February stargazing highlights

February 9 - New Moon.

The Moon will be on the same side of the Earth to the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

February 24 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be on the opposite side of the Earth to the Sun so its face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Snow Moon because the heaviest snows usually fell during this time of the year. This moon was also known as the Hunger Moon, since the harsh weather made hunting difficult.

BOXING DAY FOOTBALL MATCH SINGLES WIN EIGHT-GOAL THRILLER

On a mild December morning at Elms Road Arena it was the Cassington Singles who came out on top with a topsy-turvy 5-3 victory over the Married men. However, with the Singles struggling for Singles ahead of kick-off, Carl Osgathorp switched teams and had a pivotal role in the outcome of the match, initially delighting spectators as he took the ball down with a cultured first touch. But he voluntarily came off the pitch after about 20 minutes to chat to me about Everton Football Club on the sidelines. Marcus Copelin then started wandering off as well after he got 'James' confused with 'change'!

I'd like to point out that the Married men thought they could get away with starting the game with 15 players on their team before the Singles quickly caught on. You can't accuse me of bias by the way because I am not married or single! Cassington Married, sporting their usual yellow and green jersey, began the game looking more like Norwich City than Brazil, going 2-0 down after a lovely finish from Ben Bakewell into the bottom left corner.



Marcus complained of time wasting as a Single tied their shoelaces, but the former had something to celebrate when Sean Osgathorp found himself in acres of space to pull one back for 2-1. Cultured Carl, back on the pitch with halftime approaching, then slipped to allow an equaliser from Cassington Married and the two sides went into the break level, each throwing plenty of hypothetical punches on Boxing Day (no actual ones).

As ever, Stuart Thompson was entrusted to be the man in the middle for this highly anticipated fixture. I was initially impressed with his refereeing display, not making himself the centre of attention like so many modern officials do, and letting the end-to-end football flow. But at the start of the second half, he was alerted to the Singles having played the first five minutes with 13 Singles. With balance restored, a delicate flick towards goal from Rich Petty - one no doubt his Cruyff-turning dad would've been proud of - saw the Singles lead again. Married responded instantly though, Hugo Kelly reducing the arrears with a great turn and finish for 3-3.

Young Luca Osgathorp wrote his name into the Cassington & Worton Newsletter when he smashed the ball into the top left corner on his left foot from distance to give the Singles a

> 4-3 lead, before Will Price's free-kick was spilled into the net for five in the game's dying embers.

> Stuart brought a disciplined, entertaining game to a close and Marcus said "we've done as well as we could" as the Married men saw youth and energy conquer experience and wisdom this year. It was also the first time in the history of Boxing Day matches that there was a female player on the pitch. Congratulations to her and good to see that Cassington moves with the times! Solving Homelessness & Achieving Independence

Are you aware that every night around Oxfordshire there are, on average, 20 people sleeping rough in the open air, in a car or in a tent? This is in addition to another 20 people sleeping rough in Oxford City.

I am a volunteer working a few hours a week on behalf of Connection Support, one of the charities working to help the homeless community to become safely housed and get on the road to achieving independent living. Volunteering is a great way to give something back to helping a cause that you believe in and that inspires you and others. All volunteer roles are for a few hours a week and are flexible to fit in with the rest of your week.

My specific role is part of the outreach team that follow up on referrals of people sleeping rough across the county. We typically go out between 6am and 9am to locate rough sleepers and verify their situation, check their welfare and safety and start the process of evaluating the most appropriate temporary accommodation for them. A safe, warm place to sleep with access to toilets and showers should be available to all.

Tonight it will be -3deg C can you imagine sleeping outside in those conditions?

Generally Oxfordshire has a lack of supported housing options due to a reduction in social housing new build, rising and unaffordable private rentals and reductions in government funding. This is coupled with a rise in the number of people suffering from section 21 "no cause" evictions, mortgage defaults, the cost of living crisis, being released from prison into homelessness and from mental health issues.

Connection Support helped over 5,000 clients last year, providing a range of services which offer support with homelessness, housing support, mental health, independent living, preventing isolation, parental mentoring, refugee resettlement and social prescribing.

What can you do? If homelessness in your local area is something you would like to help with then Connection Support would appreciate your time as a volunteer, or your money by way of a donation, or both!

◆ BOTLEY WEST COMMUNITY CONSULTATION ENDS 8th FEBRUARY

PVDP's Community Consultation Process for the Botley West Utility-Scale Solar Power Station will soon be ending. **SBW Chair Alex Rogers** encourages everybody to engage in this consultation even if you haven't been able to attend an in-person event.

1. Complete the Stop Botley West questionnaire about whether the consultation has been adequate and useful for you even if you've not attended an event and have only seen PVDP's Community Consultation Leaflet posted through your door. You can complete the questionnaire online using this QR code or on paper using the leaflet that came through your door this week (locations of places to return them are on the leaflet).



2. Write to PVDP with your comments and questions about their proposals (based on what you have learnt from events or PVDP publications) and send copies to your MP and local councillors.

◆PLEASE DO THIS BY 8th FEBRUARY 2024 when the CONSULTATION ENDS

Stop Botley West have been monitoring the consultation events to estimate the levels of attendance and also to provide questionnaires on how our residents view the adequacy of the consultation. This is important as the Planning Inspectorate will want to see evidence that the Community Consultationt has been done properly, with communities affected by the proposal able to ask questions, receive additional information to inform their views and responses to the development and allow the Developers to respond through modifications of the scheme. An inadequate Consultation can result in the Planning Inspector requesting for the process to be repeated. Stop Botley West will provide the results of their questionnaire to both Parish and District Councils so it can be used to inform the views of Parish Councils on the adequacy of the Consultation and provide input to the Adequacy of Consultation Statement provided to the Planning Inspectorate by our District Councils.

Alongside the Community Consultation we have seen the publication by PVDP of the Phase Two Community Consultation Leaflet and the Preliminary Environmental Impact Report (PEIR). The latter is a huge document of over 7,000 pages of individual chapters, appendices and a Non-Technical Summary describing the environmental baselines of the area of the proposal, the impacts of the project and mitigation strategies for these impacts which will be put in place by the Developer. Stop Botley West are scrutinizing these documents to look at whether they provide adequate information for the community to respond to the consultation and also whether the baselines, impacts and mitigations proposed are accurate, follow government guidelines and/or are realistic. To achieve these goals, Stop Botley West have engaged with experts in various specific fields relevant to the PEIR to examine individual chapters and to report on their contents. A review of the collated reports of adequacy will be made available to Parish and District Councils and for later input into the planning process. Summaries will be produced to inform affected residents in the proposed area of development.

◆IMPORTANT MEETING at WODC Offices in Witney

The West Oxfordshire District Council's Development Control Committee meet at the WODC Offices on Woodgreen, Witney, Oxon OX28 1NB at 10:00am on Monday 5 February. They will be discussing the Botley West Solar Power Station proposals.

SBW will be speaking at this meeting and we hope that many supporters will also attend either inside the chamber or outside where we hope for a press presence. Please put the date in your diary!

WODC and Botley West Solar Farm


Residents across West Oxfordshire are being WEST OXFORDSHIRE encouraged to provide feedback to the latest DISTRICT COUNCIL public consultation on the proposed Botley West solar farm.




Councillor Andy Graham, Leader of WODC, said "There are a wide range of views on this proposed solar farm across West Oxfordshire which we are listening to and we hope the developers are as well. We held a productive meeting with parish councils last week to help them submit feedback on behalf of their communities. I would encourage all residents to put their views into this consultation because this is their chance to influence the proposal.

"As one of the affected planning authorities we will be carefully considering the latest proposals over the coming weeks and we will submit a response. Some of the areas that the Council will be considering will be the landscape impacts of the proposal, any impacts on heritage, and the biodiversity and ecology aspects."

The Council has previously expressed its disappointment that the proposal will bypass the local planning process, limiting input and decision-making at a local level. The Council will now reflect on the adequacy of consultation undertaken by the developer, submit representations about the proposal to the Planning Inspectorate, and prepare a Local Impact Report at the appropriate time.

The Parish Council didn't have a meeting in January but they have made a decision for the Precept for 2024-2025. 2023-24 Band D - £80.45

2024-25 Band D - £187.77 that is an increase of 87.77%. This is yearly not monthly

£15.65 extra per month if paid over 12 months £18.78 extra per month if paid over 10 months

£3.62 per week over 52 weeks

The reason for the increase is the increase in prices for village maintenance (grass cutting, trees, waste bin removal)

The Parish Council would also like to install a Speed Camera in the middle of the village and look at traffic calming throughout the village.

The Parish Council have put some money aside for the cost of the new play area – even though we are looking at grants and the village are doing events to raise money. The cost of the new play area is in the region of £75-£85k.

Online Booking System for DIY Waste

A booking system has been introduced at household waste sites in Oxfordshire, following the scrapping of charges for disposing of DIY waste. The government announced in June it would prohibit local authorities from imposing so called "tip taxes". Small amounts of household DIY waste from home improvement work are now permitted to be disposed of for free at the county's seven household waste recycling centres (HWRCs).

The first five items, or one plasterboard sheet, are free - any more waste is chargeable, as is waste generated by commercial contractors. The change is expected to cost Oxfordshire County Council £500,000. It said online booking for DIY waste was to monitor use and prevent abuse of the free provision.



RECIPES OF THE MONTH

Seville Orange Marmalade (with or without chillies)

Whole fruit method – my mum used to cut up the oranges before cooking them but I find this method much easier. Whatever you do DO NOT throw away the pips and membrane as my father did many years ago which resulted in bit of a row!

Ingredients

1.5 kg Seville oranges cleaned – if you can't find Seville oranges try half blood oranges and half lemons

Two lemons

3kg sugar – I never use preserving sugar as I find the result more like jelly which I dislike so just common or garden caster sugar

Method:

Squeeze the juice from the two lemons and put to one side. Put the resulting halves of lemons and all the other fruit whole into a huge pan of boiling water and simmer for around 2 hours – this depends on the size of your fruit. They need to cook enough so you can easily poke a fork through the skin. Drain and let them cool until comfortable to handle.

Cut into strips thick or thin depending on your taste. Put the pips and membrane in a muslin bag then add to a small pan with the lemon juice and boil for around 5 minutes. Weigh your preserving pan and then pop in all the fruit and any juice accumulated plus the liquid from the small pan — you can dispose of the pips now. Cook this until you have 2kg left.

Add sugar then while on a low heat stir until dissolved. When this happens bring to a good old boil and do so until setting point is reached – 15 to 20 minutes. I test mine using a saucer and teaspoon popped into the freezer.

Now is the point at which, if you like, you add your chillies or whiskey. For the chillies use jalapeno either fresh and cut up into tiny morsels - use the seeds if you like – or use candied jalapenos which are delicious, also cut up. Stir into the marmalade and allow to cool for 15 mins. Stir again and pot in the usual way.

For whiskey pour in around 150 ml of whiskey and allow to cool as before. We let ours settle for a good week or so before eating but you can dig in straight away.



Orange and Lemon Meringue Pie

Everyone knows lemon meringue pie but made with Seville oranges and some lemon this rings the changes a little — when you make the curd it is not as pretty as lemon curd so do put meringue on top.

Pastry

250g flour 150g butter in cubes 50g caster sugar 50g icing sugar 1 egg 1 pinch of salt

Method:

Beat the egg with the sugars and the salt, add the flour in one fell swoop and mix with your fingers. Now is the time to use a food mixer, if you have one, if not by hand will be fine just more work. Add the butter in cube by cube and process until you have a smooth ball of dough — do not overwork it. Put in a plastic box or jar and pop into the fridge for at least an hour. Blind bake the pastry in a quiche tin or similar for at least ten minutes until good and golden. Allow this to cool but not in the fridge.

Filling:

2 level teaspoons of cornflour

100g of caster sugar

2 large Seville oranges or three smaller ones – the juice needs to add up to around 200 ml altogether

1 lime (or lemon)

85 g butter in small cubes

3 egg yolks + 1 whole egg beaten together

Method:

Mix the cornflour, sugar and zest from all the fruit in a pan. Add the strained juice of all fruit gradually, mixing carefully as you go. Cook over a medium heat until the mixture has thickened. Remove from the heat and beat in the butter, then carefully stir in the egg yolks and whole egg. Replace on a medium heat and cook stirring ALL the time to make sure it remains smooth. DO NOT overheat or it will scramble – yuck! Put to one side.

Meringue

3 egg whites 150g caster sugar 1 tsp cornflour

Method:

In a clean, clean bowl whisk the eggs to soft peaks then gradually add in half the sugar. Sift in the cornflour and whisk. Then finish up the last of the sugar until you have a lovely glossy mixture.

Finally:

Pour or spoon the orange curd into the tart case, cover with the meringue and cook at 180 degrees C for around 20 minutes until the topping is crisp and slightly golden. Allow to cool for around 30 minutes before eating. It is best the same day but if kept in a cool place, not a fridge, it does survive to be edible another day or so if you have leftovers – as if.

BLENHEIM COMMUNITY

The past couple of months from the end of 2023 to the beginning of 2024 have been very busy community wise! We hosted 100 people for The Cherwell Collective who came to see Sleeping Beauty in the Palace and the Illuminated Light Trail. Cherwell Collective operate a foodbank in Kidlington but also provide much wider support for families and individuals, with a strong focus on food sustainability. We also welcomed 50 people from The Oxford Hub which offers support to vulnerable families and individuals from the Barton area.

We donated a Christmas Tree to the Ophelia Project based in Kidlington which is a newly established drug and alcohol residential rehabilitation centre for women. We hope to work closely with them in 2024 and are looking at providing bicycles for the residents to use, as well as help give advice and support from our Housing team.

Four of our staff went to Chipping Norton in the week before Christmas, to help Chippy Larder pack food hampers for local families. This was part of the new volunteering scheme we have launched at Blenheim which gives staff one day of paid volunteering leave per year.

The Estates Team went to Hanborough Manor Primary School to remove ten dead trees and replace them with trees grown on the Estate. They are also currently building a Buddy-Bench for Charlbury Primary School as well as two reading sheds for Yarnton Primary School.

Waterloo Cartoon recreation on display at Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum




Exhibition of art and museum objects related to the Battle of Waterloo open now until 30 April 2024. A recreation of the 19th century Waterloo Cartoon by Daniel Maclise, Shaun Maloney's piece has been donated as a prize in charity raffle supporting the museum which celebrates its 10th Anniversary this year.

Artist Shaun is a veteran himself, having served a long and varied career in the British Army, including the Falkland Islands, mainland Europe, Bosnia and Kosovo, Northern Ireland and the Far East. With a strong sense of social responsibility, he now uses art alongside his coaching experience, to help others overcome trauma, physical pain and damaging thinking patterns. Drawing is a tool Shaun often uses.

Alongside the exhibition Shaun is running two art workshops for visitors looking to build their own confidence in drawing or develop their skills, the first on 17 February, and the second on 13 April 2024. Open to all ages from children aged 10 up to adults, the workshops will encourage attendees to both express their own creativity while casting an analytical eye over historical visual sources such as the original Waterloo Cartoon.

While visitors can drop in to see the exhibition any time the museum is open, spaces on the workshops are limited, with tickets available now from the museum's website and via Eventbrite.

Following the exhibition, Shaun is also kindly donating his Waterloo Cartoon as the grand prize in Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust's 10th Anniversary raffle, with proceeds supporting the charity's continued work at the museum in Woodstock, preserving the county's military heritage and sharing Oxfordshire people's stories of conflict and peace.
