

October stargazing highlights

October 7 - Draconids Meteor Shower.

The Draconids is a minor meteor shower. It is unusual because the best viewing is in the early evening instead of early morning. Best viewing will be in the early evening from a dark location. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Draco, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

October 14 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky.

October 21, 22 - Orionids Meteor Shower.

The Orionids is an average shower. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Orion, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

October 23 - Venus at Greatest Western Elongation.

This is the best time to view Venus since it will be at its highest point above the horizon. Look for the bright planet in the eastern sky before sunrise.

October 28 - Full Moon.

The Moon's face will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Hunters Moon. It was also known as the Travel Moon and the Blood Moon.

October 28 - Partial Lunar Eclipse.

During this type of eclipse a part of the Moon will darken as it moves through the Earth's shadow. The eclipse will be visible throughout all of Europe. Ninon and the Linnell family want to thank all those that sent cards, letters, flowers or helped on the day of Mike's funeral.

Mike loved this village, and he would have been overwhelmed with the support and kindness everyone has shown to the family.



Take Time to Rest

September can be a bit manic. Long forgotten are the quieter days of August. There are things to catch up with after the break, things to put in place for another academic year, children to be settled into new experiences, new shift patterns, new drives for productivity and efficiency. We can easily let the business of life overtake us. So it's important to learn to take a breather amidst it all.

Rest is central to the Judeo-Christian heritage but not one that we even remotely mastered. During a particularly busy period Jesus told his disciples, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest." (Gospel of Mark 6.31). He himself would regularly retreat from the demands of the crowds "to desolate places and pray" (Gospel of Luke 5.16). His entire mission might even be summarised by his invitation to: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Gospel of Matthew 11.28).

In this 900th year of celebration, whatever your outlook on life, St.Peter's Church is a great place to do this and is usually open for this purpose. Or perhaps it's a corner of the garden, or a favourite chair. Wherever it is, a moment of quiet rest grounds us, re-orientates us and gives us the strength to carry on.

BLENHEIM

The replacement of the Orangery roof project is now almost completed. The 18th century glass ceiling has now been fully removed and replaced with a timber and slate structure in the spirit of John Vanbrugh's original design. This will be a far more effective insulator than glass, saving energy and helping us reach our green goals. The work is due to finish, along with stunning new interior décor, in the middle of October ready to begin serving devilishly decadent Halloween themed afternoon teas. 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Botley West Power Station: the process explained.

What has already happened?

• Photovolt Development Partners (PVDP – the developers) have published and circulated details of a proposal to build a site of solar panels on land belonging to Blenheim Palace, Merton college and a few farm companies around the villages of West Oxfordshire.

• PVDP have sent brochures that detail the plan to households in the area, and in December 2022, PVDP held consultations with the communities affected by the proposals with displays and Q and As in village halls. This is known as the 'pre-statutory consultation'.

• PVDP have issued a draft Statement of Community Consultation to WODC (West Oxfordshire District Council). This statement is their response to the feedback they have received from the village communities.

• PVDP have also produced a Scoping Report on the project which sets out details of how it works and what happens to the land on which it is built.

• This Scoping Report was submitted to a Government Organisation known as the Planning Inspectorate (PINS). The Planning Inspectorate deals with planning appeals, national infrastructure planning applications, examinations of local plans and other planning-related and specialist casework in England.

• WODC and Parish Councils have responded to the Scoping Report sent to PINS. You can read the response written by Alex Rogers on the Cassington Parish Council Website [insert link].

• The Planning Inspectorate have sent the feedback on the Scoping Report back to the developers (PVDP).

What is happening now

• PVDP is preparing a Preliminary Report on the Environmental Impact of the Project

• PVDP is preparing a Statement that sets out their Consultation with the Community. This is sent to WODC.

What happens next?

• PVDP holds a Statutory Community Consultation. This is expected to happen mid-October. This process is similar to what happened in December 2022, only this time, it is a process required by law.

• Brochures will be sent to households. There will be in person consultations and displays in village halls and we are expecting webinars as well.

There is a period of max 28 days to respond.

• Then PVDP submits a planning application (Development Consent Order) to the Planning Inspectorate (PINS).

• The application includes a statement on the Environmental Impact and a Report on the Community Consultation.

• WODC submits a Report to PINS which assesses whether the Community Consultation has been adequate. PINS has 28 days to refuse or accept PVDP's planning application.

What does this mean for us?

• As yet, NO planning application has been submitted for the Solar Power Station.

• A planning application cannot be successful if the Planning Inspectorate decides that the Community Consultation has been inadequate.

• The developers (PVDP) need to show that they have given the communities all the information they need to understand what the project means to them. They need to explain clearly how it works, what the impact will be, how long it takes. They need to make sure that they can answer questions clearly about the project. Answers must be consistent. The information needs to be accurate. Material presented to the communities mustn't miss things out, or present things in ways that are misleading. The information must be presented within a timeframe that allows communities to be able to respond properly.

Why is this consultation stage so important?

• Strange though it may seem, the Planning Inspectorate will not be looking at whether the proposal to build Botley West is a good thing or a bad thing. They will assess whether our communities have been properly informed and properly consulted.

• IF WE DON'T WANT THIS PLANNING APPLICATION TO SUCCEED WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE THROUGH OUR RESPONSES TO THE COMMUNITY CONSULTATION THAT IS COMING SOON

• WE SHALL PROVIDE MORE DETAILS ON HOW WE CAN DO THIS TOGETHER

What happens if the Planning Inspectorate accepts the Planning Application?

• PVDP publicises the fact that PINS accepts the application

• PINS appoints a panel of inspectors. This is called the Examining Authority.

- PINS holds a Preliminary meeting held by.
- ANYONE CAN REGISTER AS AN INTERESTED PARTY

• there is still an opportunity to protest against the application, and prevent, or delay moving on to the next stages of the process (for more information go to https://stopbotleywest.com/the-process)

• But it would be better to stop the process BEFORE PINS consents to the planning application.

September came and brought with it some surprise sunshine and a whirlwind of exciting activities and heartwarming moments at Churchfields Care Home as residents embraced the end of summer.





RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Your editor has reliably informed me that the lovely village of Cassington was known in the past as Cressington because of the number of water cress growers in the area. At first this did not fill me with great inspiration but then I decided to think of watercress as a 'British' version of rocket and the ideas began to come. Many are more suitable for summer and spring so expect some more next year, but I feel the time for soups is coming back, so here are a couple of soup ideas to eat for lunch or a light dinner with a delicious hunk of bread and some cheese and fresh watercress on the side. If you are feeling fancy a few parmesan crisps wouldn't come amiss with either of these soups.

Watercress and Courgette Soup

Courgettes are coming to the end of the season but there are still a few lurking hidden under the prickly leaves in my garden and to be honest I am trying to disguise them a bit now. This soup is perfect for this purpose.

Serves 4 - depends on whether it is for lunch or a starter

- 3 decent sized courgettes but not marrows
- 1 good sized white onion
- 3 cloves of garlic

About a litre light vegetable or chicken stock - home made if you can but I often resort to cubes

225 grams of watercress well washed and with the toughest stalks removed

1 medium baking potato

Chop the onion and squish the garlic. In a bit of butter and spot of vegetable oil, to prevent burning, saute the onion until it is very soft but not brown. Add in the cubed and peeled potato and continue cooking for five minutes with the lid on. Add the courgettes which have also been chopped into cubes. Add the garlic for a minute then pour in the stock. Pop the lid back on and simmer until all the vegetables are well cooked. Put in the watercress for only a minute or so - you want to try and retain its lovely green colour. Blend and sieve if you are really fussy (I hardly ever do). Serve with a tiny spoonful of creme fraiche or cream and a drizzle of dark olive oil.

Pea and Watercress Soup

If like me you always have a stash of peas in the freezer then this one is a lovely variation of the above. Basically the same but you replace the courgettes with about 150 grams of peas. This one, if possible, I would sprinkle with a bit of olive oil flavoured with basil or sprinkle some chives on top.

Gardening Tips for October

- Move tender plants, including aquatic ones, into a greenhouse or conservatory
- Cut back perennials that have died down
- Divide herbaceous perennials
- Prune climbing roses
- Renovate old lawns or create new grass areas by laying turf

The Cassington Tales

In the 900th year of St Peter's Church, Mandy Constance, resident playwright extraordinaire, agreed to mark the occasion by writing and directing a five-era promenade play, eagerly spurred on by John Hemingway who (with the help of numerous supporters) has done so much to raise the profile of this significant milestone.



Obviously, Mandy needed the help of a few fellow thespians, and turned to a few of her trusty "Cassington Players" (47 of them to be precise!) to deliver stories of significance from the history of our sleepy little village, where nothing very much at all happens (?).



Our first port of call was St Peter's church, at the turn of the 14th Century. Merry minstrels welcomed us to this atmospheric setting, and escorted us to a romantic

tale scuppered with class expectations. Central to the tale, was the desire of the Church benefactor (Lady Montacute), seeking both recognition of her philanthropy and wishing to see her favoured daughter marry "appropriately". With a dramatic twist, and a little medieval swordsmanship, her desires were undone, as the real hero – Matthew, a 'common' stonemason – won (audience) hearts and the fair lady, leaving Godfrey and Maud to ponder what might have been.

Next, we travelled to 'The Bell' at 'The Chequers'! It was 1665, and again we explored central themes of the day – the 'haves' and 'have nots' with dandy highwaymen (and women!) seeking to redress the imbalance (or not); the importance of the village inn in everyday life (something we would do well to remember today!); and a stark reminder that capital punishment was the order of the day for anyone committing a crime. A



particularly enjoyable aspect of this venue was the difference in the banter between the staff (jovial and 'tongue-in-cheek') and the patrons (stern and misogynistic, yet taking small delight in their ability to break wind at will!).

This led us nicely to 1852, when we were treated to the awakening desires of a young woman keen to join the suffragette movement. The cast played their roles with aplomb, emphasising established views of society, and the church in particular, in what would be a long and tortuous route to the right for women to vote. In spite of the subject matter, there was a good deal of humour in the narrative, with plum



lines (for the kitchen staff in particular), as they dealt good-naturedly with the increasingly outmoded views of Reverend Forster and his sycophantic wife. As in any good play, we need a hero – enter stage left Cecilia, not only a forward-thinking young woman but a great singer to boot!

Our suffragette march, from The Old Vicarage to The Cottage, moved us swiftly on to 1939 and the outbreak of World War II, with all that it represented both for Britain and Cassington, as our young men and



women signed up to do their duty. An expertly woven script brought together the great resolve of the people of the village at that time, as they sought to make sense of their sons/grandsons going off to war, whilst turning to the land to provide their daily needs. Some really authentic performances here – whether it be the "glass half full" attitude of Winnie and Lilian, foreboding Reg, dismissive Elsie or the innocence of youth – all brought expertly to life against the backdrop of a realistically decorated, intact, Anderson shelter.



Finally, we jump forward to 1978, where a motley gang of pub-goers extol the virtues of a traditional Oxfordshire pub pastime, whilst simultaneously tradition of taking

participating in the time-honoured tradition of taking the mickey out of your mates! As we are all aware "Bikenight" has put Cassington on the map, both nationally and internationally, in no small part due to the efforts of Ray Elger. This scene, devoted to the evolution of bike-night, as Ray and the rest of his chums hatched the plan for what has become an huge annual feature of our village, surely resounded with us all. We are glad to see that attendance at this event has slightly surpassed the twenty or so bikers you predicted coming along back in '78!

The concluded event with crafted beautifully walk down memory lane, by way of a video of old photographs of the village in times gone by, expertly overlaid with radio recordings featuring well-known village characters from yesteryear. As the black and white images bloomed into life in glorious technicolour, we are sure that for many of the older



members in the audience this will have brought back many happy memories of their younger days, whilst reminding the younger ones among us of the importance of community. Many, many thanks Rich – wonderful!

Each scene of this promenade play required a suitable venue to bring authenticity to the event. With that in mind, we would like to say a big thankyou to Kate Cropper, Kate Rogers, Jan & Bill from the Red Lion, Babu & Santok from The Chequers and of course to all connected to St. Peters' Church, for the kind offer of inviting over 200 villagers into their homes/places of work. Thanks also to Dan and Seren and the Bugz ukulele band for the musical interludes and to Mary Hatwell for the outdoor catering.

Of course, we keep our biggest show of gratitude to the teams behind the event: Lorna Mills for her unwavering support for all things 'village', Kevin Hinton for the

artwork promoting the play and the array of stage managers for keeping us all to an extremely exacting timeline.

Finally, as is always the case, we say a massive thanks to Mandy and Rich, whose enthusiasm and talent for villagecentric productions knows no bounds. And an apology to them both - no sooner has the curtain come down on this production, than the players and villagers ask "what's next?" Sorry! You are the victims of your own success!!
