Also, in the new year, I am sure that I will still be involved in church occasionally and still be allowed to do so as a "retired minister". However, the text for my last service as curate is the well-known, "Parable of the Good Samaritan" (Luke 10 verses25-37 page 79 In your Jubilee New Testament or page 77 in the later edition).

A religious teacher in Jesus' day wants to know who the "neighbour" is that he is supposed to love (according to their Jewish law) to get eternal life — as well as loving God that is! In answer Jesus tells the parable which we often call the "Parable of the Good Samaritan". Jesus talks of a man who gets robbed, beaten up and left for dead. In the story two of his own race "pass by on the other side". One is a priest and the other a Levite who know the law well. But it is a hated and despised Samaritan, of an alien race, that actually helps the victim at his own cost.

Jesus asks the religious teacher which of the three people in His story was the neighbour to the victim. He says "The one who had mercy on him." Notice that he can't even bring himself to say the name "Samaritan" because they were a despised race. Jesus says to him "you do the same".

We are all called to love God and love our neighbour, and our neighbour in need may not be someone that we actually know or even like. They may be local and of the same race, or far off in a distant country, not of our race or creed.

I believe that we are blessed by blessing others – not as a payment we deserve, but by God's grace in the joy of doing His will in helping others in need.

Also, in a way, the Samaritan in the parable shows us an image of Christ. Christ who reaches out to us who are in need and alienated from God by our sin and who brings healing and restoration at his own cost.



This year Remembrance Sunday falls on 13th November. The Poppy Appeal House to House Collection will take place once again.



CHECK BEFORE YOU CHUCK

WHAT YOU CAN AND CAN'T RECYCLE



Residents living in West Oxfordshire are asked to check the suitability of their waste for recycling before it goes in the blue-lidded wheeled bin or, in the case of glass, the black kerbside box, as the District Council lends its voice to this year's national Recycle Week (17-23 October).

The focus of the latest campaign by Recycle Now encourages householders up and down the country to 'get real' about recycling, in a push to keep up the quality of materials which can be simply and effectively reprocessed and to recycle more of the right materials more often.

The campaign is also highlighting the problems of putting unwanted items into the kerbside recycling purely in the hope that they will get recycled down the line and advises that putting in too many of the wrong things, can result in entire loads being rejected by the companies that reprocess the waste.

Councillor Lidia Arciszewska, Cabinet Member for Environment at West Oxfordshire District Council, said: "This year's Recycle Now campaign is about encouraging residents to use their kerbside services correctly to help the environment. West Oxfordshire's residents are some of the best recyclers in the country with around 58% of what is collected from homes going on to be recycled or composted. This is a great achievement and shows just how dedicated residents are when it comes to recycling.


"However, Recycle Week is an opportunity to highlight some of the issues that putting the wrong items out for recycling, or presenting them incorrectly, can cause.

"While collecting recyclables all together in a wheeled bin makes using the service easier for householders, this does mean that crews are unable to check everything which is being presented. It's only once the materials end up at the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF), where the items will eventually get sorted out, that we can gauge the quality of what has been collected. Needlessly transporting materials not destined for recycling costs time, wastes fuel and has implications for the environment and the sorting process. We're asking residents to get behind this year's campaign and check beforehand if they are unsure of what items are suitable to be recycled."

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Some of the most problematic items found in the Council's recycling bins are plastic sacks and carrier bags, plastic film, food and textiles.

To support the efficient recycling of materials residents are reminded that recycling must be put loose into the wheeled bin. As part of the separation process, recycling is loaded onto a conveyor belt where different methods - typically magnets, currents, and optical sorting - will be used to identify different materials and mechanically separate them back out. Bagged recycling disrupts this.

Stretchy plastics, such as bags and plastic film, also create an issue as they can easily catch in the mechanisms of the equipment at the MRF and cause the sorting process to be held up or halted until the troublesome items can be removed. This costs a lot of time.

In order to be reused or reworn, textiles must be dry but also clean. Therefore, any unwanted clothing and paired shoes should be bagged, with handles tied, and left beside the recycling bin on collection day.


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2023, A Year in Cassington

PHOTOGRAPHY COMPETITION

In 2023 Cassington celebrates 900 years of St Peter's Church. To mark this nonacentennial landmark CAWN will be running a photography competition to capture a snapshot of life in Cassington in 2023.

Starting in January 2023, there will be a new topic each month with prizes for the best photographs in both under 16 and over 16 categories. Twelve of the winning photographs will feature in a calendar for 2024 and, together with many of the other entries and images and stories from the past, we aim to produce a Commemorative Book to mark this milestone.

There will be a prize each month for the winning entries. Good quality photographs would be great, but more importantly we would like to capture moments in the life and spirit of our village, so a great snap taken on your phone will stand as good a chance of winning as something technically 'better'.

The aim is to have the calendars produced in time for Christmas next year, and the books will be available as soon as possible in January 2024. Look out for more details during the year. Topics and entry dates will be announced in CAWN. Further details can be found in the competition rules below.

We hope you will all join in the competition and help us to create an exciting record of Cassington in our time.

Who can enter?

- 1 The competition is free to enter and open to anyone living in or associated with Cassington or Worton during 2023.
- 2 Entries must be the work of the entrant and be taken in 2023.
- **3** Entrants will be considered to be in the under 16 category if they have not reached their sixteenth birthday at the time the photograph is taken.
- 4 Winners of monthly prizes are still allowed to enter again in other months.
- 5 If appropriate, and if not already a winning photograph, the same image can be entered for more than one monthly topic.

How do you enter?

- 6 Entries should be sent as email attachments to: chinton260@outlook.com and must be submitted by the entry date for each month's competition as advertised.
- 7 Entries should be submitted in jpeg format and be of good quality but a manageable size (approx 2 to 4mb would be fine, and most photos taken on a mobile should be good enough). If available, higher-resolution versions could be supplied for publication if appropriate.
- 8 Photographs can be cropped and adjusted for image quality but should otherwise be 'genuine' – not retouched or manipulated to create illusions or deceptions, or have elements added or removed.
- **9** Entrants may submit up to four images each month.
- 10 You should include in the covering email; your name, contact details and a title or caption for your picture. If entering in the under 16 category, please also supply your date of birth.

What else?

- 11 Before submitting your entries you should obtain the permission of people featured in your photograph for it to be entered into the competition and for it to be published in CAWN, the calendar and the book (or the permission of parents or guardians for photos of minors). This is not necessary for crowd scenes, but if some individuals are prominent the same rules apply.
- 12 As a record of life in Cassington in 2023, it would also be valuable for people to be identified by name, and very useful if this can be done when your picture is entered.

13 Be nice. Be positive. Please respect everyone's property and privacy. Do not trespass, and do not submit images which others may find intrusive or offensive. Any such images would be disqualified from entry and the photographer may be barred from the competition as a whole.

How will the competition be judged?

- **14** There will be a panel of judges: Anne Luttman-Johnson (editor of CAWN); Kevin Hinton (past editor of CAWN); Zoe Rogers (to give us a more youthful perspective).
- 15 The images submitted each month will be assessed 'blind' for quality, originality and interest, for how they best illustrate the topic of the month, and how they will contribute to a visual record of Cassington in 2023.
- 16 Where insufficient entries have been received, or a suitable winner cannot be found, the judges reserve the right to withhold the monthly prize, and where necessary select entries from other months for publication.
- **17** As ever in these sort of competitions the decisions of the judges are final.

What could I win?

- **18** Winners in both the under 16 and over 16 categories each month will receive a gift token to the value of £15 courtesy of a generous sponsor (sponsors to be confirmed).
- 19 The winning entries, and possibly those of the runners-up, will be published in CAWN. Overall winners will feature in the calendar, and many of the entries may be published in the Commemorative Book.
- 20 Winning entries chosen for the calendar will also receive a free calendar and, if published, a free copy of the Commemorative Book.

By entering the competition you will be deemed to have accepted these terms and conditions, obtained appropriate permissions, and to have granted permission for your images and information provided to be published in CAWN, in the Calendar for 2024, in the Commemorative Book and in associated displays and promotions.



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ST PETER'S SCHOOL

The start of the new academic year has been exciting, busy, and fun across the whole school.

Some recent highlights include our youngest children in Apple Tree class making bread as one of their Milestone Moments. Linking to our value of generosity, the children took the bread home to share with their families – so many life lessons in one experience!

Our Year 1 and 2 children in Oak class culminated their class topic with a Fire of London day which involved dressing up in period costume (including some children coming dressed as the fire!) and making models of Pudding Lane before recreating the fire by setting their buildings alight on the playground!

Year 3 and 4 in Maple class had Stone Age day where they invited 'The History Man' to give a first-hand experience of what life was like in the Stone Age. Children developed their pre-historic art skills, learned how to grind wheat and barley, and attempted making fire by rubbing sticks.

Year 6 visited Rewley Road Fire Station for a Junior Citizens course. This was an extremely valuable experience going through real life scenarios such as calling the emergency services in the event of an accident and identifying how they can keep themselves safe at rivers and near rail tracks for example. Just before Christmas year 5 and 6 will be going on residential for a week to Yenworthy in Devon.

We have organised the new Pupil Leadership Groups for this year. Have a look at our website for the targets each group wants to achieve this school year (https://www.st-petersoxon.co.uk/pupil-leadership-groups). We will focus on the achievements of one group each month and this month we can report that the chicken leaders are doing a fantastic job of caring for our rescue chickens who are now enjoying a new, and much happier life, with us at St Peter's! We now have eight chickens in total, with three being rescued last week.

In previous years, our chosen charity to support has been the Marine Conservation Society which. This year we have changed to Oxfordshire Wildlife Rescue (https://www.oxfordshirewildliferescue.com) which is very appropriate for the children at St Peter's. Our youngsters have a genuine passion for wildlife and have loved being involved in our new pond, for example. At lunchtimes, children independently make their own bug houses and animal hospitals where worms can convalesce in peace!

Christmas is coming! Our Christmas fair is planned for Friday 2nd December and we would love you to join us. There will be craft stalls, raffles, games, refreshments and lots more. We are also hoping for a visit from Father Christmas himself! Covid largely stopped us in our tracks with how much we could share what we do with the community, so we are very happy to open our doors to you once again to come and join in the festivities and have a look around! We are looking forward to seeing you there.

CLIMATE AND ECOLOGY BILL



West Oxfordshire District Council passed a motion to show its full support for the

Government's Climate and Ecology Bill at a meeting of Full Council on 19 October 2022.

If passed the Climate and Ecology Bill will call on the Secretary of State to publish and lay before Parliament a strategy to set a limit to, and reduce carbon emissions and restore and expand natural ecosystems within 12 months of the Act being passed.

The Council has also committed to write to the cross-party campaign group Zero Hour to express its support for the Bill and asking MP Robert Courts to also show his support.

Andrew Prosser, Cabinet Member for Climate Change added, "We have already committed to action to shape a district where the climate and ecology is at the heart of everything we do."

"We have pledged to achieve carbon zero by 2030, and are determined to achieve this target at a local level. But, we need an overarching national strategy to make a collective and real difference to climate change."

BLENHEIM

We are pleased to share an exciting update on our Lake Dredge...we have now removed 100,000 cubic metres of silt from the Queen Pool! Altogether there is 300,000 cubic metres to remove which means we are now a third of the way there. Silt is fine grains of rock, smaller than sand, that build up over time. The silt in the Lake had built up so much (the last dredge was over 100 years ago) that the water is currently only 30cm deep, however it should be around two metres to support the existing ecosystem and the creatures who depend on it. The silt is being removed by leading wet civil engineering firm Land & Water who maintain and enhance the UK's network of waterways.



Digital Pathways

Across our Estate we are updating our permissive pathway signs to include a QR code. In this exciting project we've joined forces with Natural England, the University of Oxford, Oxfordshire County Council, the Ramblers, Greenspace Hack and Editions Systeme D. A series of QR codes will be located on posts along the route allow people to feed back on the current state of the pathway, its suitability for different uses and to report any issues. In addition to logging details, you can also scan the codes to get more information on your surroundings, conservation projects, nearby points of interest, local wildlife and seasonal changes.

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Recipe of the Month

Although chestnuts are a little pricey a few go a long way and provide plenty of nutrition. First off a lovely, smooth soup with some crisp bacon or pancetta to add texture (if you are vegetarian some parmesan crisps or kale crisps would be just as delicious).

Then, as November includes stir up Sunday, a chestnut stuffing to stash smugly in your freezer to serve alongside the turkey — make this one towards the end of November. A vegetarian version is easy — switch out the bacon for fried mushrooms or smoked tofu cut into strips and fried off. This stuffing can then be used to make a vegetarian main course.

Chestnut Soup

with bacon/pancetta crisps or crispy kale/parmesan crisps.

500g cooked chestnuts

- 1 large carrot chopped
- 1 litre chicken or vegetable stock not too strong in taste Good knob of butter and a tablespoon of olive oil Small bunch of sage leaves
- 5 or 6 shallots chopped (or one large Spanish onion)
- 2 cloves garlic, roughly squashed

Salt and pepper and a pinch of chilli flakes

Saute the shallots and garlic until soft and golden. Add the chestnuts and stir around until coated in oil and butter. Pour in the stock, add a sage leaf or two and simmer for 20 minutes until everything is really soft. Remove the sage leaves and blend until really smooth, check the seasoning and add more stock if you like.

Parmesan crisps – simply sprinkle a good helping of grated cheese onto a silicon sheet and pop in oven until melted and slightly golden around the edges – remove and allow to cool before using.

Kale crisps – remove the thick stems and put the leaves in a bowl with a tiny bit of salt and some oil – using your hands, smoosh everything together so all the leaves are coated. Pop on silicone sheet into oven at 180 degrees and cook for around 15 mins – cool before using – this is when they crisp up.

This is a rich soup so best followed by a crisp green salad dressed with walnut oil vinaigrette served with some goat cheese and walnuts.

Chestnut stuffing

This could be easily converted into a nut roast en croute by taking out the sage (add whichever herbs you fancy – thyme, herbes de provence etc) upping the number of chestnuts and adding some walnuts, hazelnuts and dried cranberries. Cook in a loaf tin, allow to cool and wrap in puff pastry brushed with egg wash before cooking.

125g Breadcrumbs

450g cooked chestnuts

50g Smoked Lardons / mushrooms or smoked tofu

1 Egg

1 large onion chopped finely

50g melted butter

Seasoning and sage or thyme or a mix of both – be generous it needs a fair amount of flavour.

Fry the onion as for the soup – not brown but nicely soft. Add the chestnuts broken into approximately quarters. Fry the lardons/mushrooms or tofu until well browned. Add to onions and other ingredients in bowl. Give everything a really good stir. To test the flavour cook a morsel and taste it. This freezes really well but do wrap it up properly – I put it in the dish I intend to cook it in but if you can't do that just a freezer box or bag is fine.

To cook put in the oven at 180 degrees for about 30 minutes – this depends on the form you have decided to cook it in – don't let it go dry.

- Insulate outdoor containers from frost bubblewrap works well.
- Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem.
- Stop winter frost damage to fruit trees using grease bands around the trunks.
- Put out bird food to encourage winter birds.
