THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION POPPY APPEAL 2023



This year Remembrance Sunday falls on 12th November. The Poppy Appeal House to House Collection will take place once again.

During the period running up to Remembrance Day authorised collectors, who are well known to most of you, will be calling. Last year the Appeal raised £1033.90 in Cassington and Worton – again exceeding £1000, most commendable for a village the size of Cassington. May I, on behalf of the Royal British Legion, thank all of you who so generously supported the Appeal then, and those who contributed to the collection tins we put out last year. May we once again rely on your generosity.

Today the Legion is still being called upon to give support to bereaved families, and to others who have been severely injured in wars and more recent conflicts. Costs to do this are continually escalating. The Royal British Legion does not advocate war or glorify it, but attempts to relieve the suffering caused by it.

The usual non-denominational Remembrance Service will be held at Cassington War Memorial commencing at 10.45am. Everyone is invited to this short service which follows immediately after the Service at St.Peter's Church. Please do not leave cars near the Memorial at this time.

November stargazing highlights

November 3 - Jupiter at Opposition.

Jupiter will be at its closest to Earth and it will be fully illuminated by the Sun. It will be brighter than any other time of the year and will be visible all night long. A good pair of binoculars should let you see Jupiter's four largest moons, appearing as bright dots on either side of the planet.

November 4, 5 - Taurids Meteor Shower.

The Taurids is a long-running minor meteor shower producing only about 5-10 meteors per hour. The moon will block most of the dim meteors this year. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Taurus, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

November 13 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky.

November 13 - Uranus at Opposition.

Uranus will be at its closest to Earth and it will be fully illuminated by the Sun. Due to its distance, it will only appear as a tiny dot in all but the most powerful telescopes.

November 17, 18 - Leonids Meteor Shower.

The Leonids is an average shower, producing up to 15 meteors per hour at its peak. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Leo, but can appear anywhere in the **sky**.

November 27 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be fully illuminated.

MICHAEL JOHN LINNELL

28th November 1938 - 31st August 2023

Michael John Linnell died on 31 August 2023 peacefully at home. Michael John was always known as Mike and was born 28th November 1938. He was always destined (albeit reluctantly) to be a lawyer at Linnells Solicitors, a firm started by his grandfather in early 1900s, and where his father also worked. Whilst Mike was managing partner there he over saw the merger with Blake Lapthorn to create a seventy nine partner firm, and so securing the future into the next century.

The family lived on Talbot Road Oxford and he was educated at The Dragon School and then St Edwards before going to Law School in Guilford. It was during his formative years at school in Oxford that he forged life long friendships, and where he developed his love of the outdoors, and found constant companionship with his pet dogs. His preference was to work in the countryside farming, rather than the dusty offices of law. His compromise to office life was that when not working he could enjoy his other great love, gardening, with his greatest love Ninon, but often with very different views on what should go where.

His loyalty to school was to be present all his life, with Mike chairing various school committees helping both current and past students. His booming voice was used by the Clarendon Club to MC their annual dinners. Mike was always available to help anyone whenever he could.


He married Ninon in 1964, then soon after moved to the village of Cassington. At that time his dog was a Gordon Setter. Ninon was to soon realize that she played second fiddle to Mike's beloved dogs and always would. Sharing a house with a dog was very new to Ninon, not realizing that dogs love cake. When she baked her first cake in her new oven in her new house she put the cake to cool on a low shelf. This was not a good idea as the dog soon demolished it. Ninon and Mike's dogs were never going to be the best of friends after this.

Mike's devotion to friends and family was more than apparent in his life. The friends he made at school were constant companions and he always had time to spend with them and help them. In his early life he was the first to volunteer to help Peter Bridges with Wolvercote youth theatre, even making a film one summer that involved one of them jumping into the lake.

Cassington soon became another love of Mike's, and he was considered the elder statesman of the village. He was a pillar of the village committees held in high regard by everyone. Someone who unabashedly stood by his beliefs, and who could articulate his views on what he thought the village should be doing (whether or not everyone agreed was another matter...)

When the young couple arrived in Cassington the then village elders wasted no time in co-opting this new, legal mind on to the Parish Council; which Mike went on to lead for more than 20 years. But one council wasn't enough for a man of Mike's talents.

Reverend Peter Williams then asked him to join the Parochial Charity that looks after the almshouses. This was sold to Mike under the slightly pressuring stance of what a great honour it is to be asked to be a part of, and as ever Mike took up the mantle willingly and with all his good intent. So much so that after joining in 1969 he was leading it right up until the day he died.



He chaired all the parochial charity meetings and graciously hosted them (with Ninon's help). The most recent project was the new roof which fell to Mike to project manage. He visited the houses everyday, and took great care of all the administration and details, with the residents' needs at the core of all his time. At almost every meeting Mike would say to the committee "this is my last meeting I think" only to be met with choruses of "no, just another year Mike...." Here we are fifty four years later.

Mike's involvement permeated throughout all pockets and generations of village life: he was hugely supportive of the school and St Peter's church. Another committee he was part of was the Village Hall Committee. One of the members of that committee said "Mike wasn't just "on" committees (like so many can be), he was active, engaged and truly believed in making a difference in the community we are all part of.

Mike was not all work. Throughout their time in Cassington Mike and Ninon started enjoying Saturdays in the Red Lion when Paul Smith was landlord, and continued to do so through the Lions different terms of office. Like all good public houses this was a setting where his role as legal advisor was often tested. The finest professional advice is supposedly given in pubs over a pint. This quest for advice transcended beyond the pub doors once with someone knocking at Mike's door after midnight in the pitch black with the quandary of having been asked to work bank holidays at the factory and did Mike think this was right? To which Mike politely answered "my office hours are 9-5pm so this is actually against my union rules." And eventually, after numerous occasions of "Mike what do you think about...", the final straw came when asked for more advice in the pub (after documents being dropped off at his house on Christmas day). Mike once again politely answered but the next day drew up and delivered an invoice for his time, and we all know what a solicitor's time can look like! Word soon spread and questions of advice soon died down to an acceptable level.

Mike and the Linnells are a fundamental part of our village. He was a pillar of our committees and, in construction terms, a load bearing wall of Cassington, whose actions will forever hold it up and will forever be remembered by those of us lucky enough to have known him and to live here. We are all thankful to Mike and will all miss him terribly.

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COULD YOU VOLUNTEER?

Deborah Ginns is the New Bereavement Support Manager at Sobell and Katharine House Hospices.

When we moved to Cassington, during the pandemic, neighbours left cards, tea, wine! and notes on the front step. We felt we were in the right place.

That's how I feel every time I speak to a bereaved client. They are so glad to speak to someone outside their family or circle of friends. They may be putting on a 'face', not wanting to upset others or 'burden' them, while inside a mountain of grief is building, and they may feel unable to talk to others about the person who has died. Our amazing volunteers provide a release valve and help the bereaved understand, that although grief is different for everyone, what they are experiencing is 'normal'. You can almost feel their shoulders sag with relief. Someone understands what they are going through.

When I first started, the number of volunteers astonished me. Especially when the foundation training is 56 hours, and the commitment is 16 hours a month. Then I started to meet them. I discovered they are a group of exceptional individuals, warm, empathetic, good listeners who can support other people's expression of grief and distress. Their reward is seeing their clients progressing through bereavement, coming to terms with it, and visualising a future. So they stay. Do you have these qualities? Would you like to join our team? If so, you might like to know:

You need your own transport.

You get phone and travel expenses.

You must be available to attend every session of the face-toface foundation training.

We can keep your name for the following course if you can't make all the dates.

We don't recommend doing bereavement support work if you have had a close bereavement in the last two years. But: For anyone interested in helping our hospices, there are alternatives. Sobell House are looking for ward volunteers to support our in-patient team and volunteer drivers to help transport patients and equipment. We also need Volunteer Companions to support patients and families, in the community and in-patient units, at both hospices.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Italian Pasta sauce

This sauce is the vegetarian version. There are as many versions of this sauce as there are regions in Italy, and everyone will tell you their sauce is the authentic Italian version. This one is from the Provence of Avellino from a small village called Montoro, where I was born. Later I will share more recipes from my home village, but first you must master the art of making the base ingredient of:

"La Cucina Povera" - The kitchen of the poor

"la salsa di pomodoro per la pasta" - Tomato sauce for Pasta.

Ingredients

3 to 4 cloves of garlic.

Half a medium size onion.

2 to 3 tablespoons of olive oil

4 (400g) tins of chopped tomatoes. Use the best: Ciro or Napolina or you will need extra puree to thicken the sauce. Half a tablespoon of tomato puree

Half a tablespoon of each dried Oregano & Parsley. If using fresh Parsley, it must be flatleaf.

Method

Chop the Garlic and onion to roughly the same size. Put the olive oil into a suitable size saucepan (that will hold the 4 tins of tomatoes + the extra water) and add the onion. Heat slowly until the onion starts to soften then add the garlic and continue cooking until golden brown. Add the tomatoes (have the tins ready opened) and bring to the boil. Fill one

of empty tins with water and rinse out the other three and add to the pan, then add the tomato puree. Continue to boil for a further 3 to 4 minutes, then add the Oregano and Parsley. Let the sauce simmer on the lowest heat for 2½ to 3 hours, stirring occasionally or it will stick to the bottom of the saucepan.

If you like it spicy hot (Arrabbiata) add some chilli flakes. I prefer to use fresh chillies, chopped and cooked in the sauce, not so fierce tasting. Be mindful of any children as the sauce will be spicy hot. Why not add the Chillies before you freeze the sauce, you could do 50/50 then.

Don't deviate from the recipe or you will not experience the true taste of my region of Italy.

There is also the meaty version, sear a piece of seasoned, stuffed and rolled shin of beef (Braciole) with the garlic and onions, and then cook it in the sauce, slightly more involved but lifts the sauce to a completely different level.

It's that easy! "And you don't put sugar, bicarbonate of soda or vinegar in the sauce". My Grandmother would turn in her grave if I did.

As I usually use the sauce in many of my dishes, I make it with 5 or 6 tins of tomatoes and freeze it when it's cooled down in individual containers so I can take out as much or as little as I need.

Village Hall Solar Panels

With the generally held view in the village that the best place for solar panels is on our roof-tops, coupled to the findings of a study which indicated that the annual solar energy hitting rooftops in Oxfordshire is equivalent to 57% of the County's total electricity requirements, we thought it was high time that we (on your behalf) installed solar panels on the village hall. Of course, we will also benefit from reduced electricity bills and although the pay-back time on the investment is fairly significant, they will ultimately make a significant contribution to the village hall energy requirements, and all from a renewable resource.

We have opted to future-proof the system we will install in terms of being able to link up electric car charging points as and when we are required to put them in place.

Whilst the panels are a considerable cost to the village, paid for from the many events and bookings which take place annually, we have had strong support from individuals in the village for the proposal. Installation of the panels, which is still subject to planning permission at the time of writing, will hopefully begin towards the end of this year.

Thanks again for your support and good to know that Cassie is doing its little bit to nudge us along the path to net-zero!

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BLENHEIM COMMUNITY

David Green, Head of Innovation here at Blenheim, loves nothing more than to measure everything from air quality, water quality, lichen growth on the Palace as well as measure energy usage, heat loss, CO₂ levels and footfall across the Palace and Estate.

This data is sent back to an open-source database which can be viewed by anyone; part of this is shown on this website. David recently added some little black boxes to some of the paths across the Estate. This measures how many people are walking them and at what times. This allows the Estate Team to manage these paths better and allow Blenheim to see the uptake of these walkways, which in turn helps Estates to plan to open more paths for public use. So, if you see a little black box on your walks, that's what it is doing!

There was a great turnout in the Village Hall for an excellent talk by Alex Rogers, one of our parish councillors, on the proposed solar project: the reality of its size and structure and of 76% of it being on greenbelt; the ways it is likely to impact the bird and animal life and the quality of the land and natural vegetation in our fields; and the loss for us all of our life-nurturing surroundings.

Whilst acknowledging that we are all aware of the need for green energy solutions, Alex raised the question of whether this really is the right kind of solution and is being proposed for the right reasons.

Massive Engineering Works

The final episode in the Cassington railway bridge incident reported in a previous CAWN has been reached. Our

reporter revisited the scene and photographed the major works that have been undertaken prevent to further similar incidents.



You have probably heard that Merton has withdrawn its land from the solar proposals by PVDP. This land is approximately 5% of the whole project, so is this significant? It certainly is! For one thing, Merton has on reflection seen the damage that the project as a whole will do to key fragile meadows, the Swinford Water Meadows whose flagship biodiversity was featured in a UK government film for COP. Secondly, PVDP now have to rethink some of their underground cables and this means going back to the drawing boards. Hence delayed village consultations.

Please do join SBW if you have not already done so at www.stopbotleywest.com. This means you'll get regular updates on what's happening and can prepare for the village consultation. It is vital that as many of us as possible attend the consultation and prepare beforehand, with the knowledge you now have, to ask searching questions about details of the plan and what mitigations are in place for bird and animal life, food production, soil quality preservation, flood prevention, and much more, as well as to provide lifeenhancing country walks for the people who live here.

Also we ask you to feed back to us, most importantly, not your views on the project, but your views on how thoroughly you were consulted. Were your questions taken seriously and were the answers thoughtful and respectful? Were you given all the information you needed?

Thank you to all of you making your voices heard. The part you play is invaluable.

He spoke of the complexities of the different Blenheim companies and PVDP's background and the questions those raise, whilst also looking at the hidden carbon cost of such a project.

The audience was fully engaged and there were many questions and contributions from the floor. Thank you everyone for your part.
