# April stargazing highlights

#### April 6 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Pink Moon because it marked the appearance of the moss pink, or wild ground phlox, which is one of the first spring flowers. This moon has also been known as the Sprouting Grass Moon, the Growing Moon, and the Egg Moon. Many coastal tribes called it the Fish Moon because this was the time that the shad swam upstream to spawn.

#### April 11 - Mercury at Greatest Eastern Elongation.

This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the evening sky. Look for the planet low in the western sky just after sunset

#### April 20 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

#### April 22, 23 - Lyrids Meteor Shower.

The Lyrids is an average shower, usually producing about 20 meteors per hour at its peak. These meteors can sometimes produce bright dust trails that last for several seconds. The thin crescent moon will set early in the evening leaving dark skies for what should be an excellent show. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Lyra, but can appear anywhere in the sky.



## From Winter... Spring



## **Stop Botley West Solar Campaign**

By the time you open this CAWN we hope the Stop Botley West campaign will be more visibly active around you:

- Banners, roadsigns and footpath signs should be appearing in Cassington and in all the villages affected, and posters should be appearing on noticeboards and in public buildings. We have a number of A4 window posters available. If you want to put one in a window where it will be seen by those passing by, please pick one up from 9 The Tennis.
- You should also have received two leaflets. The first encouraged you to go online, both to join the campaign and sign the petition. We hope you have been able to do so.
- On the home page of the website there is a DONATE button. Please donate to the cause as all our materials and access to experts cost money. Thank you for your generosity.
- Also, since receiving the previous CAWN, we hope you have written to Robert Courts, our MP, and expressed to him why you are concerned about the solar proposals. If not, please can we encourage you to do so. The more letters he receives, the more likely he is to raise his concerns in Parliament.
- We also hope you wrote before the 25th March to at least some of the West Oxfordshire District Councillors listed on the second leaflet, to express your views on the consultation

process. It is important that the Council know whether you felt properly consulted, you understood the implications of the project and thought your views were taken into account.

• And finally, it would be excellent to hear that many of you had come to the WODC full Council Meeting on 22nd March in Woodgreen, to let your councillors hear your opposition. Every thing you can do to make your opinion heard is important. The more we make our opposition known the better chance we have of stopping our fields from being covered with solar panels.

#### STATEMENT FROM WODC

The "Botley West" Solar Farm is in my view a real threat to the wellbeing of residents of Cassington and other villages, and to farmers, and to people who enjoy the countryside. So people have been asking why WODC isn't taking a position of outright opposition to it.

The application by PhotoVolt Development Partners, working with Blenheim and Merton College, has yet to be made. They have gone through an initial public consultation, but are yet to submit an outline scope to the planning inspectorate. The planning process is a marathon and not a sprint, and the timetable has already slipped.

The application, when it is made, will be determined by central government. This was going to be by the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy, but that department was abolished a few weeks ago. It isn't yet entirely clear who will be making the decision. But it will certainly not be WODC – the scale of the project is so huge that it has been taken out of the normal planning process.

As part of the process, WODC will be producing an Impact Statement. This is a statutory part of the planning process. This will be a thorough and evidence-based document, which will detail the effects of the proposal on the people, businesses, landscape and ecology of the area. This is where your views of the scheme will have impact. In order to be effective, this report needs to be seen to be impartial and based on evidence, so that it can't be attacked by the developers for bias. We have a senior officer working full-time on this project.

So it would be counterproductive for WODC, as a council, to take a position at this point, before we have gathered the evidence and indeed before there is even a firm application. Councillors who sit on the WODC cabinet, like me, are committed to not undermining the effectiveness of WODC's report by actively taking a side. If WODC acts as opposition at this stage it will lose its voice. And WODC's voice is a key one in trying to make sure that you get what you want.

All political parties are committed to WODC playing its part in combatting climate change. And I hope we all want the best for residents, and won't use the Solar Farm as a political bandwagon. There are real problems with the planning system that the government has forced on us but we will all work within the constraints which hold us back.

The LibDem, Green and Labour alliance which makes up the administration at WODC is completely supportive of residents campaigning. That was true when we were in opposition and opposing the over-development of the area under the direction of the previous Tory adminstration, and it is true now. You may have seen my colleague Andy Goodwin at Stop Botley West campaign meetings along with other backbench councillors and candidates. And we have been supporting Parish Councils, including Cassington, to understand the process, work together to be most effective in getting your case across, and make sure that Cassington and Worton are heard.

Do keep lobbying us, Blenheim, PVDP and your MP. The Alliance team at WODC really does listen to residents.

# Clementine's on the Lawn Opening April 2023 until Autumn 2023

# **BLENHEIM**

You may have noticed that our Lake Dredge has now been resumed after being paused for the past few months due to weather conditions. The dredging of Queen Pool first started back in April 2022, having not been carried out in over 100 years. Upon completion it will have removed 300,000 cubic metres of silt from our 'Capability' Brown designed lake — enough to fill Wembley Stadium. The dredge will return our lake to its original depth of two metres from its current shallows of 30cm. The walking loop around Queen Pool has once again been closed whilst the project is completed.



As the new season unfolds, you will soon begin to see signs of spring appear in the Parkland and surrounding areas. We have already seen a sprinkling of snowdrops, a blossoming of bluebells and drifts of daffodils with a whole host of other seasonal flowers still to come. To add to the Easter picture we will also see lambs arriving on the Estate this month. As we exclusively lamb outdoors, we ask all visitors to please be mindful of walking their dogs in the Parkland. Keeping your dog on a lead is particularly important to ensure that our sheep are not attacked or chased in a way that may cause injury, suffering or miscarriage.

Life has been great at Churchfields this month and we are looking forward to warmer days in the sun, as we welcome Spring at the end of the month.





Oxford's Botley Road will be closed to through traffic for seven months from Tuesday 11 April to allow Network Rail to begin work on its £161 million redevelopment of Oxford Station and rail upgrade.

Network Rail has issued an update about its plans to replace the rail bridge over Botley Road in Oxford, as part of its wider project to expand the station on the western side. It will involve full closures of Botley Road to through traffic for several months at a time in 2023 and 2024.

The project timeline is as follows:

April to Oct 2023 – Botley Road part closure until end of October for utility diversion work

29 July to 6 Aug 2023 – Track work and prep work for new platform – rail services impacted. Alternative travel arrangements and advice will be publicised in advance

March to Oct 2024 – Botley Road closed for highway work

Aug 2024 – Four-day rail closure for bridge replacement.

Between 11 April and October 2023 while the first closure is in place motorists who usually use Botley Road to get into the city are advised to use the Seacourt Park and Ride or take an alternative route.


Buses will turn around just before the rail bridge allowing passengers to continue their journey into the city centre on foot.

Pedestrians and cyclists will have access throughout the work.

Network Rail is working with emergency services on access arrangements.

#### Village Hall AGM 28 February 2023

Chair's Review of the Year - John Hemingway "Not just a building, but building a community".

Are we there yet? Back to normality? Let's hope so, and in 2022 we finally saw the signs. It was a slow start to the year as anticipated, but then many of our daytime and regular customers began to drift back and we also welcomed the return of live events from the regular Friday Night Cinema screenings to the Harvest barn dance, and of course to finish the year the sublime panto with sell-out audiences for Oz The Panto. We might finally be at the end of the pandemic brick road.

Our income from lettings was certainly back to the good old days at £14,678, compared to only £5,858 last year and even less in 2020 at £3,168. Our gross revenue from events and fundraising was well up too at £3,721 compared to £720 last year and nothing at all in 2020. We also received donations of £675, mostly from bike night, some £340 from investments and Gift Aid, plus a post-pandemic support grant of £3,953. All in, that gave us total income of £23,365.

That's slightly less than the year before (total income £25,629) but 2021 was a very abnormal year when we received substantial one-off Government support grants worth £18,675 through WODC, in line with other village halls around the country. Special thanks again to our treasurer Lorna Mills who is always on top of grant availability and submitting successful applications.

Our expenditure last year was up too; we spent some £17,278 (£7,823 the year before). As well as all the usual everyday running costs, that includes £3,007 on repairs, maintenance and equipment, with replacement commercial dishwasher, fridge and hot water boiler for drinks, plus a

new wine fridge and the installation of a microwave oven. So our finances are still in very good shape. After allowing for annual depreciation of £3,266 (£3,720 in 2021), we had a net surplus of £2,821 (£14,086 in 2021) and our cash position is as strong as ever.

We owe huge thanks to Dave Butlin who has decided to retire from the committee after several years great service and commitment as Building Officer. We will miss Dave's professional expertise and good humoured approach to fixing the problems that crop up every year. Many thanks also to Malcolm Teal who helps sort out smaller repairs and our website, and to Cassington residents Paul Woolford and Matt Terry who support our plumbing and electrical maintenance.

Special thanks also to our hall manager Kathryn Teal and cleaner Pam Coates for their continuing great service and commitment, and to the other hard-working trustee volunteers on the committee: Penny Burroughs (Secretary), Adie Gregory (Events), Sheila Nelson and Bridget Sherlock. We also gave sincere thanks during the year to Bryan Partridge who decided to retire from the committee, and as the new trustee for the Parish Council we were delighted to welcome Stewart Thompson who is already leading our assessment of options for solar panels.

We always welcome new volunteers to join our team, so if you're interested please get in touch. Also please consider joining the Patrons of Cassington Village Hall for as little as £10 a year, and you can Gift Aid your donation to make it tax efficient. The village hall is a registered charity and relies on generating its own income to keep the place going. If you value the hall at the heart of our community, making a small regular donation is a good way to support a great asset that's effectively owned by the village for the benefit of the village.

## **RECIPE OF THE MONTH**

## Mascarpone ice cream

#### **Ingredients**

225g mascarpone Juice of one orange and zest of two 125g condensed milk 450g whipping cream

#### Method

Not a true ice cream but simple, refreshing and quick. So easy this is hardly a recipe!

Mix the first three ingredients together in a shallow tub big enough to take the cream and which will happily go into the freezer covered. Whip the cream until you have stiffish white mountain peaks. Fold the cream into the orange flavoured mixture and put into the freezer. After about two hours or so take it out and give it a good stir to prevent too many icy crystals forming. Do this a couple of times (if you remember).

Serve with poached rhubarb for a very pretty spring pudding. The ice cream is also lovely made with lemon instead of orange or you can flavour it with some of your favourite honey. If you make it honey flavoured it is delicious served with poached (dried) apricots with a curl or two of orange zest.
