Congratulations and thank you to Anthony Thompson, whose vision and backing orchestrated 'The Forever Fields Project' (www.foreverfields.co.uk) that culminated in an Art Exhibition.

On 24th–26th November, more than 1,100 people visited the art exhibition held at Worton Hall by the Forever Fields project team. Professional and amateur artists created 160 works of art, including paintings, photography, sculpture, audio-visual work, poetry and prose – all celebrating our local green spaces, which are under direct threat from the Botley West power station proposal. Collectively, the artists spoke of their commitment to our fields, to our wild places, to our settlements and to the biodiversity of nature.

January stargazing highlights

January 3/4 - Quadrantids Meteor Shower.

The Quadrantids is an above average shower, with up to 40 meteors per hour at its peak. It is thought to be produced by dust grains left behind by an extinct comet known as 2003 EH1, which was discovered in 2003. The shower peaks this year on the night of the 3rd and morning of the 4th. The waning moon will block out some of the fainter meteors, but if you are patient this could still be a good show. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Bootes, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

January 11 - New Moon.


The Moon will be on the same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

January 12 - Mercury at Greatest Western Elongation.

This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the morning sky. Look for the planet low in the eastern sky just before sunrise.

January 25 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be on the opposite side of the Earth to the Sun and its face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Wolf Moon because this was the time of year when hungry wolf packs howled outside their camps. This moon has also been know as the Old Moon and the Moon After Yule.

This is YOUR village And YOUR future YOUR input can make a difference.

The Booklets

Please read the booklet that came through your door and be prepared to ask questions about what concerns you about the proposals. Especially look at how specific they are.....there are a lot of "mays", "mights" and "coulds". Do you need any reassurance that these things will or will not happen? Be prepared to ask questions specific to what you know. And where "mitigations" are spoken of, be sure to ask about what specific mitigations will be in place for the areas you are concerned about.

AT THE CONSULTATION

This is your chance to ask every question that you would like an answer to.

Where you can, illustrate your questions with examples. Think about:

damage to a specific hedge/track; lorry movements through the village; temporary construction sites; fencing restrictions on the track; vehicular access points on our road; noise/light pollution; exact cable route through the Cassington site; flood risk;

any substations on the Cassington site; disruption during construction + installation; decommissioning guarantees; damage to plants;

protection of the over-wintering swans and other wildlife; damage to ancient hedgerows and tracks;

accuracy of photomontage visualisations

...are they showing you the views that matter to you and are they looking at them from the vantage points you know?

Look at the Maps

Can you clearly see:
the exact cable route,
new access roads,
security cameras,
inverters,
substations,
vehicular access points,
temporary construction compounds?
Is there enough detail?

How to respond to the Developer during the Consultation

If you attend a consultation you may be given a response booklet. Don't fill it in there - take it away and think about it, complete it and post it back (should be freepost)

- You can fill in the same response form on the Developer's website.
- If you think the form has not give you the opportunity to say everything you want to, send an email directly to the developer (info@botleywest.com) and ASK FOR A REPLY.

As you leave the Consultation, please complete our questionnaire.

On leaving, look out for your Cassington volunteers either in a gazebo outside the hall or in the entrance hall, and complete our questionnaire (preferably then and there before you leave)

• If you miss doing this or if you aren't able to get to a face-to-face consultation, please complete the online version of the questionnaire. A link to this will be sent with the weekly email from Alex Rogers.

NB. Make sure you are registered for updates (select the REGISTER FOR UPDATES button on the HOME page of www.stopbotleywest.com

IMPORTANT NOTE: This questionnaire is NOT about the proposals themselves but about how adequately you feel the consultation has been carried out by the Developer. The Developers' feedback form is where to give your views for or against the proposal.

Community Orchards



Over 50 new community orchards, benefitting west oxfordshire both wildlife and people, are set to be created DISTRICT COUNCIL in West Oxfordshire following a successful

bid to secure funding from the DEFRAs' Coronation Living Heritage Fund. Local groups wanting to establish community orchards in their neighbourhoods, and with space to plant at least five fruit trees, are now being invited by the District Council to come forward and apply for a slice of the £50,000 fund which the Council is distributing.

Helping to restore lost habitats, the orchards will play a positive role within communities by connecting more people to nature and their local green spaces, while providing much-needed habitat for birds and giving sustenance to pollinators and other wildlife. The orchards - which need to be planted on publicly accessible land to allow as many people as possible to benefit from them - will leave a visible and lasting legacy to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III.

The closing date for applications is 19 January 2024. Successful applicants will be notified by 31 January with planting expected to take place during February and March. countryside - 75% of it on green belt land – to a single industrial development of 2.5 million groundmounted solar panels can justified, especially alternatives, such as wind power, produce more electricity without

harming vital food production. They saw financial greed, rather than a sustainable energy strategy being developed.

Anthony commissioned 'CONNECTED' willow sculpture by, Goodwin of 'Willow Coppice' (www. willowcoppice.com) as the centre piece of the show, the two interlocking 3 metre willow circles expressed the interdependence of 'Humans' and 'Nature' and how we need to maintain the ecological balance forever.

A large scale video installation by Charlotte Holmes, also of 'Willow Coppice' had recorded the movements and sounds of wind in the crops and grasses, rainwater and birdsong and ran throughout the exhibition. 16 minutes long on repeat there was constant reminder of the exhibition focus, with a call of the cuckoo punctuating proceedings.

Before the exhibition opened, all the artworks were photographed and recorded for an archive. If Botley West goes ahead, it will last 40+ years before it is dismantled and the land relinquished. The archive will show how the landscape looked, felt and sounded, and what it meant to the people living, working and walking in it. It can be used to guide future custodians of the land as they

help to repair the damage.

The Forever Fields team is working on the best way to retain the archive, and how make it freely and publicly accessible. Details will be shared in due course.

The exhibition was a resounding success - but there is work to be done vet; our fields remain at risk.

High Sheriff's Awards for the year 2023/2024

Every year the High Sheriff of Oxfordshire invites nominations for approximately 20 High Sheriff Awards in recognition of individuals in Oxfordshire who have made outstanding contributions to the communities in which they live and work. Nominees will usually have had a high impact on the lives of others over a sustained period of time and will be recognised by other people working in the nominee's area as inspirational and as setting an example for others to follow. High Sheriff's Awards will not normally be made to people whose work and commitment has already been recognised by the award of a National Honour or by bodies such as the Police, the Fire and Rescue Service and Oxfordshire Charity and Voluntary Action.

Nominations can be made by anyone who lives or works in Oxfordshire or who is representing an organisation in the public, voluntary and charitable or private sectors. All nominations will be treated in the strictest confidence

and nominees should not be informed that they have been nominated as it can be very disappointing to raise expectations which are then not met.

All nominations should be made on the downloadable form and should include the contact details of the nominee as well as the nominator together with a brief summary (400 words max) of the reasons why the nominee merits a High Sheriff's Award.

The deadline for nominations is Friday 5th January 2024. Successful nominees will be contacted early February and the High Sheriff Awards will be conferred at a ceremony in central Oxford on a date to be confirmed to which nominators, families and friends will also be invited. Nominations will be welcome for people of all age groups who have made outstanding contributions to any aspect of community life.

BLENHEIM

As 2023 draws to a close, we have been reflecting on the many important restoration and construction projects that have been successfully completed this year thanks to the support of our visitors. These include our new 2 acre Adventure Play down at the Walled Garden, the final decorative phase of our £1 million Chapel project to increase environmental stability and our Lake Dredge (which removed 30,000 cubic metres of silt from the Queen Pool). Most recently we replaced the roof of our Orangery as well as Flagstaff Tower, which temporarily had an enormous, colourful wrap created by designs from Oxfordshire Youth. As we set our sights on the future, we are already gearing up for our biggest project yet of restoring the Palace roof in 2025 / 26 – keep updated at blenheimpalace.com/restoration/

LOCAL PLANNED ROADWORKS

A4260/A4165 Kidlington Roundabout

Construction work for the planned improvements to Kidlington roundabout is due to commence from 8 January 2024 through to June 2024. This scheme will include the following key construction elements:

- New dedicated bus lanes on the Bicester Road (southbound) linking with the bus lane on the eastern section of Kidlington Roundabout.
- New signalised crossing facilities on Bicester Road, Oxford Road south and Frieze Way
- Reduced speed limits to 30mph on the roundabout and its approaches (additional changes, including along the remaining length of A4260 north of the roundabout, and on Banbury Road south of the roundabout toward Oxford are also being proposed alongside the main scheme)
- A new 3.5m wide shared use pedestrian and cycle path to connect to existing infrastructure
- · Improved street and footpath lighting

This General Arrangement Plan shows the proposed layout of the improvements on the Kidlington Roundabout. The traffic management scheme has been designed to minimise the impact as far as possible on residents and businesses plus road users affected by these works, including bus services. Traffic lanes on all approaches will remain open for the works, including two vehicular lanes around the circulatory of the roundabout. Whilst disruption will be minimised wherever possible, delays are likely throughout the works, and everyone is being asked to review their daily route, mode of transport and time of travel and, where possible, consider alternatives.

A44 Loop Farm Roundabout to Cassington Road

Construction of the improvements to the A44 between the Loop Farm roundabout and the Cassington Road roundabout was substantially completed at the end of October 2023, including the switching on of the new toucan crossing, north of Cassington Road roundabout, on 9 October 2023 and the bus gate traffic signal at the canal bridge on 23 October 2023.

The section of the new bus lane between the Turnpike PH and the solar farm remains closed for strengthening works on several utility manholes. These are scheduled for completion shortly, allowing the bus lane to open fully.

This scheme has delivered the following construction elements:

- New signalised toucan crossing on the A44 to the north of Cassington Road
- A new parallel crossing on Cassington Road at the junction with the A44
- A new dedicated southbound bus lane
- New footpath on the eastern side of the A44
- New continuous, and widened shared-use pedestrian and cycle path on the western side of the A44
- New and improved informal crossing facilities
- Improved street and footpath lighting

 Maintenance and strengthening to King's rail bridge slab structure

Works substantially completed at the end of October 2023. A minor site presence will be maintained to complete the remaining offline works, i.e. fencing and landscaping, plus any remedial and defects works required.

A34/A44 Peartree interchange

Construction of the improvements to the A44 between the A34 Peartree interchange and the Loop Farm roundabout were substantially completed at the end of September 2023 including the switching on of the traffic signals on Peartree interchange week commencing 25 September 2023.

Since switching on the traffic signals, the Council are aware of queuing occurring on the roundabout due to the ongoing adjacent developer works at the Oxford North site that continues on the A44 past the Peartree park & ride. They continue to monitor this, and traffic signal engineers have scheduled a site visit to validate further the signal phasing against final traffic flows and conditions once the developer works are complete. This is expected in January 2024.

In the interim, and subject to monitoring, the Council are considering the installation of yellow box markings, and if appropriate, they can arrange for their implementation. They have numerous items of remedial works to undertake along the length of the whole project, and these markings could be included as part of those measures.

This scheme has delivered the following key construction elements:

- New dedicated southbound bus lanes between Loop Farm Roundabout and Peartree Interchange
- A new footpath on the eastern side of the A44
- New continuous, and widened, shared use pedestrian and cycle path on the western side of the A44
- Improved informal crossing facilities on Frieze Way
- New signalised crossings on the Pear Tree Interchange (northbound off-slip and southbound on-slip)
- Additional traffic lanes on Peartree circulatory
- Improved street and footpath lighting

Main works - substantial completion end September 2023 Commissioning of traffic signals 25 September 2023

A minor site presence will be maintained to complete any remedial and defects works required. In addition, replacement landscaping works are due to be implemented from January 2024, and these will have a minimum impact on traffic lanes. Installation of new signage to the A34 northbound off—slip remains outstanding, and dates are to be confirmed in future.

RECIPES OF THE MONTH

Festive food over Christmas and New Year tends to turn towards the traditional with a twist. It is one of the reasons we love it—if we are lucky we can remember scenes from our childhood with turkeys and Christmas puddings and crackers with variations, sometimes the turkey is on the floor being eaten by the house cat or dog, sometimes the flavours have been changed and added to adding new traditions when the family grows or moves to other areas of the UK or the world.

We are brilliant in the UK at incorporating food from all across the planet but often stick to the format of what is fundamentally a posh roast dinner for Christmas. So, when it gets to January we are craving, perhaps, other spicier, lighter, fresher flavours, as long as they warm the soul and brighten up the still short days.

Soups will always be brilliant at this time of the year and can be either the run up to a larger meal or be a meal in themselves. The three I have suggested are all delicious in different ways and the inspiration for them came from all over the place!

Curried Apple Soup

(dreadful name but it does let you know what it is!)

For this you will need a mixture of apples, some bramleys, some russets or similar and any other apples which have a good flavour and are not floury.

50g butter (unsalted)

2 chopped onions

650/700g apples, peeled and chopped (at last minute)

2 tbsps gentle curry powder – and here you really can use a generic one – or a curry oil if you can find one.

1 cinnamon stick

1 litre mild chicken or vegetable stock – nothing overpowering but I find it is better than just plain water

Yoghurt to serve and if you can be bothered or have some apple crisps

Method:

Cook the onions and apples so gently in the butter they do not colour but do soften completely. Add curry powder or oil and let it sink into the mixture, then pour in the stock and add the cinnamon stick. Simmer until everything is totally soft (except the stick). Remove the cinnamon stick and liquidise the soup. Serve with yoghurt and apples crisps.

NB: the apple soup can become a banana soup but you need fewer bananas - it is really good!

Pretend Bortsch

This is much easier, I think, to make than a traditional (whether Russian, Polish, Czech or Ukraine bortsch) but has the same flavour profiles and pretty colour.

3 large RAW beetroots and one small raw beetroot Small celeriac

1 small onion

6 good sized carrots

Stock – either use a marmite infusion or Bovril dissolved in boiling water

Bav leaf

Fermented beetroot juice – I have found this in Polish shops or other Eastern European food suppliers I think you could use pomegranate molasses and a good squeeze of lemon juice to replicate the flavour.

To serve – sour cream and rye bread

Method:

Grate all the vegetables (except baby beetroot) with a food processor (if you have one, if not bad luck!) and pop into a saucepan with the stock and bay leaf. Gently cook until the vegetables are totally soft. Remove the bay leaf and liquidise.

Now, for serving if you are lucky you have found the beetroot juice so pour in a bit and keep tasting until it reaches the flavour you like. The baby beetroot you add in tiny dice at the last moment while reheating. Lots of pepper and some salt. This looks really pretty in blue bowls with a swirl of sour cream and some chives or dill.

Chinese style Soup

If you have some turkey or other bones to make into a stock put them in a pressure cooker or large saucepan with cinnamon sticks, star anise, onions, dried mushrooms and a few Szechuan peppers. Simmer (or pressure cook) until the most delicious fragrance fills your kitchen. Allow the stock to cool and strain.

To finish simply add soy sauce, toasted sesame oil, spring onions, duck, chicken or beef strips and some cooked noodles. What I do is add the flavourings and keep tasting, then, at the last minute, pop in the meat and noodles and serve sprinkled with sesame seeds and spring onions. A veggie version would involve a dark mushroom stock finished with all the same but in place of meat strips use smoked tofu.

One last suggestion (weird at this time of year, but actually sometimes you need something light to wake up your tastebuds) is a salad my sister made me years ago – I had to twist her arm to get the recipe.

Duck (or smoked tofu or tempeh) salad

Take strips of cooked duck or your vegetarian option and marinade in the following: 2 limes – juice and zest, juice of one orange, 2 tbsps of nam pla, some raw chillies – as many as hot, as you like, grated ginger (or cheat and use sushi ginger chopped up). The duck will need less time than the tofu or tempeh to absorb the flavours. Strain the proteins and keep the juices.


Make a huge, crunchy, salad including, romaine lettuce or similar, spring onions, black radishes, coriander and if you like cucumber, although it isn't really the time of year. I sometimes add strips of carrot made using a potato peeler.

Put this in a beautiful bowl, pour on the juices from the marinade and add in some sesame oil and a bit of sunflower oil. Mix with your hands until all the leaves etc are coated with the dressing. Now add in the protein, one last turn to dress the meat or tofu and that's it.

Disposing of your Christmas tree

When the time comes to take down your Christmas tree, you may be wondering what to do with it. Here are four tips from the RHS Chief Horticulturist, Guy Barter.

Let it rot

Real trees are biodegradable and free from wood preservatives. This soft wood rots away disappearing into the soil within a year or two if nature is left to take its course. Cut up a Christmas tree into sticks and stack in a shady out-of-the-way part of the garden. The rotting tree fragments support many insects and other wildlife, as well as improving the soil and feeding nearby plants.

Shred it

Shredding Christmas trees greatly speeds up their decomposition. Shreddings make a good mulch for shrubs and paths. Many councils and some retailers offer a shredding service with the chipped trees being composted in a green waste site and the resulting compost used to enrich farmland.

Chop it and stack it

If you do not have access to a garden shredder, you can chop the tree up with secateurs – sawing the trunk into short sections will help. The chopped-up tree can be stacked in the garden where it will slowly break down and disappear, feeding and sheltering wildlife as it decays.

Create a dead hedge

If you fancy a 'dead hedge', composed of packed prunings held in place with stout posts, Christmas trees will make a good filler. This is another wildlife-friendly option.
