## August stargazing highlights

#### August 1 - Full Moon, Supermoon.

The Moon will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Sturgeon Moon because the large sturgeon fish of the Great Lakes and other major lakes were more easily caught at this time of year. This moon has also been known as the Green Corn Moon and the Grain Moon. This is the second of four supermoons for 2023. The Moon will be near its closest approach to the Earth and may look slightly larger and brighter than usual.

#### August 10 - Mercury at Greatest Eastern Elongation.

This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the evening sky. Look for the planet low in the western sky just after sunset.

#### August 12, 13 - Perseids Meteor Shower.

The Perseids is one of the best meteor showers to observe, producing up to 60 bright meteors per hour at its peak. It is produced by comet Swift-Tuttle, which was discovered in 1862. The shower peaks this year on the night of August 12 and the morning of August 13. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Perseus, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

#### August 16 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky.

#### August 27 - Saturn at Opposition.

The ringed planet face will be fully illuminated by the Sun. It will be brighter than any other time of the year and will be visible all night long.

#### August 31 - Full Moon, Supermoon, Blue Moon.

The Moon will be on the opposite side of the Earth to the Sun and its face will be fully illuminated. This is the third of four supermoons for 2023. The Moon will be near its closest approach to the Earth and may look slightly larger and brighter than usual. Since this is the second full moon in the same month, it is sometimes referred to as a blue moon.



# FLOWER FESTIVAL - 23rd - 25th JUNE 2023









- Also to all of you who turned out to hear Prof David Rogers in July. Do share what you learned with friends and family wherever you can.



The Scoping Report to the Inspectorate was submitted in June and responses sent in from Parish and District Councils in mid July. We hope you were able to write to the Parish and District Councils to give the your responses to the Scoping Report. A huge thank you to the Parish Council, and in particular Professor Alex Rogers for preparing this excellent document.

Now let's keep our protests active until the next step in the process.

# **ANNUAL PARISH MEETING**

On Thursday 6th July 2023 the Annual Parish Meeting took place in the village hall, following the regular monthly Parish Council meeting. There were reports from most of the village organisations, and a short summary of them is set out below.

#### Almshouses and Parochial Charities

Poors Piece, our land in the Burleigh Road, will shortly be let to a new tenant following David Henman's retirement after many years. As a result of a rather poor rating for each Almshouse flat, given by the Energy Performance Certificates late last year, the trustees agreed to have the roof of the whole property renewed with increased insulation, which would afford an opportunity to inspect the timbers and replace and treat where necessary. At the same time the chimneys would be repaired. It was thought the last time any serious work was carried out to this area was over 50 years ago! This work will involve the erection of scaffolding and the provision of a skip so I apologise for any inconvenience that might be caused.

#### The Church

Our main focus this year has been on celebrating the 900th Anniversary of St Peter's, with the major launch event in January, the Plant Sale on The Green with the Allotments Association, the special Mothering Sunday events in the church and village hall, the community Artweeks show in the village hall, and the Flower Festival in the church. Many thanks to everyone for all your support, especially the children of St Peter's School for creating the wonderful large scale 900 Years of Cassington painting still hanging in the church. The life size figures from history will return in the autumn! The next date for your diaries is Sunday 10 September with a promenade play on village history by Cassington Players, at locations around the centre of the village. Don't forget the monthly photo competition in CAWN too. Keep on sending in those great images!

#### Speed Watch

Since we started Speedwatch on 3rd March 2022, up to 31st May 2023 - whilst the 30mph limit was in place - 684 vehicles have been reported to TVP:

Over 50 mph: 8

45 – 50 mph: 17

- 40 45 mph: 104
- 35 40 mph: 555

We have been enforcing the 20 mph from 3rd June 2023 and are reporting vehicles travelling over 24mph. Unfortunately – due to Volunteer availability - we only managed 2 sessions in June - Saturday 3rd and Sunday 11th - so traffic volumes were lower than weekdays.

Vehicles reported to TVP in June: 71

25 – 30 mph: 47

31 – 35 mph: 17

Over 35mph: 7 – the fastest being 47 mph

The number of vehicles driving at 30mph and over has dropped significantly but approximately 30% of all vehicles are still traveling at speeds between 25 and 30mph. Hopefully this will reduce over time.

#### **Sports and Social Club**

Cassington Rangers hired the field for their football matches, as well as training sessions and in the summer West Bladon Cricket team hired the field for cricket matches. The MUGA was hired by Cassington Rangers, and the following youth football teams: Combe Juniors, Witney Vikings, Eynsham Football Club and Kidlington Garden City Football Club for their training over the winter months. In the summer the MUGA was made available for individuals to play tennis. The Pavilion was hired four times for birthday parties, for band practice sessions and Slimming World had a regular weekly hire. 11 households took out membership of the MUGA which enabled them to play tennis during the summer.

We ran 3 events this year. On 4th June 2022 we held a Party for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, and the following day, 5th June 2022, we held a tea party for the Jubilee to which the Parish Council contributed. These two events raised £349.07 (the party) and £125.15 (the tea). On 5 November 2022 we sold burgers, hot dogs and chips at the Red Lion firework evening, raising £306.36. Bike Night returned and we raised £2,470.79. We also received £155 in donations from villagers as a result of an appeal in CAWN, and we were able to reclaim £26.44 in Gift Aid.

In total our income for the year amounted to £8,712.81. Our expenditure was £4,553.83, of which more than half was for electricity usage, particularly for the floodlights in the MUGA. We continue to maintain and build upon our cash reserves. This is to ensure that we can meet large known future capital expenditure. £14,525 (out of a target of £31k) is currently set aside for the replacement of the MUGA surface, £1,500 for green gym repairs and £5,600 is set aside for replacement of the mower. (In June 2023 we did replace the mower for £7,800, but the details of this will be in the 2023/24 report.)

#### Village Hall

Last year the village hall finally got back to business as usual after the problems of the pandemic. Bookings were up, events returned, and our costs were up in line too, but we still had a very good year financially and the bank account is in good shape for the future. Looking ahead, our next big improvement to the hall is likely to be the installation of solar panels on the roof, a project currently under active consideration.

We gave huge thanks to Kathryn Teal for her many years of service as our dedicated hall manager, and a very warm welcome to Pam Coates who has recently taken over the role. Many thanks to all our customers for your support in using the hall.

The Referendum took place on the 22nd June 2023 and the vast majority of the village voted in favour of the Plan. This now means that the Parish Council and WODC can use the Neighbourhood Plan for any Planning Decisions in the Parish.

Votes for Yes – 192

The wood is rotting, and parts are starting to become soft in places. They are now looking at what can be put in its place. This maybe done in stages depending on grants and what money the Parish Council have. If you have any ideas of equipment that you would like to see, please email the clerk.

# **BIKE NIGHT - 26th JUNE 2023**





The dust from Bike Night has settled quickly once again this year, with the village returning to normal as if nothing had ever happened! The village has many new faces, so we thought it would be prudent to explain the structure and financials behind Bike Night.

Bike Night is organised by a small group of volunteer residents who work hard to make sure the tradition of Bike Night is kept alive, whilst also running a safe and fun event that allows the village charities and businesses to benefit financially.

Each year, the Bike Night committee pays for public liability insurance, road closures, traffic management and we hire in skips, fire safety equipment, toilets and other small items. This year was no different and the committee spent £3,262.92, which is funded by attracting local businesses to be part of Bike Night, and asking for a donation. We also shake buckets and wave Chip and Pin pads attracting visitors to donate.

Donations from the local businesses raised £3,145.00. Without our local businesses the event would not be able to run and raise money for all the local charities so big thank you goes to:

Debbie Hebborn, Krazy Horse, Mary Hatwell, The Chequers, Mr Ice Cream Van, Stewart Davidson Photography, Sam Hatwell, Parish Council for paying for the St John Ambulance and Kings Two Wheels.





This gave the committee a loss of £117.92. The committee will bank £222.23 of buckets to help with preparations of Bike Night 2024, so the balance of the money raised from bucket shaking and chip and pin is £4,963.12. This is being split across the Village Hall, St Peter's Primary School, Sports and Social Club and The Church.

# **Forever Fields 2023**

Creating an Art Archive of 3,400 acres of threatened Oxfordshire countryside. Open to all adults and children, individuals and groups. No previous artistic experience necessary, we want YOUR creative response to our local landscape.

As soon as I heard about this project, I was excited to get in touch with my artist friends. All passionately paint, draw and talk about the natural world. They all see their art as a record of a moment in time, for present generations to see and relate to, and future generations to see what it was like. The pleasing outcome is when life has changed with natural growth and one can delight in the power of nature. The distressing outcome is when the scene of the painting no

longer exists or can ever exist again.

Julia Loken's painting is of 'Long Mead Meadow', a natural flood plain in the fields up stream of Eynsham Toll bridge. This is a very rare and valuable site: 1500 years unchanged. Managed for hay it harbours wild

and rare wildflowers and complex ecosystems, that are part of ongoing studies, monitoring their sustainability. Along with other productive pastures nearby Long Mead has been designated to be dug up to lay connecting cables for the solar farm. Any digging will cause irreversible damage.

Alice Walker paints the wharf stream water meadow on the other side of the road from Long Mead. Its plant diversity is clearly present in its flora and fauna and wildlife, including otter. This is also designated to be dug to carry cables. The disturbance will be another tragic loss.

Eric White paints land of ploughed fields and pastures. The walk is a favourite and he has painted it before when the seasons' change. Each season gives way to new life and changes in the landscape. The land is productive; providing food that is locally grown and sustainable. The wildness of the footpaths, benefit the white-art.com crops growing in the fields and

provide food for the insects, birds and mammals.

Jane Tomlinson worships the diversity and productivity of the land as our ancestors did. Her picture is entitled 'The Green Man brings Spring to Chapel Meadow'. Every year as winter wanes, spring brings new life and nature visits and passes through her garden. From the bees and insects that pollinate her flowers to the bird life that nest and feed from her garden to the mammals that visit her pond for a drink.

The Green man and the fairies maybe fictional yet they highlight that nature needs seasonal markers and diversity. Wildlife thrives when it can move safely from one food source and shelter to another. Remove the vegetation and you take away the opportunities for Jane Tomlinson © 2023 plant and animal life.

The expected life span of the solar panels is 40 years after which it is said they will be removed and the land restored to how it was. In 2060 there will only be a few who have a memory of what the land was like and they will be elderly. In 2060 those who are making the decisions today to erect the solar panels will no longer be here to take responsibility to put it all back as it was. Is this a problem we want to leave to our children, because we didn't think it through?

As a solution to the energy crisis, Solar Power can be viable and sustainable. It can be placed on the roofs of houses and industrial sites. The money that has gone toward land purchase, installation of the panels and cables and ongoing

maintenance could be used towards subsidies. We should promote the original use of solar (the Sun), 'to work naturally'. We must encourage a diversity of plants that harness the sun's energy through photosynthesis. They put nutrients back into the soil, take in the carbon dioxide and give off oxygen. The maintenance of green spaces will not only benefit the natural world, but our own wellbeing - physical, psychological and spiritual — too.

# **RECIPE OF THE MONTH**

#### Savoury Cheesecake

This is something I had been meaning to make for a long time - I think the first recipe I read was in a Delia Smith cookery book. Then, a few weeks ago, I happened to have all the ingredients, serendipity, and gave one a go.

#### Ingredients

1 cup crushed crackers, ritz crackers were suggested but I think as long as you choose savoury biscuits most will work even perhaps digestives

4 or 5 tablespoons melted salted butter

16 ounces cream cheese - if you like you could use one which is herby or garlicky

8oz crumbled blue cheese - if you don't like blue cheese use a crumbly cheddar grated or other strong flavoured cheese you like

1 cup sour cream or creme fraiche

3 large lightly beaten eggs

1/3 cup whole milk (you may not need all of this)

1/4 teaspoon coarsely ground pepper

#### Method

Crumble biscuits or crackers and mix with melted butter. Press into a greased 9inch springform cake tin. Bake for about five to ten minutes at 180°C until lightly coloured. Allow to cool.

Mix everything else (except milk) in a blender and process for a minute or so until smooth. Here you need to decide whether it looks too sloppy (this is tricky and depends on the size of your eggs and the types of cheeses you use). Add milk if you think it needs a little bit more liquid. Be generous with seasoning. I like to add a bit of dried dill if not using blue cheese and lots of pepper and no salt if I am.

Pour your mix over the base and bake in a Bain Marie for around 45 mins. It needs to be just set - not too firm. Remove the cake tin from the water bath and leave to cool on a wire tray for at least half an hour. Either remove from the tin now or cover carefully and leave in fridge overnight and remove the following day. It does need a few hours, preferably overnight, before serving.

What is particularly good is you need to make this a day in advance, so you can use it for parties, picnics anything when you need to be prepared ahead. Serve with some crunchy, crispy salad and you have a lovely, summery meal.

#### **Gardening Tips for August**

- Prune wisteria
- Collect seeds from garden plants
- Lift and pot up rooted strawberry runners
- Harvest sweetcorn and other vegetables as available
- Keep ponds and water features topped up
- Feed the soil with green manures
- Cut out old fruited canes on raspberries
- Deadhead flowering plants regularly
