January stargazing highlights

January 3, 4 - Quadrantids Meteor Shower.

The Quadrantids is an above average shower, with up to 40 meteors per hour at its peak. It is thought to be produced by dust grains left behind by an extinct comet known as 2003 EH1, which was discovered in 2003. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Bootes, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

January 6 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be located on the opposite side of the Earth as the Sun and its face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Wolf Moon because this was the time of year when hungry wolf packs howled outside their camps. This moon has also been know as the Old Moon and the Moon After Yule.

January 21 - New Moon.

The Moon will located on the same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky.

January 30 - Mercury at Greatest Western Elongation.

The planet Mercury reaches greatest western elongation of 25 degrees from the Sun. This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the morning sky. Look for the planet low in the eastern sky just before sunrise.

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
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BRIAN MILLER HAWES 27.8.43 - 3.12.22

West Oxfordshire District Council Support



WODC has announced a wide range of

support to help local community groups and individuals who may be struggling during the cost of living crisis.

Councillor Joy Aitman, Cabinet Member for Stronger Healthy Communities, said "We will be providing £40,000 in funding and the use of council storage facilities to our local food network, as well as recently offering a further £50,000 to support local groups who are running schemes tackling isolation, health and wellbeing. The Council will also be providing dedicated support to help these groups.

Councillor Andrew Prosser, Cabinet Member for Climate Change, said, "To help people who can't pay their bills we are extending the criteria for our fuel poverty grants so more people are eligible. We are also working closely with partners to deliver the Sustainable Warmth and Home Upgrade Scheme, which provides people on low incomes advice and support with making their homes more energy efficient." The Council has agreed a total fund of £200,000 to help with the cost of living crisis. The Council has opened up a grants scheme to financially support local groups helping their community through the cost of living crisis. 18 groups have been given funding following applications earlier in the Autumn.

The Council is running a campaign to help people know what support is available to them both nationally and locally. Residents can visit www.westoxon.gov.uk/ costoflivingsupport to find out more. The site also includes a link to the Better Housing Better Health service which provides proactive advice for people seeking to reduce their energy usage and energy bills.

The Council are supporting the national Warm Welcome scheme which helps local groups set up warm spaces. The Council is encouraging groups to register their warm spaces on the site www.warmwelcome.uk/

Councillor Aitman added, "I would like to encourage anyone who is struggling to reach out, whether that's to a local group, your council or an organisation like Citizens Advice. There are people there who genuinely want to help and will do so sensitively and confidentially."



With their usual aplomb, the Players served up their own take on all of our favourite characters, with every scene beautifully stitched together by the showstopping Glinda and her poetic

prowess. A wisecracking terrier, a less than ferocious lion, the wicked witch of the west (Oxford District Council), the wonderfully costumed tin man and scarecrow and of course Dorothy, were all on view.

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Recipe of the Month

No turkey leftovers here I promise! Time perhaps for something soothing but not too heavy to make up for all that eating during the Christmas and New Year party season.

Shellfish are particularly good at this time of year and mussels are quick and easy to prepare for a lovely light supper. If you want to go for it cook up some really good home-made chips but this dish is pretty good with an excellent baguette or two.

This is my version of a French mussel dish called Mouclade for 4 people.

Mouclade

Ingredients:

6 shallots

3 cloves garlic

Butter for frying

1 Kg Mussels – buy them ready cleaned or if not remove the 'beards' and tap any open ones – if they remain open discard them.

1 bottle of dry cider

Crème fraiche – to taste but around 3 tablespoons

2 teaspoons of curry powder – generic, the kind you might be rather snobbish about, it works here I promise! Chopped Coriander

Method:

Cut up the shallots and crush the garlic. Cook the shallots gently in a generous amount of butter until soft before adding the garlic and curry powder. Add the cider and bring to a simmer – have the saucepan lid ready – gently pour in the mussels and slap on the lid. Cook for only a couple of minutes until the mussels have all opened. Drain saving the juices for the sauce.

Now, you can take off the shells of the mussels or leave them on, up to you, but make sure you only serve ones which have opened. Keep the mussels to one side while you finish the sauce.

Bring the sauce up to a simmer, add the crème fraiche and adjust seasoning. Throw in some chopped coriander and the mussels. Gently heat through and serve immediately.

For a vegetarian version in place of the mussels use firm tofu which you have pressed for an hour, rolled in cornflour fried in batches then drained. Make the sauce and then add the tofu at the end to warm through. The tofu version might be rather good with rice.

Parish Council News

The Minutes from the last Parish Council meeting were not available in time this month, however the main issue at the last meeting was the proposed solar farm. Alex Rogers has kindly prepared a report on this.

A Utility-Scale Solar Power Station in West Oxfordshire


As many of you will now be aware a company called Photovolt Development Partners (PVDP) have proposed a scheme called the West Botley Solar Farm on land in three areas to the west of Oxford including to the north of Cassington. This proposal is actually for a utility-scale solar power station, in other words a development so large it counts as national infrastructure. Covering an estimated 1,400 hectares (3,460 acres) of farmland this 840-megawatt power station will be in the top 20 globally. The proposal aims to cover most of the land between Cassington, Bladon and Oxford Airport in solar panels, running up to the northern boundary of the village and sport fields. It will convert the farmland over which many homes look, and which also surround the main footpaths used by Cassington residents to an industrial landscape.

Utility-scale renewable energy schemes are needed by the UK and other countries to cut CO 2 emissions which are driving dangerous climate change. Renewable energy comes in different forms including wind energy, predominantly being developed offshore in the UK, hydroelectric power, tidal and wave energy and solar. Of these forms of renewable energy solar is the least efficient and also, as we are realising with the West Botley development, has a very large footprint in terms of the land it takes up. All but one other utility-scale solar power stations in the top 20 globally are located in deserts, arid land or degraded land because there are few people, few other human activities and they have a lot of sunlight and little rain.

We have now gone through the Phase 1 Community Consultation Process with PVDP which comprised the circulation of a leaflet, information events, one of which was held in Cassington and several questions and answers sessions with Dominic Hare, a representative from Blenheim Estates (Bladon Parish Council event on the 28 th November and Cassington Parish Council Meeting 1st December). Following these consultations there will be several further steps before a formal application is made to the Secretary of State. Because this is counted as national infrastructure it avoids the usual local planning process.

During the consultation some misconceptions may have a arisen as a result of statements made in the Community Consultation Leaflet and by representatives of PVDP and Blenheim Estates. I thought I would take this opportunity to clarify some of these areas of confusion.

Discussions with representatives indicate that this proposal arose as a result of PVDP sending out land agents to find landowners with large tracts of land which they might make available for large-scale solar schemes. Blenheim Estates and Merton College are two landowners who have stepped forward to offer their land. Much of the land to the north of Cassington is Grade 3B, land which has moderate productivity for cereals, and which offers good quality grassland for grazing or cutting (this is why Yarnton meadows were famous in the past for the quality of hay). The government has, after lobbying by the solar industry, allowed development on Grade 3B land.



What this has meant for our local farmers who have had tenure over Blenheim Estate's farmland (land historically seized from Cassington farmers during the 1801 Enclosure) is they have been excluded from farming to allow for this development. Farming is still an important aspect of life in Cassington, not just as employment but also in terms of the rural setting and changes in the landscape with the seasons. For the residents of Cassington important space for running and walking will no longer be surrounded by farmland but will be surrounded by arrays of solar panels which are also likely to be fenced in because of the need to hold sheep for cropping of grass. People who live on the north side of the village will have views of fields turned to a sea of glass. Exposure to nature and outdoor exercise have positive benefits for physical and mental health so this will negatively impact on the wellbeing of Cassington villagers. This whole development has significant implications in terms of social justice for our villagers in Cassington, Jericho Farm, Worton and also our tenured farmers.

Understanding the environmental impacts of this development is difficult because so little research has been done in the UK and elsewhere on utility-scale solar power stations and their effects on drainage and wildlife. Evidence suggests that solar panels increase runoff from the land, a very concerning prospect for Cassington, Jericho Farm and Worton because of their recent history of flodding resulting from runoff from the hills to the north of Cassington. For wildlife solar arrays appear to pose a specific risk to birds and bats. This is because some birds (especially waterbirds) mistake solar arrays for water and collide with them. Bats are attracted to solar arrays because insects are attracted to them. Given Cassington's proximity to the filled gravel pits along the A40 which are home to resident and migratory waterbirds this is a concern. Declining farmland birds such as yellow hammers and linnets, frequently seen in the fields around Purwell Farm are also likely to be negatively impacted by this development. Fencing will also restrict the movement of mammals such as deer, foxes and hedgehogs, thus fragmenting habitat.

As with previous development proposals in Cassington this one very much follows the "decide-announce-defend" approach seen in elsewhere in the race to develop solar energy. This is not a consultative process in the true sense involving input from the local community which is given strong weight in deciding on whether the solar power station will go ahead and if it does, what form it will take. This typifies the democratic deficit experienced in planning in the UK where there is an absence of policy or planning for strategic development of solar energy at a national and regional level. Many of the "facts and figures" presented in the Consultation Leaflet are guestionable and many details of the development unclear. The contention that the solar power station must be sited in Oxfordshire to supply local needs when we have a national grid capable of transmitting power almost anywhere in the country is nonsense.

Cassington Parish Council has responded to the Phase One Consultation in full, with a number of questions for the developer which will soon be posted on the Cassington Parish Council website (https://cassington-pc.gov.uk/). We will be watching this development closely, working collaboratively with other Parish Councils affected and responding to the proposal at appropriate stages of the planning process. We very much encourage Cassington residents to monitor this development and to also respond when possible. News from Merilyn, the Community Lead at Blenheim.

The trial forms part of our ongoing innovation partnership with the University of Oxford which is celebrating its three-year anniversary in 2022.

West Oxfordshire District Council Budget



WODC has launched a consultation on ^{DISTRICT} the plans for its budget for the next financial year.

Councillor Dan Levy, Cabinet Member for Finance, said; "The District Council is facing a number of financial challenges as a result of increased costs due to inflation, over a decade of funding cuts and the expectation that Government will further reduce funding for local services. This year we have announced £750,000 of one-off money to invest in local projects including £200,000 to support communities through the cost of living crisis, £100,000 for Youth Initiatives, £100,000 for Environment and Community Projects and £75,000 additional funding to replace two street sweepers with electric vehicles instead of diesel."

The District Council only receives around 10% of a council tax bill, with the rest going to the County Council, fire service, police and parish councils. With that money the council delivers over 50 services including waste collections, planning services, help for homeless people, leisure centres and many others.

Cllr Levy continued, "I encourage all residents of the district to give their views on our budget before we set out a final budget in February 2023."

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
