December stargazing highlights

December 4 - Mercury at Greatest Eastern Elongation. This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the evening sky. Look for the planet low in the western sky just after sunset.

December 12 - New Moon.

The Moon will not be visible in the night sky.

December 13, 14 - Geminids Meteor Shower.

The Geminids is the king of the meteor showers; considered to be the best shower in the heavens. It peaks this year on the night of the 13th and morning of the 14th. The nearly new moon means dark skies for what should be an excellent show. Best viewing will be from after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Gemini, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

December 21, 22 - Ursids Meteor Shower.

The Ursids is a minor meteor shower. It peaks on the the night of the 21st and morning of the 22nd. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Ursa Minor, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

December 22 - December Solstice.

This is the first day of winter in the Northern Hemisphere.

December 27 - Full Moon.

The Moon's face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Cold Moon because it's the time of year when the cold winter air settles in and the nights become long and dark. It's also been known as the Long Nights Moon and the Moon Before Yule.

Mistletoe

At Christmas time we traditionally decorate our houses in a variety of ways. For me, one of the most interesting traditions are the origins of hanging mistletoe.



Mistletoe is an evergreen hemi-parasitic plant, without obvious roots and therefore a source of food. It also has a mysterious method of reproduction and collectively these unusual traits have led to the plant being thought of as magical and credited with extraordinary powers - giving rise to its rich history in folklore. The plant does actually have roots which have become adapted to penetrating through the bark of its host tree to obtain water and nutrients, and the green leaves indicate that it does photosynthesise (hence "hemi" parasite). It is also dioecious, meaning that there are both male and female plants and it is only the female which has the characteristic white berries, inside which are the sticky seeds which are eaten by birds. Eventually the seeds are attached to the branches of the host tree via the bird's droppings. Indeed, the mistle thrush is so named because of its strong preference for the white mistletoe berries when they are in season – the association reflected in its latin name viscivorus which means "sticky".

Some of us will already know that mistletoe has a strong connection to the ancient druids who used it in some of their rituals and that it also features in Norse mythology. The association with the Druids is a persistent one as mistletoe was worshipped by them when it was found on their sacred tree, the oak. When the Druid priests found mistletoe on oak they waited until after the winter solstice and climbed the tree to harvest it, cutting the plant with a golden sickle and allowing it to fall onto a special cloak, as if the plant touched the ground it would lose its medicinal and ritualistic powers. Interestingly (ecologically), the mistletoe is rarely found in association with oak, and so it perhaps makes sense that on the rare occasions the pairing was found, the individual tree would have been elevated to a special status.

Norse mythology tells of a goddess, who was plagued by dreams foretelling of her son's murder. To confer protection upon him she made every element of the natural world swear never to harm him — except the mistletoe (no idea why!). The son became very popular among the gods and this angered the evil god Loki who fashioned a weapon from mistletoe which was used to slay him. The goddess grieved for him, crying pearl white tears which are symbolised by the white berries of the mistletoe and she decreed that rather than being punished, mistletoe should become a symbol of peace and friendship — the reason why it adorns our houses at Christmas time — a time of peace and friendship.

And then of course there is the kissing thing. There are a host of suggestions as to why we get a peck on the cheek under a sprig of mistletoe, but sadly there is a degree of uncertainty as to their origins. That said, there are definite links to the plant being considered a symbol of fertility. In medieval times women wishing to conceive would wrap mistletoe around their wrists and waists in order to increase their chances of becoming pregnant.

A plausible origin of the custom of kissing under the mistletoe stems from Scandinavian antiquity where it was recognised as the plant of peace. Folklore has it that when Scandinavian enemies met in a forest with mistletoe present, they laid down their weapons and maintained a truce until the next day, signified by an embrace. This was adapted in Victorian times, first catching on among servants in stately homes and spreading throughout society, to what we now observe as the British tradition of kissing under the mistletoe.

Like so many of the inhabitants of our countryside, there is much more folklore surrounding the mystical mistletoe and its influence upon the traditions of past and present society. So, as you bedeck your house to welcome family and friends over the festive period you might ask yourself why you are putting up holly and ivy or why we choose an evergreen rather than a deciduous Christmas tree?




Fireworks at the Red Lion

I want to take you on a culinary visual journey to show you some of the many Christmas recipes that my family prepared from the area of Montoro. Unfortunately many of



the ingredients are difficult if not impossible to obtain in and around Oxfordshire, and furthermore very expensive online in the UK; so it must be a descriptive essay. I hope you enjoy reading my 'Italian Christmas' lunch.

Christmas Eve

For as long as I can remember 3 or 4 days before Christmas, dad would come home with a bucket of live Eels (Anguille), which he would dispatch and prepare ready for mum to cook on Christmas Eve. She would dust in plain flour and then shallow fry them.

Primo would consist of Spaghetti with capers cooked in a tomato sauce which gave it a salty flavour. Secondo consisted of several different types of fish dishes, one being salted dried codfish (Bacalao) (after being rehydrated in cold water for at least 24 hours) and then, for the grandchildren and my English wife she would prepare battered Cod and chips and a selection of vegetables.

Also, on the menu chicory and an array of olive salads. To finish, fresh fruits nuts and the obligatory chestnuts, not forgetting the usual assortment of sweet desserts. Soft drinks for the younger children, while the older ones would be allowed to enjoy a drop of wine with the adults.

Christmas Day

Antipasti

Dinner often commenced with a variety of appetizers (antipasti) including cured meats (prosciutto, salami), cheeses (formaggi), olives (olive), vegetables (marinated in sweet vinegar & oil) and toasted Italian bread (bruschetta) drizzled with olive oil, topped with chopped garlic and tomatoes. There are numerus salami & cheeses available in Italy, but here in Britain we only see two or three in the local supermarkets.

Primo Piatti

Then into the first course (Primo Piatti), typically consists of a pasta dish. Popular choices included our version of Lasagne Napolitano, (not the lasagne everyone has come to know in Britain), cannelloni filled with seasoned minced beef and tortellini served in a broth, (which we hardly ever had).

Secondo Piatto

Main course, (Secondo Piatto) includes roasted or braised meats - roast lamb, roast pork and stuffed capon or turkey which is very popular now in Italy. These are served with contorni (side dishes) roasted vegetables, sautéed greens, and a variety of salads. My father's and my favourite roasted potatoes seasoned with rosemary and garlic are a must, and all washed down with an abundant quantity of red & white wines.

Dolce

Desserts (Dolce) play a central role in Italian Christmas dinners. Traditional cakes like Panettone, Panforte and Pandoro are often served, along with a variety of homemade treats. Plates of dried fruits, candied fruit and nuts, these are served with Vin Santo (Holy wine), which I find difficult to come across in England - a sweet dessert wine that pairs beautifully with many Italian Christmas sweet desserts.

Frutta fresca

And not forgetting the fresh fruit and nuts, which at this time in Italy usually consists of many of the citrus family of fruits, oranges (arance), mandarins (mandarini), walnuts (noci), hazelnuts (nocciole) and the obligatory roasted chestnuts (castagne arrostite sul fuoco) which are all locally grown. Consumed over a long leisurely afternoon and into the evening at the table.

After the meal Espresso is a must for many Italians. It's often followed by a selection of liqueurs, including Grappa (Grappa a grape-based pomace brandy and of Italian origin that contains 35 to 60% alcohol), Limoncello, and Amaro (Italian for bitter) is an Italian Herbal liqueur that is commonly consumed as an after-dinner digestive (digestivo). It usually has a bitter-sweet flavour, sometimes syrupy, and usually has a low alcohol content of 16%, and is commercially produced. 40 to 100% is not uncommon, and normally made by Monks in a variety of different flavours and colours depending what herbs are available in their regions of Italy.

TEA TIME TEASER

In this edition Pasquale Bruno tells us about a traditional Italian Christmas menu. So our teaser this month is dishes from around the world that are consumed on either Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. Which country enjoys these menus? Answers next month

1. Pan de Jamón — a sweet-savoury bread is traditionally served on Christmas Eve

Christmas lunch begins with sopa de galets, a meaty

soup bobbing with pasta shells.

This country has its largest festive meal on Christmas Eve, which includes roast ham, smoked fish, pickled beetroot salad and vegetable casseroles such as lanttulaatikko, a spiced swede bake.

Eaten for breakfast after Misa de Gallo (Midnight Mass) on Christmas Eve, bibingka is a doughy rice-flour cake

incorporating coconut milk, butter and eggs.

This country celebrates Christmas with a variety of meat-filled dishes, from pernil (slow-roasted pork) to arroz con gandules (rice with pigeon peas).

6. Some of the residents of this country celebrate

Christmas, or Ganna, on 7 January. Their 43-day fast, which begins on 25 November, is broken with their national dish, rooster doro wat, a fiery chicken stew with hard-boiled eggs.

7. Malva pudding, a sponge cake containing apricot jam, is one of this countries most decadent desserts. It's reserved for special occasions throughout the year, but Christmas sees variations incorporating brandy or Amarula, a cream liqueur made from marula fruit.

In this country eating KFC for Christmas Eve dinner has become a treasured tradition.
