February stargazing highlights

February 5 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Snow Moon because the heaviest snows usually fell during this time of the year. Since hunting is difficult, this moon has also been known by some tribes as the Hunger Moon.

February 20 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

Cassington Boxing Day football match 2022

Under a beautiful blue near cloudless sky, on a remarkably grassy pitch, the annual Cassington football classic took place again on Boxing Day. Desperate for revenge after the previous year's thrashing, the Singles had something to prove. And with age, pace and agility on their side, plus no shortage of skill, they lined up hopeful though short on numbers. The Marrieds meanwhile, still basking in the previous year's glory, had more than a full complement of players, so had the luxury of rotation and even loans to the Singles.



Ref Stuart got the game underway with whistle number 1. And it was, without exaggeration, one of the best halves for years. Fine play, 3 excellent goals apiece, and a notable lack of questionable tackles, all made for a great watch from the side. So it was finely poised at half time.

The second half turned out to be a slightly different story. Whilst Graham Mills was happy on loan as he got to wear a red kit, he was less happy to concede a penalty for his adopted team (which was dispatched clinically by Sean Osgathorp). And with a second penalty conceded (for handball) things started to look somewhat ominous for the Singles. And despite plenty of possession for the Singles and efforts on goal, in the end the finishing prowess of the Marrieds carried them to a margin of victory that seemed unlikely at half time. So congratulations to the Marrieds on what was a calm, measured and well deserved 7-4 win.

Despite being on the losing team, I'd give Player of the Game to Richard Petty, who in his Boxing Day debut, showed terrific control and assured finishing.

The legendary Cassington Boxing Day football match delivered once again - thoroughly enjoyed by a sizeable crowd. The Singles will be desperate for a win next time, and we've less than a year to wait to see if they can do it. Lionel Bolton



'Cassington Over 900 Years'

by St Peter's School

Created by all the children at St Peter's School during two days in December 2022, this artwork is a collaboration between the school, the Friends of St Peter's Church and Cassington-based artists.

The artwork is 7 x 1.5 metres and reads from left to right, showing objects, people, animals and activities that represent life across the centuries from 1100 to the present day; and has St Peter's Church depicted in 8 panels, at the heart of it all. The top and bottom frieze, created by Apple Class, the youngest children in the school, is a motif taken from the interior of the Church's South door. They sponged, painted, crayonned and stencilled to create the effect. To achieve the overall artwork, the 90 panels and frieze have been assembled on a single sheet of paper mounted on a wooden frame.

The project was launched with a whole-school session led by John Hemingway, project sponsor. The children and staff met with the artists to explore the history of Cassington and artistic techniques. Jim Hague played live some folk tunes appropriate to different eras.

Among the older children, reception to 11 yr olds, each class researched a different era and came up with aspects of Cassington life to depict:

Oak Class – Middle ages Maple Class – Tudors, Elizabethans, Civil War Willow Class – Industrial revolution up to modern day Each child created their own panel expressing their individual interest in occupations; events; activities; landscape & environment; domestic life; buildings; transport; fashion; music; weapons; communications as they were relevant to their era. The classes worked together to ensure a wide spread of unique subjects and made drafts before their final pieces.

The background colours, running horizontally in bands, represent the unchanging natural landscape of Cassington: fields and grassland; rivers and streams; woods; sky. These link all the subjects together, whilst the subjects themselves show the progression and increasing complexity of life over the centuries.

The main medium was acrylic paint and this is complemented by oil pastels and collage. The children developed their skills in using the different mediums, working at scale and with colourful impact for an audience looking up from a distance of several metres.

The Friends of St Peter's Church met all costs and provided materials and equipment for the artwork and these remain in school for future children's art activities.

Finally, a huge thanks to all who participated: the children, learning support assistants, teachers, head teacher Jon Jeffries, artists Kevin Hinton, Sue Hemingway and Hannah Farncombe, Dan Bakewell from Fineprint, Friends of St Peter's Jan Macdonald and, of course, our sponsor and carpenter John Hemingway who had the inspiration and supported every aspect.

St Peter's School Art Club's 'Historical Figures'

led by Jess Jones

Placed around the Church were nine large standing figures representing Cassington's historical links with both local and national events over the centuries. Based on initial text and picture research undertaken by John Hemingway and Hannah Farncombe, the children at Art Club chose the character they wanted to portray and used a variety of mediums. They worked in small groups over a term and wrote about their character and their choice of mediums.

For this project, Art Club was joined by five Year 7s from Bartholomew (former St Peter's students), Sue Hemingway and Hannah Farncombe. Thank you to Dan Bakewell and the Friends of St Peter's Church for providing paper, card and constructing wooden stands.



After the event Jess Jones said "The children have been so hardworking and joyful. Considering they're aged between 8-11 to be working for 10 weeks on one project requires some perseverance. Absolutely every single thing in the art work was their own work – they learnt how to do proportion and faces, use collage and tonal acrylic to create folds in the fabric. They thought really carefully about the personality of the character and facial expressions. I am so proud of what they achieved."

900s-1000s – Aelfric, Abbot of Eynsham

Aelfric was the biggest writer in Old English. He was very important in making sure the Church was established in England, by translating the first 6 books of the Bible from Latin into Old English. This was the first time the Old Testament had been translated in this country. Eynsham Abbey was very important in Christianity in Britain and Aelfric was it's most admired and famous abbott.



Aelfric wrote a huge collection of Saints' Lives. He wrote about a monk called Cuthbert who lived in the 8th century on an island called Lindisfarne off the north East Coast. He tells how Cuthbert loved nature and could speak with animals. He made a deal with the geese around his hut so they didn't snatch straw from the roof. He would go into the freezing sea to pray all night. In the morning, otters came out from the sea to warm Cuthbert's feet.

He also tells the story of a young woman called Euphrosyne who did not want to get married. To escape her father she manages to gain entry to a monastery disguised as a man. She lived there undetected for 38 years until she died.

During Aelfric's lifetime the British Isles was repeatedly attacked by Vikings. Many of Aelfric's works try to inspire the English people in the time of such trouble.

1123 Geoffrey De Clinton


Geoffrey had St Peters Church built. He was King Henry I's treasurer and chamberlain and was appointed by the king to be Sheriff of Warwickshire. He became one of the richest people in the country at the time, but he was suspected by his enemies of financial misdealings whilst in the king's service. Geoffrey is said to have paid King Henry around £2000 to make sure his nephew, Roger, was elected Bishop



of Coventry. He was a very influential Roman Catholic, so he is buried in the sacred site of Walsingham.

Knees crossed in tombs mean this knight went on 2 Crusades: wars to make Jerusalem Christian. People went on the Crusades to fight for different reasons. The First Crusade began in November 1095 when the Pope proposed for people to go to Jerusalem. They would be forgiven for all of the bad things if they did this, as well as money and honour. People wanted to take Jerusalem from the Muslims. They also thought that doing this would be a way to be spiritually better.

"We had the choice of Jeffrey or Henry 1 – we choose Jeffrey because he looked the coolest. We used fishing net to make his chain mail. We spent 2 or 3 weeks layering to make the wound on his arm!"

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Update on the West Botley Utility-Scale Solar Power Station

As most of you will be aware Photovolt Development Partners (PVDP) are proposing an 840 MW utility-scale solar power station over 1,400 ha of land (1,000 ha of solar panel arrays) in three areas west of Oxford. This includes most of the land between Cassington and Oxford and will be visible over almost all the fields to the north of our village. The planning proposal process will run according to the regulations in the Planning Act of 2008. There are 6 phases:

- 1. Pre-application (current phase; Spring 2023)
- 2. Acceptance of the scheme for full proposal
- 3. Pre-examination
- 4. Examination (2024)
- 5. Recommendation (early 2025)
- 6. Post decision

The Pre-application stage has two Phases. Phase 1, initial community consultation has already taken place. This comprised the circulation of the Phase One Community Consultation Leaflet and the village community information meetings. During this phase stakeholders were encouraged to submit their feedback on the proposal to PVDP by the 15th (later 22nd) of December. It is notable that many aspects of the planned solar power station were not available at this stage. A Phase 2 Communuity Consultation is planned for the Spring of 2023. This will be based on more detailed design proposals.

It is crucial that all households comment on the Phase 2 Consultation when it is announced. PVDP will be responsible for taking on the comments made by stakeholders (i.e. us) during both of these consultation phases. They have to produce a Statement of Community Consultation detailing meetings, promotional materials, and other ways in which developer has engaged with the community. The District Councils affected by the development, including WODC must respond to this document in 28 days.

District Councils will also prepare a Local Impact Report which is an important document for representing the views of local stakeholders on the proposed development and its actual/potential impacts on them. It is therefore important that you copy letters you send in response to the Phase 2 Consultation to the Parish Council and your District and County Councillors, Andy Goodwin and Dan Levy (andy.goodwin@westoxon.gov.uk; dan.levy@oxfordshire.gov.uk). Engagement with the planning process from all stakeholders is absolutely essential. Organisations and interested parties will have the opportunity through the planning process later in the year to register themselves as interested parties providing the opportunity to directly address the planning inspector.

I have been asked by residents whether the Parish Council will produce a standard letter of objection for Parishioners to sign. We will not do this because the inspector will simply treat all such letters as one objection. We recommend you read the documents include the Cassington Parish Council

responses to the consultations under Planning on the Parish Council website (see: https://cassington-pc.gov.uk/planning/botley-west-solar-farm/). You can then use these as inspiration for your own responses to the scheme when the opportunity comes later this spring.


At present the affected District Councils are discussing coordination of responses to the Botley West Solar Power Station proposal. The Stop Botley West Action Group (https://stopbotleywest.com/), based in Bladon, is coordinating actions against the proposal from Parish Councils, local groups and concerned residents. They are looking for people with expertise and skills that can assist them in fighting this proposal. There is also a petition on Change.org which you can sign via this website under "Take Action".

Please visit this website to find out more information and give your support! I also ask for any residents of Cassington and Worton who wish to join a Parish Council sub-committee to fight the West Botley Solar Power Station proposal to contact me - arogers@cassington-pc.gov.uk or the Parish Council Clerk - cassingtonclerk@cassington-pc.gov.uk. Time is of the essence as we do not have much time to respond to the Phase 2 Consultation once the revised plans are published.

1852 – 1885 Christian Frederick Cole,

Barrister

Christian was the first African barrister to practise in the English courts. Originally from Sierra Leone, then a British colony, he was the first black graduate (1876) of the University of Oxford.





Sierra Leone. He enrolled at Oxford as a non-collegiate student with the Delegacy of Unattached Students (now St.Catherine's College) in 1873, studying classics. His student contemporaries included the author Oscar Wilde.

Christian paid his way by teaching one of the qualifying exams for Oxford degrees and also music lessons. His classes were reportedly popular, indicated by the fact that when his uncle died and his financial situation worsened, fellow students and the then Master of University College raised money to help him. He graduated in 1876 and in November of that year was accepted as a member of University College, a position he held until April 1880. He courageously took a very visible role in the life of the college, including speaking at the Oxford Union.

In 1880 he returned to Sierra Leone, but did not find employment, so came back to England to train as a barrister. He joined the Inner Temple in 1883, thus becoming the first black African practising in English courts. He later went to Zanzibar to continue his career in law.

He died of smallpox in 1885, at the early age of 33. On 14 October 2017, a plaque honouring Christian Frederick Cole was unveiled on University College's exterior wall, in Logic Lane, opposite the college's law library.

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SPORTS AND SOCIAL COMMITTEE 2021-22 AGM

The Sports and Social Committee held a very belated AGM for the year April 2021 - March 2022 on 8th January 2023! The Chairman gave her report. The key points are set out below. If anyone would like a copy of the full report please email the secretary at anne.luttmanjohnson@gmail.com The cricket and football teams played games during the year, and the MUGA was in use for training sessions, and for tennis in the summer months. The Pavilion is used regularly for band practice and by Slimming World. It has also seen a few parties for both adults and children.

The Treasurer gave her report. As a result of the Covid lockdowns we extended the MUGA membership for the families that were already members, and we welcome one new member family. Kath Humphris organised an application to the Blenheim Bursary Fund for a grant to buy and install a defibrillator on the front of the Pavilion. This was arranged through AED Donate, with the balance coming from the Sports and Social Funds.

As a charity we need at least £120 in donations in order to be able to claim the gift aid on small donations from bucket shaking etc on Bike Night. This is a valuable source of income



for us, so if anyone wants to make a donation to Sports and Social, and they can gift aid it, then please contact the Treasurer at caz.morton@gmail.com We currently have one person in the village who has set up a standing order to us, for which we are most grateful. The Treasurer wanted to record her thanks to Lorna Mills for her help in claiming the Gift Aid. We ran two events during the year 2021-22. In September 2021 we held a Picnic and Sports day on the Playing Fields. On 5 November 2021 we sold burgers, hot dogs and chips at the Red Lion firework evening. Both those events raised much needed funds for the charity. However this year we are going to have to redouble our fundraising efforts, as the mower urgently needs replacing. We have been setting aside funds for replacement of the mower and resurfacing of the MUGA. Our fund for the mower stands at £5,600. However a new mower is going to cost us about £12,000!

1533-1603 Queen Elizabeth I

Elizabeth I sealed the course of history by enforcing that England would be Protestant and not Roman Catholic. She met with Professor Thomas Neal and others who tried to dissuade her. Thomas has a brass epitaph in St Peter's Church.



Elizabeth visited Oxford twice enjoying debates and plays in Christchurch College.

Her 'progression' travels across Oxfordshire were like holidays for her, away from struggles with Parliament in London. She went to Kenilworth and Warwick. Elizabeth would take roads near Cafsteton and Anefham (Cassington and Eynsham). She is very famous for defeating the Spanish who came in ships (the Armada) and were met by Sir Francis Drake's navy who defeated them.

Many pictures glorify her power as a military and religious leader by showing her in sumptuous robes, lace ruffs and pearls. Her costumes helped to make her image iconic, so that nobody would doubt her strength as a monarch.

" We looked at photos. We added lace and pearls to her dress to make her look grand. It was amazing."

1914-18 World War I soldier

Twelve men from Cassington gave their lives in World War One. This figure is based on a photograph of soldiers at that time. In the Second World War, 1939-1945, there were also Cassington men and women who served. Three of them died in this conflict.

All the names of soldiers who died in both World Wars are remembered on a Church memorial plaque. There is a remembrance ceremony on Armistice Sunday every year at the War Memorial on Little Green in Cassington.

Men in Cassington usually joined the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry. This was a regiment of the

British Army that existed from 1881 until 1958, serving in the Second Boer War, World War One and World War Two.

The Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock opened in 2014 and tells the stories of local people who served in wars throughout history, and the lives of families on the 'Home front' in villages like Cassington. There is a big focus on the First World War with a reconstruction of a dug-out; as well as many stories and explanations of the Second World War.

In the 2000s, children and young people in Cassington performed the play 'We Will Remember Them' by Mandy Constance, which told a fictionalised story based on real events involving Cassington in the Second World War.

" He marched through Cassington on his way to war. I like learning about history. I loved seeing all of the artwork in the church. Wow the church is old."



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
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1300 - 1400s Margery Kempe,

a remarkable religious writer of the middle ages, whose reputation has been revived in Oxford

In Medieval times, there were some very impressive female scholars who contributed to the development of English literature, but they have never come to prominence. Many of these accomplished women were nuns, but not all.....



Margery Kempe was a mystic who wrote the first autobiography in the English language, even though she probably had no formal education and as an adult learned texts by having them read to her by a priest. She dictated her experiences of religious visions, pilgrimages, recipes, motherhood and domestic life in The Book of Margery Kempe.

She preached without permission by the Church and was regarded as a nuisance when she wailed in response to her visions and screamed when the authorities tried to stop her.

She was tried for heresy several times, but never convicted. She was proud of her ability to argue against the accusations made against her. After her death she was largely forgotten about for several centuries.

In 2018, Laura Varnom from Oxford University and Laura Kalas from Swansea University started The Margery Kempe Society. This provides a platform for academic study and a blog for exploring the literature, medicine, science and history of the middle ages. The Society is promoting awareness of medieval women's literary culture.

Vegetarian Shepherd's Pie for 4 people

½ tsp olive or rapeseed oil1½ large chopped onions4 cloves garlic½ tsp thyme

½ tsp rosemary

1½ tbs tomato paste 1 bay leaf

450ml vegetable stock 60ml red wine optional ½ tsp paprika 1 tbs tahini

½ tbs soy sauce

½ tbs balsamic vinegar Salt and pepper to taste

2 large potatoes

2 medium sized parsnips

1 tbs butter

Instructions

Fry the onions until browned – about 10 minutes. Add the garlic, herbs and tomato paste. Fry for a further 2 minutes. Add the lentils, stock, bay leaf & paprika. Cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Stir in the tahini, soy and balsamic vinegar. Add salt & pepper.

Meanwhile peel and cut up the potatoes and parsnips and boil for 20 minutes. Drain and mash both with the butter. Heat oven to 375 F. Cover lentil mixture with mash and top with grated parmesan (optional). Bake for 15 minutes.

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1318 Lady Elizabeth de Montfort

Elizabeth is believed to have had a house in or near Cassington. She added St Peter's Church's west and east windows, spire and mediaeval wall paintings about doom, in other words, the end of the world.

Elizabeth came from a wealthy family and her marriage was arranged by Queen Eleanor of Castile who was married to King Edward I. After her husband, William Montagu, died, she became a rich benefactor, meaning that she donated land and money for good causes.

She donated the land we now know as Christ

Church Meadow, which is a patch of open countryside next to Christ Church Cathedral and the Thames in the centre of Oxford. Thousands of visitors walk through the Meadow every year. Cows graze on this land!

Her tomb can be visited at Christ Church. She had 4 sons and 7 daughters whose figures were carved all around her tomb, but were later damaged during the Reformation when many Roman Catholic statues were destroyed by Protestants.

"I liked making the collage. They are all really good. It was fun. We had to write facts about the characters. Elizabeth had 12 children. She was a good lady who donated a lot of her money to good causes."



Bell Ringing

Church bells will usually be rung between 9.00 and 9.30am before the services each Sunday, and each Thursday between 7.00 and 8.00pm for our weekly practice.

As members of the Witney and Woodstock Guild of Church Bellringers we are occasionally asked to hold a practice session for all teams in the area. The first one for some while will take place here on Saturday 11th February between 10.30 am and 12 noon.

1600 - 1649 King Charles I

Charles I was the king during the English Civil War. He used Oxford as the base for his court where many people were loyal to him. He likely marched through Cassington and Eynsham with his army as he controlled the Midlands, Wales, the West Country and the North of England, whilst his enemies, the Parliamentarians, controlled London, the South East and East Anglia.



Charles escaped from Oxford disguised as a servant when the Parliamentarians, led by Oliver Cromwell closed in on him. He retreated to Newcastle and put himself in the hands of the Scottish Presbyterian Army. The Scots did a deal with the English Parliament and swapped him for £100,000 and the promise of more money. He was held in Hurst Castle and then Windsor Castle.

He had his head chopped off in 1649 by order of the English Parliament, when he was found guilty of treason for using his power for his own good, rather than the people. At the time of his execution he had very long hair and beard because his royal barber had been dismissed by parliament and he refused to let anyone else near him with a razor!

Around the same time, James Keane of Bedford and his son Richard made 4 bells for St Peters Church One was made in a foundry in Woodstock. Today there are 6 bells.

1853 - 1900 Victorian school mistress

of St Peter's Church of England School.

The development of children's education, which took place in the second half of the 19th century, led to a growth in the number of school teachers and created career opportunities for both men and women. It's likely that St Peter's School would have employed a school mistress like this one.

This is how education in Cassington grew......

In 1724 Henry Allnut, a London lawyer, and friend of the Duke of Marlborough, who had owned one of the manors at Cassington left money from his estate to teach, clothe and apprentice boys from five parishes including Cassington. Allnut's charity maintained a small school for boys at Cassington throughout the 18th century.

By 1831 the vicar of St Peter's had established St Peter's day school for all the children of the village that incorporated Allnut's charity, and in 1853 the building of a new schoolhouse beside Cassington Green was funded jointly by the parish, Christ Church and the Allnut charity.

In 1870 there was a law that required schooling to be



made available to all children aged 5-13 years and subsequent laws making it compulsory for parents to educate their children and for children to attend school. The school was enlarged in 1876. In 1926 it was reorganised as a junior school, with older children going to Gosford Hill School. Later, older children went to Bartholomew School in Eynsham.

In 1973 the school moved to new buildings with a large open space, adjacent to the old school which is now a private house. Since then there have been several extensions and additions to the school building, including an outdoor

pool built and run by parents.

Since the 2000s the school has seen the arrival of the purpose-built foundation unit for nursery children, more developments in outdoor education and play facilities. It is part of the Eynsham Partnership Academy Trust which was the first academy to combine Church of England Schools and Community Schools.
