about our countryside, wanting to protect our farmland for agriculture and for the good of all our communities. There was significant interest from the press, who were taking photographs and interviewing individuals and we even had a couple of MPs join us.

Meeting up with members of other groups in the country who are also facing the prospect of these giant solar farms was very heartening to us all and made our commitment to fighting BWSF much stronger.

May stargazing highlights

May 6 Eta Aquarids Meteor Shower.

The Eta Aquarids is an above average shower. It is produced by dust particles left behind by Halley's comet. The shower runs annually from April 19 to May 28. This year it peaks on the night of May 6 and the morning of the May 7. The nearly new moon means dark skies for what should be an excellent show this year. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Aquarius, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

May 8 - New Moon.

The Moon will be on the same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

May 9 - Mercury at Greatest Western Elongation.

This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the morning sky. Look for the planet low in the eastern sky just before sunrise.

May 23 - Full Moon.

The Moon will be on the opposite side of the Earth to the Sun and its face will be will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Flower Moon because this was the time of year when spring flowers appeared in abundance. This moon has also been known as the Corn Planting Moon and the Milk Moon.

St Peter's Churchyard

Every parishioner who lives in Cassington is entitled to be buried or have their ashes interred in the churchyard. There are, however, statutory churchyard regulations that all of us must follow, including the type of memorial permitted. A one-off fee is charged at the time of burial/interment.

Part of the churchyard regulations is that all graves should be flat with no delineation, flower pots, ornaments, plastic flowers or markers. This enables ease of grass cutting/ strimming and avoids accidental damage.

The churchyard takes a lot of constant maintenance including weeding, hedge and tree trimming and grass cutting which is funded in part by the collection of the one - off fees but this by no means covers the full costs. We are grateful to those who tend individual graves.

We are therefore seeking your help to clear all materials mentioned above and any wooden markers, which are meant to be temporary until a memorial stone is installed. We would also welcome offers of help to weed and cut back vegetation in the churchyard or donations to pay towards the ongoing maintenance.

CANDIDATES FOR ELECTION AS THE THAMES VALLEY POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER

On 2nd May, you will be able to vote for your Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC). Police and Crime Commissioners are elected to hold your police force to account for delivering the kind of policing you want to see. PCCs are responsible for the totality of policing in their force area and aim to cut crime and deliver an effective and efficient police service. PCCs bring a public voice to policing and they do this by:

• Engaging with the public and victims of crime to help set police and crime plans;

• Ensuring the police force budget is spent where it matters most; and

• Appointing the chief constable, holding them to account for delivery of their objectives, and if necessary, dismissing them.

The PCC does not "run" the police force. Chief constables continue to be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the police, but they are accountable to the public via the PCC.

More Police Officers for Thames Valley Dear Cassington and Worton Residents,

We simply do not have enough police officers in the Thames Valley, meaning that relatively serious crimes such as

shoplifting and burglary are being routinely overlooked. Money being wasted in other areas needs to be urgently directed towards strong local policing for your area.

The Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner spends almost £2 million annually on around 40 members of staff. We will ensure financial prudence and greatly reduce wasteful office expenditure (including the £18,000 recently spent on a pointless website rebranding).

Considering the current state of our police force, it's clear that short-term focused political parties should not be tasked with setting the policing priorities for our local area. Your vote for our local candidate will help us wrestle back control of policing from inept and uninspiring politicians.

In the last election for Police and Crime Commissioner, the turnout in the Thames Valley was just 35.8%, meaning that 1,173,265 people in our area lost their opportunity to vote at this really important election. I've been privileged to serve you as Police & Crime Commissioner since 2021. Since then I've appointed the new Chief Constable, delivered record

Labour and Cooperative Party

I have worked with the police for 22 years as a barrister, prosecuting cases ranging from child sex abuse to drug dealing, this experience has shown me what needs to change.



My mission is to re-build trust in police. Claims to have "doubled neighbourhood policing" are from a year ago where neighbourhood officers had been cut to just 150 over 108 Thames Valley teams and don't include PCSOs (459 in 2015, just 252 now) who are a vital part of any neighbourhood team. More important than numbers are how the police interact with their community. The December 2023 inspection revealed how TVP "requires improvement" for "responding to the public" and "investigating crime". Better training as to "lines of enquiry", closer working with the CPS so officers understand what evidence is needed in court and better use of technology can improve low detection rates.

I often see delays of 5 years from rapes being reported to coming to trial, meaning 2/3 of victims drop out. Fast tracking these cases and communicating better with victims is vital.

Finally, forging partnerships to prevent crime: restoring youth services and targeted mentoring for young people at risk of getting mixed up in county lines or other criminality.



Begbroke to Bladon Bluebell Walk

This month thanks go to Kath Humphris for suggesting this walk, and to Keira and her website Little Oxplorers. This walk will take you through fields and bluebell woodland as you wander from Begbroke to Bladon or the other way round.

If you are looking for a short walk then start at Heath Lane in Bladon, as that connects up to the woodland instantly. If you want a longer stroll through fields as well, then start at the church on St Michael's Lane, Begbroke. You will see a green footpath sign to Bladon. Follow the arrow down the lane and bear right through a field with horses (behind a fence) and then you reach vast fields. Keep to the established paths and in the second field veer left to the left hand corner - you will be able to see the woodland at this point. The carpets of bluebells are just stunning and surround you as you meander through the woodland. Established paths off the main track invite you to walk amongst them – do be careful not to veer off these paths and trample the bluebells as they are protected by the Wildlife and Countryside Act. We couldn't believe how early they were, and what a bumper show, apparently it's due to the mild winter.

The walk connects to the village of Bladon and you will enter at Heath Lane. If you have children and you want to tag in an extra bit of fun, visit the nearby Bladon park, which has a fantastic range of play equipment. Access via the lane beside St Martin's Church (where Churchill is buried), it's just beyond the allotments.

A treasure of an adventure, especially with the bluebells, and a real local gem.

Enter the woodland on the newly laid path; this was previously just a mud track but loose gravel has now been put down, and enjoy the fragrance and sights of the bluebells! This is Bladon Heath and also referred to as Bladon or Begbroke Woods.

'Enjoy the Countryside while you can' Appreciating the Public Amenity Value of Our Land

It's a wonderful time of year to put your walking shoes and get out and about in the fresh air. With birdsong in full force and summer knocking on the door, there's plenty to discover this month on the footpaths, bridleways and byways that criss-cross much of the Oxfordshire countryside. With the undulating nature of the local landscape, you're never far from a spectacular view of the countryside. However, it's worth remembering that many of these views will be lost for a generation - possibly forever - if the Botley West solar power station proposal goes ahead.

• 68 miles of existing footpaths, essentially 'zero traffic' and rural in character, overwhelmed by 2 million solar panels,

• 156 Power Converter Stations the size of large shipping containers will drown out any birdsong with a 67dB hum,

• 11 miles long, 4 miles wide, 75% on green belt protected land, threatening rare water meadows by the Thames and adjacent to many other heritage assets,

• 45% of the solar panel area on best & most versatile (BMV) land - the best land for agriculture and food production,

• 2 years of construction noise, disruption and heavy lorry traffic which will impact the work commute, school run, hospital appointments, leisure trips and so on.

Local roads will be affected by construction activity and heavy lorry traffic. Traffic will divert to alternative routes and smaller roads will see higher levels of traffic. High security fences (together with security cameras) will reduce

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

As we say goodbye to winter I imagine you are craving strawberries and cream but you will just have to wait for that treat. This pudding cheats as you use frozen berries so you can make it all year round. I like a mixture of red berries and raspberries but if you like blueberries pop them in as well.

Berry Pudding

125g butter – this needs to be very soft Half a cup of sugar – golden castor sugar is nice for this Half a cup of self-raising flour Half a cup of ground almonds 2 large eggs Three quarters of a cup of full cream milk One cup of frozen berries (or fresh). If you think they are going to be sour sprinkle with some icing sugar first.

You can make this in individual ramequins or in a gratin dish. Lightly butter or oil the dish/es and put to one side. In a food mixer blend the butter and sugar until lovely and light. Add the almonds, eggs and flour then pour in the milk – you need a good, thick batter but you may not need all the milk. Pour the batter into the dish/es and scatter the berries over the top. Cook for around 30 minutes at 180 degree Celsius. Serve warm with cold, cold cream.

When rhubarb comes in this is delicious with stewed rhubarb on top instead of the berries. You could add some orange zest to the batter in that case. footpaths to narrow corridors in between countless rows of solar panels, sub-stations and other electrical equipment; existing vistas will no longer exist and the public amenity value of our land will be decimated.

Update from Stop Botley West







Gardening Tips for May

- Watch out for late frosts. Protect tender plants
- Earth up potatoes, and promptly plant any still remaining
- Plant out summer bedding at the end of the month (except in cold areas)
 - Lift and divide overcrowded clumps of daffodils and other spring-flowering bulbs
 - Check for nesting birds before clipping hedges.
