September stargazing highlights

September 15 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky.

September 19 - Neptune at Opposition.

The blue giant planet will be at its closest approach to Earth. It will be brighter than any other time of the year and will be visible all night long. However due to its extreme distance from Earth, it will only appear as a tiny blue dot in all but the most powerful telescopes.

September 22 - Mercury at Greatest Western Elongation.

The planet Mercury reaches greatest western elongation of 17.9 degrees from the Sun. This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the morning sky. Look for the planet low in the eastern sky just before sunrise.

September 23 - September Equinox.

The Sun will shine directly on the equator and there will be nearly equal amounts of day and night throughout the world. This is also the first day of Autumn in the Northern Hemisphere.

September 29 - Full Moon, Supermoon.

The Moon's face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Corn Moon because the corn is harvested around this time of year. This moon is also known as the Harvest Moon. This is also the last of four supermoons for 2023. The Moon will be near its closest approach to the Earth and may look slightly larger and brighter than usual.



Local Walks

Continuing our theme of nice local walks here is one from the Oxfordshire County Council website. It particularly made me laugh as it recommends doing it during the drier season - May to September! That may not be relevant this year, however as we are all hoping for a drier and sunny September this may be the time to go!

After leaving the town through the old Abbey grounds and walking on through fields and meadows and along a stream, you join the Thames Path at Pinkhill Lock where, in 1791, the old flashlock was replaced with a pound lock. The return walk along the Thames leads you towards the elegant Georgian Swinford Toll Bridge, built in 1767.

Electric Street Sweepers

The job of keeping the towns of Carterton and Woodstock clean will be greener following the purchase of two new fully

WEST OXFORDSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL

electric street sweepers by West Oxfordshire District Council as the authority strives for greater sustainability to benefit the local environment and the communities it serves.

The sweepers are the latest additions to the Council's growing fleet of fully-electric vehicles as it continues to champion greener transport choices. Investing in low-carbon vehicles is just one way the District Council is rising to the immense

challenge of becoming a carbon neutral local authority by 2030, well ahead of the UK Government's 2050 target.

Benefitting from lower servicing and maintenance costs and cheaper fuel, the running costs of the vehicles should be less than the end-of-life diesel sweepers they replace.

Part-funded through West Oxfordshire District Council's New Initiatives Fund, the vehicles will be used by Ubico to support the street cleansing functions it carries out on behalf of the District Council.

- Thank you for keeping yourself informed about the plans for solar panels across all our fields.
- If you have not seen it, the Inspectorate's response to the Scoping Report from the developers is available for you to read. Go to stopbotleywest.com and find it under Learn More and then Scoping Responses. PVDP has been given a lot of work to do before resubmitting, but they aim to reapply by the winter, so we have to be alert to what we can do before then.
- In the very near future, between mid September and mid October, the developers will have another Consultation for us in the Village Hall. As soon as we have the date it will go on the village Facebook page and we will also do everything else we can to alert you. (If you are not on Facebook, why not join for a short while just to keep up to speed on this. Ask for help from ruth@atherstone.net if you don't know how to join and someone will come to you.) Please come to the Consultation and see the details of what is being planned and voice your opinions. It is really important that we all have our say.
- There will be more we can do once the developers make their final submission to the Inspectorate. We will let you know when and how. In the meantime please check out the Cassington PC response to the scoping review. It has specific points related to Cassington residents that you may want to take up with PVDP during the consultation.

RECIPES OF THE MONTH

So summer is nearly over and you've probably spent all your cash for the month on holidays, outings and suncream so a good time to be using what is in season and cheap but most importantly delicious.

This is a sort of 'tapas' kind of a meal, the type you want to prepare with friends or family and then eat outside with a glass of wine in hand. The savoury parts can be used as a main course simply by using larger quantities and adding green salads; or they can simply be nibbles with drinks.

Goats cheese salad with honeyed pears

(for about 4 people)

Ingredients

Log of natural not cindered fresh goats cheese Good country bread sliced not too thick

Walnuts

Honey - now if you are using honey here (you can miss it out) it's important to use a 'savoury' honey - something like chestnut or pine - or at least a one flower honey. You don't want to be using honey which is just sweet, it needs a bit of character.

Walnut or olive oil

Pears

Butter

Method

For the pears - peel and cut into slices, put into a pan with some butter and a tiny amount of honey. Cook gently, adding water if it begins to stick before the pears are cooked. Cook until tender but not mushy, and the liquid has disappeared from the pan. Put to one side.

Cut the goats cheese into slices about double the thickness of a pound coin and organise on the bread slices covering as much as possible. Top with pieces of walnut then drizzle with a combination of honey and oil. Sprinkle with pepper. Grill for a few minutes until the cheese has melted deliciously and the walnuts are golden.

Serve with the pears on top or on the side and, if you like, a green salad made with walnut oil dressing. You can replace the nutty elements with hazelnuts.

Smoked fish sauce

Ingredients

Whipping or double cream Chopped capers 1 Lemon Horseradish sauce

Method

Whip the cream and add chopped capers, lemon zest and a drop of lemon juice and a spoonful or so to taste of horseradish. Mix well and serve with smoked salmon or smoked trout and cucumber dill salad.

So summery!

Tomatoes on bread (otherwise known as bruschetta)

I know, I know, this is one you probably know but it does get overlooked for more exotic fare and it really is the best way I can think of to celebrate tomato season.

Ingredients

Here the tomatoes play the leading role so they have to be GOOD. Ripe but not squashy, full of flavour and colour - do not bother with your namby pamby supermarket tomatoes these need to burst with flavour and texture.

Fresh basil

Garlic

Baguette sliced into pieces about two pound coins thick Delicious green, peppery olive oil

Salt and pepper

Mozzarella, or burrata if you can find it

Method

For the tomatoes - cut into cubes (this is rustic so don't be fussy please) taking out the stem and some of the seeds - it doesn't want to be too soggy. Put in a bowl, sprinkle with salt, olive oil, torn basil, black pepper and a small clove of grated garlic. This can sit for up to half an hour before serving. DO NOT PUT IN THE FRIDGE!

Put the bread on a shallow baking tray and drizzle with olive oil. Either grill or bake until it is just turning golden. When cool enough to handle rub each piece (one side only) with a peeled garlic clove - you want to taste the garlic but not overpower.

If you are feeling fancy you can make liquid basil heaven by taking a BIG bunch of basil without any tough stalks, then pureeing them in some olive oil - it does look very pretty.

Divide the tomato mixture on each slice of bread and top with basil puree, torn pieces of mozzarella and basil leaves. A grind of black pepper and it's done.

Peach Pudding (or savoury)

Oh, a good peach is such a treat but quite hard to find. If you have some peaches that aren't quite nirvana on their own try this - not so much a recipe as an idea.

Ingredients

One (or more if you like) peach per person. Knob of butter per peach.

Method

Cut the peaches in half over a baking dish to save any juice. Remove the stone. Fill the pits with a knob of butter for each half (add a sprinkle of brown sugar if they are not sweet enough). Now for the tricky part - take one sprig of lavender and one of lemon thyme for about six peaches. Strip the flowers from the lavender and leaves and flowers, if any, from the thyme. Rub between your fingers to create a sort of dust and sprinkle over the peaches. Bake for about 10 mins at 180 degree c. They are good to eat on their own but you can add cream or ice cream (vanilla, olive oil or honey for example). For a savoury version use blue cheese, and some strips of parma ham but no sugar and no lavender - very good with a green salad.

WODC warn of danger from Lithium-ion batteries



Following an incident at West Oxfordshire District Council's Witney depot last month, the Council is warning

residents of the risk of incorrectly disposing of lithium-ion batteries, as increasing numbers of fires starting in refuse and recycling vehicles and at waste sorting facilities are reported nationally.

According to research by Materials Focus, the organisation behind the national Recycle Your Electricals campaign, more than 700 waste-related fires are responded to each year by the emergency services due to the unsafe disposal of batteries, many of which are hidden inside electrical equipment.

The use of lithium-ion batteries is becoming more and more commonplace and can be found in a rage of electrical and electronic items, including rechargeable items like mobiles, cameras, toothbrushes, laptops and e-cigarettes.

Residents can recycle small electrical and electronic items by placing them in their black box. Due to their small size, vapes should be placed inside an envelope or ideally an old plastic bag and left on the lid on top of the blue-lidded recycling bin ready for collection. Household batteries should be recycled in the same manner.

THE SPY PRINCESS



The best-selling author Shrabani Basu will be giving her 'Spy Princess' talk at Ditchley Park at 7pm on Wednesday 6th September 2023.

Shrabani Basu is the best-selling author of Victoria and Abdul. Spy Princess tells the story of Noor Inayat Khan GC a Second World War secret agent codenamed 'Madeleine'.

Based on interviews with her family, colleagues and secret service records, Shrabani Basu traces the journey of Noor Inayat Khan from her early life in Paris as a writer and a musician to her recruitment by the British secret service, her valuable work for the Allies, and final death in Dachau concentration camp in September 1944.

As her circuit collapsed around her, she remained the last link with London and refused to abandon her post despite the dangers. She was posthumously awarded the George Cross for her extraordinary bravery, and France honoured her with the Croix de Guerre.

This talk has been organised in celebration of the life of Major Tom Shannon, a friend of Basu and former Trustee of the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, who sadly passed away in August 2022. Proceeds from ticket sales from this event support Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust. It is planned to be the first in a series of lectures held in his memory.

The co-founder of Oxford Metrics, Tom had served as a Reservist in the Australian Army, and in the Territorial Army in Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire. Alongside his Trusteeship of the county's military museum, he was secretary of the Army Benevolent Fund in Buckinghamshire and a long serving chairman of the Oxford Club.

The venue for this event will be the magnificent Ditchley Park, with the ticket price including a donation to the museum, as well as drinks and canapes.

Tickets can be purchased from the museum website, with virtual tickets to watch the event live online also available for those unable to attend in person.
