
The Healing Power of Love

April stargazing highlights

April 8 - New Moon.


The Moon will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

April 22 and 23 - Lyrids Meteor Shower.

The Lyrids is an average shower, usually producing about 20 meteors per hour at its peak. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Lyra, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

April 23 - Full Moon.

The Moon's face will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Pink Moon because it marked the appearance of the moss pink, or wild ground phlox, which is one of the first spring flowers.

LETTER FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL REGARDING THE ANNUAL PRECEPT

Dear Residents

You will probably be aware that Cassington Parish Council is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of many of the village's amenities, such as the village greens, its burial grounds, along with associated stone walls, trees, ditches, and drainage channels. It is also responsible for traffic calming, recreational facilities and buildings owned by the village.

For some of these facilities, the Parish Council is grateful to the team of volunteers from Cassington Sports and Social, the Village Hall Committee and the Allotment Association who maintain the playing fields, sports pavilion, allotments, and the village hall on behalf of the village at little or no cost to the Parish Council.

Each year the Parish Council must set a budget for the services it provides to the village. The source of this funding is via the precept, which is raised through the local council tax.

In 2022/2023 the cost of running the PC was £19,000. For 2023/2024 this has risen to £27,000, and for 2024/2025 the cost is projected to rise to £30,000.

The main increases in the budget are due to:

- Clerk's salary, £4,000 due to annual pay rises and increased hours worked.
- Tree maintenance, £2,000 due to increased maintenance requirements
- Waste bin collections, £800 due to increase in WODC charges.
- Audit cost, £600 a statutory requirement.
- Grass cutting, £400 due to increase in charges.

In addition to the above, the Parish Council has made provision in 2024/2025 budget for the following costs:

- Reserve fund, £3,500 the Parish Council is required to have sufficient reserves, these have been depleted by numerous 'one-off' payments over the last year.
- Vehicle activated speed indicator sign, £2,500 a mobile device to aid reduction in vehicle speeds.
- Traffic calming measures, £6,700 survey, admin, and fees.
- Playground equipment, £20,000 a contribution towards the projected £85,000 replacement cost.

The impact of these increases has resulted in a total precept of £62,900 for the village in 2024/2025. This represents a total annual cost for a band 'D' property of £187.77, or £15.65 a month over 12 months, compared to the previous cost for a Band 'D' property of £80.45.

The Parish Council has always tried to keep any increases in the precept to a minimum. However, we find ourselves in a position where our costs are increasing significantly, along with an ever-increasing list of 'one-off' issues we are required to deal with. Some of this is a result of increasing devolvement of responsibilities and costs from County/ District Council level or the Highways Agency to Parish

Council level, because of the state of public finances, a national issue. In other cases, costs arise from maintenance of our environment in an ancient village with ageing infrastructure.

Historically, apart from Botley West Solar Farm and Blenheim's proposed housing development, the speed of vehicles through the village has been the major concern of residents who have made their feelings known to the Parish Council. Therefore, we are determined to do what we can to make the road through the village as safe as possible for all of the residents of Cassington.

You may be aware that despite the reduction in the speed limit from 30mph to 20mph, the volunteers from Cassington Speedwatch are still recording vehicles at speeds of over 40mph. Unfortunately, any measures needed for traffic calming/speed reduction is the responsibility of the Parish Council and not the highway authority, OCC, or the local authority, WODC.

In addition to road safety, we have also tried to make the residents aware of our concerns regarding the poor state of the stone walls in the village, many of which are the responsibility of the Parish Council to maintain. The Parish Council recently commissioned a survey of the village walls, which was kindly undertaken by volunteers from the village. We need to be clear that the cost of repairing and/or replacing these walls will be a significant in future years, so an imminent reduction in the current level of the precept is unlikely.

Residents are of course welcome to express their views on these, or any other matters that affect the village, either in writing to cassingtonclerk@cassington-pc.gov.uk, by contacting one of your Parish Councillors – contact details in CAWN, or by attending a Parish Council meeting.

The PC meets 10 times a year. These meeting are held in public, usually at the village hall. Residents are encouraged to attend the meetings and are invited to raise questions. Agendas for the meetings are published in advance on the village website and posted on the village notice boards. Minutes of the meetings are also published on the village website and in CAWN.

Finally, the Parish Council is grateful to the members of the public who attended the March 2024 meeting and raised questions regarding the increase in the precept which had been notified in the February 2024 edition of CAWN, and we welcome the opportunity to explain the rationale behind this increase.

NATURE RECOVERY PLAN

Nature recovery has been put at the top of
West Oxfordshire District Council's agenda
as it agrees its Nature Recovery Plan, which

will tackle the climate and ecological emergencies across the district up to 2030.

With approximately 106 hectares of greenspace under the Council's care, comprising parks, fields, greens, and public spaces within housing estates, the Council recognises the need for ongoing efforts to enhance these areas for wildlife and public enjoyment. The process set out in the new plan will involve identifying areas of improvement in areas belonging to the Council, and determining how natural methods can be adopted to make them more resilient and help boost biodiversity.

The plan will prioritise the improvement of biodiversity in planning and development processes. The Council has already adopted Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG), a new approach to development that aims to leave nature in a better state than it was beforehand on a site. A minimum 10% improvement has been mandatory for major schemes since February 2024.

To support in the delivery of this new plan, the Council will welcome a Nature Recovery Officer to work with partners, Town and Parish Councils and environmental groups on projects, and support events to boost community appreciation and enjoyment of the natural world.

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Update on 'Botley West'

Gaslighting the Public: Smoke and Mirrors on the Agricultural Value of Our Land Author: Professor Alex Rogers, Chairman, Stop Botley West, March 2024



The first time a representative of Blenheim Estate described the land they manage as mostly Grade 3b and "poor" was at the Cassington Parish Council Meeting of the 1st December 2022. This was stated by Dominic Hare, CEO of the charity Blenheim Estate Trust, and he used this description as part of the justification for converting farmland to a massive ground mounted solar power station.

This incorrect information has been repeated at several parish meetings about the Botley West Solar Farm, and I believe it was aimed at misleading the public. It is this 'gaslighting' that is still being repeated, most recently in a BBC Countryfile Magazine article 'The Great Solar Debate' published in March 2024. This article states rather ambiguously: "arable farmland surrounding Blenheim Palace......25% of this land, the majority of it lower quality, is planned for solar." This description of the land quality is simply not true; so it's important to share a more accurate view.



Land Quality

Yarnton Meadows, for example, have been famous for centuries for producing excellent yields of quality hay. As early as 2022 the land under threat held a classification within a range of Grade 3a to 3b. Subsequent findings from the Preliminary Environmental Information Report in 2023, show that a substantial portion—up to 38%—of the land designated for the Botley West Solar project is, in fact, classified as Best and Most Versatile land (BMV). BMV land encompasses Grades 1, 2, or 3a, all of which are described as excellent to good. Experts advising Stop Botley West contend that the proportion of BMV land in the central section of the development exceeds the overall average of 38% and may even reach an astonishing 80%. This is farmland capable of yielding high quantities of a select range of arable crops, as well as good yields of grass, oilseed rape, potatoes, sugar beet, and other less demanding

crops. You don't need to be involved in agriculture to know this is nowhere near a description of "poor" quality land.

Ground mounted solar panels and soil health

Referring to the BBC Countryfile article, there is the statement that solar farms have a "generally positive" influence on soil health. Some of the farmers on this land that have farmed it for generations might disagree.

The following statement is a reiteration of one that appeared in the Phase One Consultation Summary Report: "Botley West presents an opportunity to improve the condition of agricultural land and soil quality by temporarily taking the land out of intensive agricultural use for a period of time." Again, a justification for this massive industrialisation of part of the Blenheim Estate.

Why are these statements questionable? There is evidence that ground mounted solar farms can have significant detrimental impact on land quality due to the compaction of the soil and the potential to increase the chance of flooding by damaging the existing field drains by driving 2 million piles into the ground to support solar panels.

If Blenheim, as the organisation with rights over this land, knows that agricultural practices are damaging their main asset, why have they not done something about it before now? So, rather than prioritising sustainable development that benefits both the climate and people, they are pursuing large-scale industrialisation of Oxfordshire's farmland and greenbelt. This cynical approach appears to prioritise maximising income over environmental stewardship. Stop Botley West

Comments from the Public -

A member of the public asked why the Parish Council has risen the precept so much. The Council explained that there has been an increase of certain things like trees and grass cutting, and we have to pay for the emptying of the bins in the Recreational Ground. The Parish Council agreed that the original explanation in CAWN was not good enough to explain to the village the reason for such a big increase.

Report from Clerk

Elms Road Ditch – A contractor has been asked to clear the ditches but cannot at the moment as it is too wet. They are hoping to start later on this month.

Replacement for Adrian – New tenders have been sent out to 6 different contractors. Awaiting their responses. VAS on Eynsham Road & Yarnton Road – Have chased OCC. Stile at field by Bell Lane – OCC have advised that it is the land owner who needs to replace the stile and that they would not help with the cost. They also said that they do not need to give permission but a heads up would be nice.

Correspondence

- Letter with regards to Purwell Farm blocking foot path and right of way I have contacted WODC and am waiting on a response
- Almshouse Drainage The Charity of the Almshouses, has contacted the Parish Council as the storm drain is block and they would like the Parish Council to pay for the clearance. The Parish Council do not believe that they are responsible for the clearance and have asked the Clerk to contact Thames Water to see if they are responsible for the drain.

Reports from County and District & Parish Councillors – a) County Councillor

Tuesday 20 Feb was the Full Council meeting of the County Council at which we set a budget for the next financial year. We finally ended up adopting a slightly more expensive budget than I had thought ideal, but still well within the parameters of what is safe. We agreed above inflation increases in spending on Adult Social Care and Children's services, and additional money going into flood defences and roads. We are offsetting this with savings in areas such as reducing the layers of management and putting effort into ensuring that our children can be looked after in Oxfordshire rather than elsewhere. The County Council remains financially robust, but there are limits to what can be done within the funding available.

Flooding

The County Council is the lead flood authority and works closely with the Emergency Services and WODC to respond to floods and try to prevent them. There will be a full cross-agency debriefing in the spring, and I would expect the input of parish councils will be sought. There has been some flooding in Cassington, and it shows the importance of preparation, and of landowners taking responsibility for their ditches and culverts.

A40 update.

No further progress to report. Discussions with Homes England continue. This is extremely frustrating, but there really isn't anything that can be done unless Homes England agrees to pay for the A40 work, despite the delays and increased cost. You may recall that the scheme was over ambitious and failed to predict inflation, plus the Homes England funding is linked to the building of West Eynsham and Salt Cross, both of which have taken much longer than the previous administrations of WODC and Oxfordshire CC assumed. Salt Cross of course has been delayed by the successful judicial review of the Planning Inspectorate's objections to WODC's AAP net zero aspirations. I am still confident that A40 improvements will go ahead, and they will include the remodelling of the A40/Eynsham Road junction, so that it works better for Cassington residents. You may have seen that the A40 cycle route is being scraped, to restore it to its original width after decades of neglect. The section near Cassington and the Barnard Gate to Witney section has now been completed.

ARE YOU READY TO VOTE?

Are you ready to vote in the district council and police and crime commissioner elections on 2 May.



To take part in any election, anyone over the age of 18 must be registered in the area they live in. Some people eligible to vote may not be registered and therefore will not be able to cast a vote. This may be because they have recently moved or are voting for the first time.

Poll cards will be sent to all registered voters at the end of March, you do not need to reapply if your poll card is correct. Residents can make an application to register to vote through the Government website which takes only five minutes to complete. They must register by 16 April and can do so at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

Some residents prefer to vote by using a postal vote. Residents can apply to receive their vote by post, before the application deadline of 5pm on 17 April. Applications can be made online by visiting www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote. Anyone applying to vote by post will need to provide their national insurance number as part of the application. If you have an existing postal vote arrangement, you will not need to apply again.

Electors may also choose to appoint a proxy to vote on their behalf in the polling station. To be able to vote by proxy,

applications must be received by 5pm on Wednesday 24 April. Proxy voters will be required to show their own valid ID when voting on behalf of someone else. Applications can be made online by visiting www.gov.uk/apply-proxy-vote.

Anyone voting at a polling station in England this May will need to show photo ID before they can be given their ballot paper as part of national law. Accepted forms of photographic ID include a UK, European Economic Area (EEA) or Commonwealth passport; a UK, EEA or Commonwealth photocard drivers' licence; and some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass. Voters will be able to use expired ID as long as the photograph is still a good likeness. Voters may be required to provide further proof of identity if there is any discrepancy between the name shown on the form of photographic ID and the name the voter claims at the polling station.

Anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID will be able to apply for free ID online at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk/ or by completing a paper form which is available from the Council.

More information is available on the West Oxfordshire District Council website, including details of how to apply for the free ID. Anyone not able to visit the council website, or apply for a Voter Authority Certificate online, is being encouraged to contact the Council by calling 01993 861410. Residents must have applied for Voter Authority Certificate by 5pm Tuesday 24 April.

Village Hall AGM

Chair's Review of the Year -John Hemingway

"Not just a building, but building a community".

2023 was a very eventful year. Over and above the usual, the hall was delighted to support St Peter's Church as Cassington celebrated its 900th year, from the special family lunch for some 200 people on launch day in January, through the community ArtWeeks show in May, to the climax venue for the promenade play of scenes from village history in September. In addition the hall provided the backdrop for the street party on King Charles III's Coronation, and we also launched a successful children's party at Christmas that looks set to become an annual event. At the end of the 900th, the hall was pleased to display permanently in the lobby the gift of the 1797 map of village farms kindly presented to St Peter's by Christ Church college and cathedral.

We owe massive thanks to all our customers who book the hall, both one-off and regular users, and to those who attend the events we organise. Cinema nights continue to be well supported, and we're constantly on the lookout for live entertainment acts and perfomers. If you have any suggestions for other types of events you'd like to see in the village hall please let us know and we'll do our best. The hall also now has its own system of free-standing display panels for anyone who might like to organise an exhibition.

Throughout the year the major project under consideration by the committee was how best to start moving the hall away from using fossil fuels for heating and lighting. We consulted other halls and external experts, in particular Stewart Thompson consulted contacts at Oxford Brookes University, and we looked into ground and air source heat pumps as potential replacements for the gas boiler and solar panels for electricity. Given the likely costs, and the absence of any large scale grant schemes, our only realistic option was to leave the gas boiler in place for now but to look in detail at solar panels as a sustainable source of electricity.

We invited three firms to give us costed proposals for the installation of solar panels, and the best value for money and ongoing service was offered by Lumos PV Power Systems Limited, based here in the village. We also had to liaise with WODC to make sure that our proposed scheme fitted their requirements, and after a number of options were explored we decided on a 23 panel system with 3 batteries for storage, which should meet most of our needs throughout the year.

We set a target to install the system in spring 2024, after the dark winter months. At that time the installation was liable for VAT which meant the total cost would be upwards of £30,000, so we decided to commit £20,000 from existing funds and endeavour to raise a further £10,000 through fundraising. Very fortunately the decision to defer the installation worked in our favour.

First, on 1st February 2024 the government changed the VAT regulations to make village halls exempt from VAT on solar panel installations. Second, in late January 2024 the Platinum Jubilee Village Hall Improvement Grant Fund reopened to new applicants, especially for smaller grants to smaller villages, and we understand that our application was successful and we should receive just over £2,300 to support the project. As a result, we were able to lower our fundraising target and at the moment of this AGM it looks on course to succeed.

Our annual finances continued to show good results. Total income for 2023 was £2,149 less than the year before, but our underlying operating income was up by over 9%. Income from lettings was up a few hundred pounds at £15,256 (£14,678 last year), with gross revenue from our own events down a few hundred at £3,217 (£3,721 last year). We received donations of £1,043 mostly from Bike Night, plus £1,700 from interest, investments and Gift Aid, all well up on the year before. That gave us total income of £21,216, down on the previous year's £23,365, but in 2022 we had received a one-off post-pandemic grant of £3,953 - and excluding that grant our underlying operating income was up by over 9%. It's great to see a return to growth.

Our expenditure was broadly in line with the year before, except for the massive rise in gas and electricity bills which went up by 44% as our fixed price tariffs came to an end. Our running costs, repairs and maintenance were much the same as usual, and we also committed to spend money in January 2024 on deep cleaning and re-sealing the hall floor to make it great for another 4-5 years. After depreciation our total costs came in at £21,223 (last year £20,544) which left us with a net deficit of just seven pounds.

We have an amazing team who make it all happen and owe each of them huge thanks. First, for her many years of commitment, a massive thank you to our dedicated booking secretary Kathryn Teal who in May decided to move on to new challenges. In her place we were pleased to appoint Pam Coates, who took on additional duties. Thank you Pam. At the same time Malcolm Teal also stood down after many years as a volunteer and his skills and expertise are sorely missed. Thank you Malcolm, and also Penny Burroughs our long-serving Secretary until the start of 2023 who later stood down as a trustee in November. Many sincere thanks Penny.

We also thank two new trustees who joined us at the start of the year, Carolyn Hinton (Secretary) and Hannah Farncombe, and all the other hard working trustees who volunteer their time to serve: Lorna Mills (Treasurer), Adie Gregory (Events), Stewart Thompson (Parish Council), Bridget Sherlock (Sports and Social), and Sheila Nelson who is a regular at committee meetings. We always welcome new volunteers to join our team, so if you're interested please do get in touch.

The village hall is a registered charity and relies totally on generating its own income to keep the place going. If you value the hall at the heart of our community, small regular donations are a great way to support a great asset that's effectively owned by the village for the benefit of the village.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

As spring has sprung you might be thinking of lunch in the garden? Perhaps the weather is not as kind as it could be so you need something a little more substantial than green salad - this hits the spot and is brightened up with preserved lemon and lemon juice. I haven't given quantities as it is such an easy 'recipe' to adapt for taste and number of people.

Sprightly lentil salad

Ingredients:

Cooked lentils – or cook your own puy vert lentils with a bay leaf and some onion (I add a stock cube but it isn't essential)

Preserved lemon

Fresh lemon juice

Olive oil

Garlic

Feta

Fresh coriander

Pepper (you probably won't need salt because of the feta and preserved lemon)

Crunchy salad leaves – you really need these to be robust to provide a contrast to the lentils.

Method:

If you cooked your own lentils let them cool a little before dressing them with some olive oil, lemon juice, salt and pepper. The same treatment for the already cooked variety. Cut up the feta into cubes about the size of dice (no precision needed this is just a guide). The preserved lemon needs to be rinsed and patted dry before you chop it into small pieces (these do need to be quite small – you want a pop of flavour not a tongue numbing collision). Take the stalks from the coriander and chop as finely as you can – a bunch of mint and some parsley would add nicely to the flavours if you have some.

Now all you need to do is run all the ingredients except the salad leaves through the lentils and taste test. Arrange the salad leaves in a serving dish and serve alongside the lentils. Some chunks of good country style bread and some peppery olive oil to dip it in and there's lunch.

FILM

The film on Friday 12th April is One Life. It's the true story of Sir Nicholas 'Nicky' Winton, a young London broker who, in the months leading up to World War II, rescued 669 predominantly Jewish children from the Nazis. Nicky visited Prague in December 1938 and found families



who had fled the rise of the Nazis in Germany and Austria, living in desperate conditions with little or no shelter and food, and under threat of Nazi invasion. He immediately realized it was a race against time. How many children could he and the team rescue before the borders closed?

Fifty years later, it's 1988 and Nicky lives haunted by the fate of the children he wasn't able to bring to safety in England; always blaming himself for not doing more. It's not until a live BBC television show, 'That's Life', surprises him by introducing him to some surviving children - now adults - that he finally begins to come to terms with the guilt and grief he had carried for five decades.


